The Courant itself recognizes this fact in an editorial in the issue of yesterday. It calls attention to the slump in "attendance" at the institution supported by this county and intimates that "attendance" may be declining a little in Tolland and Haddam counties as well.

It is closing the jails in Hartford, but just look at Savannah! It has emptied hundreds of cells in Connecticut but down in Georgia the federal agents have discovered that blind tigers pander to booze night-ers!

Well, they have lynchings down in Georgia, a good many of them, but it does not follow that the law against mob murder should be abolished or that Connecticut is going to become infected with the practice of hanging men to trees by the roadside.

We should expect a state which is as lax in most things as Georgia to be equally so in the enforcement of its liquor laws but things are different in Connecticut. That is a point which the Courant overlooks, though we understand it has existed in the state since, Lord knows how long.

When bootleggers and blind tigers begin to traffic in Connecticut drunken men will again be seen on our streets and they will be arrested and then we shall hear that the jails are not entirely deserted.

Further, because Connecticut is Connecticut, and not Georgia, the jails will contain not only the poor wretch who got drunk but the man who was so opposed to prohibition that he was willing to violate the law.
