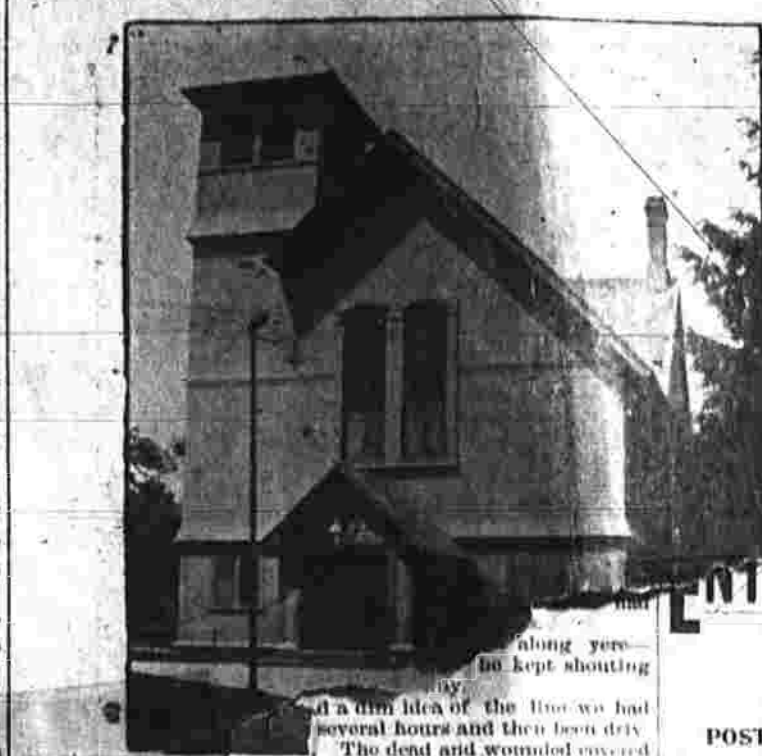

EPWORTH LEA

ROYALLY ENTERTAINED SOUTH METHODIST CHURCH

Banquets, Music and Eloquent Addresses

About 100 delegates from all parts of eastern Connecticut were present at the opening of the Norwich District Epworth League convention at the South Methodist church yesterday forenoon.

This number was increased as the day wore on. It was the largest gathering ever known in the history of the Norwich District League.

The church was prettily decorated with silk flags, potted plants and autumn leaves. The Epworth emblem and Maltese cross, wrought in silver, adorned the front of the organ.

A brief devotional service was held at 10 o'clock. The prayer was read by Rev. W. J. Yates, who gave a short address of welcome. He was greeted with the Epworth salute, the waving of handkerchiefs. He referred to the establishment of Methodism in Manchester by Bishop Asbury more than 100 years ago. He sketched the religious and industrial growth of the place since then and invited the delegates to visit the paper mills of Cass Hill, at Highland Park and the silk mills of Cheney Brothers. The badge, which would be presented to members of the convention was, he said, the gift of Cheney Brothers and a protest against the child labor movement. Wadsworth cordially welcomed the visitors to the church, the homes and hearts of their South Manchester friends.

C. G. Watkins, first sexton, was introduced. He said all must recognize the grand work done by the Epworth League in the advancement of Christian work on earth. He was glad to meet its representatives here and, in behalf of the citizens of Manchester, extended to them a cordial welcome.

President Scott thanked the speakers in behalf of the District League for their cordial welcome, but added that he was not surprised, for the South Manchester church is known to the farthest bounds of the conference as a united, zealous and very friendly people; it was not to be supposed that the child labor League would differ from the mother of the Church. He had been delighted to walk from the depot through such a beautiful park and thought that the boys and girls appointed to South Manchester must want to live here forever. He referred briefly to the plan and purpose of the League. His plan includes every country on the globe; its purpose is to unite all parts of the individual, the head, the heart, the hand, the pen and the pocket-book, and so build up the best kind of Christian character.

Rev. J. S. Wadsworth of South Manchester, Rev. W. L. Ward of Norwich and Rev. W. J. Yates were appointed a committee to nominate convention committees.

Rev. J. S. Bridgford, of Danburyville, was appointed railroad secretary, to give orders to delegates for return tickets.

A paper on "Junior Work" prepared by Rev. W. J. Hodson was read in his absence by his sister, Miss Minnie Hodson. On recommendation of the nominating committee the following convention committees were elected:

Nominations—Rev. T. J. Everett, of Hazardville; Everett H. Scott, of Hartford; George A. Edgerton, of New London; Miss Ella M. Davison, of Williamstown.

The afternoon session was opened by a devotional service conducted by Rev. W. L. Ward. The church was well filled. Committees appointed at the morning session then reported. W. S. Foster, chairman of the committee on Constitution recommended an amendment permitting the board of officers to fill any vacancies which may occur. The amendment passed.
