#### JANITOR DOUGAN'S BOARDER.

Edward Tanner Still in the Lockup-Doctors Refuse to Say He Is Insane-May Be Tried for Burglary Tomorrow.

Ewdard Tanner, the escaped inmate of the Middletown Asylum, whose arrest last Thursday was described in Friday's Herald, is still in a cell in the police station. He was arrested for day burglary at the house of Clinton W. Schieldge, but the authorities did not try him, on the presumption that he was insane. Instead, they notified the officials of the asylum that Tanner had been recaptured, and expected some one would be sent for him at once. When on Saturday no to the man who cares anything about one appeared, Judge Bowers communicated with the retreat by telephone and found the authorities there uncertain as to their authority to retake

Monday they had decided not to come after him and the case was referred to Selectman Watkins. Meantime Tanner had been living in a cell and fed from Janitor Dougan's table. He is subject to epileptic fits and as soon as Mr. Watkins learned the particulars of the case he employed a man to stay at the police station nights to care for Tanner if he should be seized with a fit. Today, acting upon orders of Selectman Watkins, Drs. Tinker and Gillam examined Tanner as to his sanity. He appeared straight enough and after the examination neither would sign commitment papers though both admitted that he might be insane.

The next step to be taken will prob ably be the trial of Tanner in the police court tomorrow morning on the charge of burglary. The young man's father believes he is insane and will probably make that claim in court. He can find plenty of witnesses who have known Tanner and will testify that he has been of unsound mind.

Section 2—Any person so sentenced to the state prison, after having been in confinement within said prison for a period not less than said minimum term, may be allowed to go at large on parole in the discretion of a majority of the board of directors of the said prison and the warden thereof acting as a board of parole, if in their judgment said prisoner will lead an orderly life if set at liberty.


It has been found that certain prawns, common along the coasts of England, change their color at least twice every 24 hours in order to harmonize with the stronger or weaker light prevailing near the surface or in the deeper water. As evening approaches these fish lose their distinctive day colors, and all assume a transparent azure hue.
