

most promising: The first method is to cut the flesh into slices and parboil them to get rid of the superfluous oil, and then fry them in a thin batter.

The second method is to cut up the meat into squares two inches thick, which are to be boiled, and then pickled for two days in spiced vinegar, after which they are ready for eating, and are considered excellent by the fishermen.

The usual way of preparing sturgeon for market, however, is by smoking. Strips an inch or two thick are put through a pickling process, then hung on hooks over slow fire of corn-cobs or sawdust of hard wood. After thus smoking for a single night they are ready to be shipped to any part of the country. The preparation of caviare is an

The Antiquity of Man.

An interesting discovery, of much importance for geological and archcological science, has recently been made in a coal mine at Bully-Grenay Calais. 




