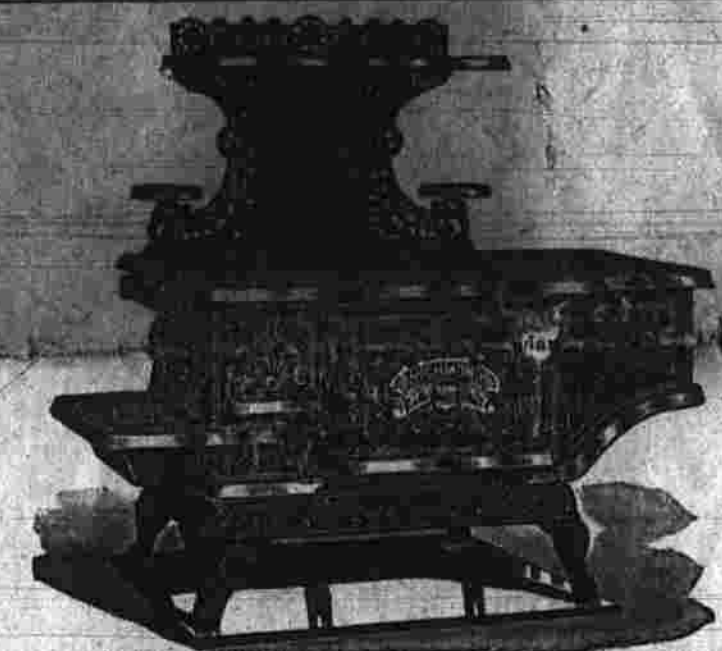

GUilty OF FORGERY.
