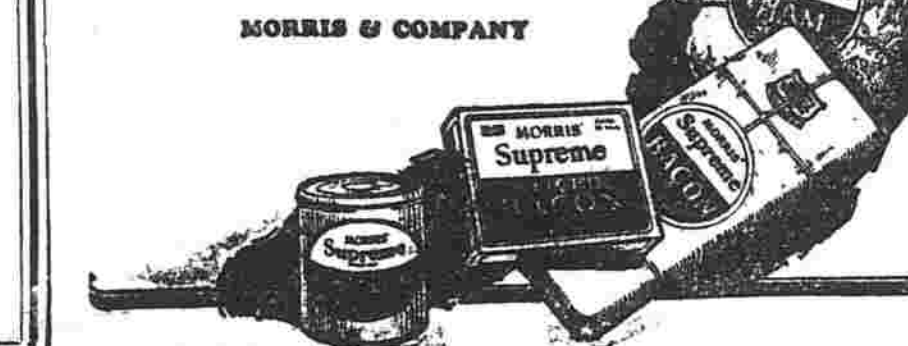

Far up toward the stars—it seemed miles then—the figure of a man clad in diving trunks poised razardously upon a tiny platform.

We can almost recall the words of the hallyloo man: "It's Speedy the high diver! Captain Speedy will dive from the clouds into this little tank of water—a death-defying leap, my friends—step right up—"

We will never forget that terrible moment when the lady left the platform and how we closed our eyes and waited breathless for the splash of water.

The other morning I was walking along Broadway with a well-known showman.

At 43rd street we saw the usual group of men siding against an iron railing, "talking shop."

"Carnival corner," this is known, for here gather the tent showmen waiting to go out on the road.

My companion waved a hand toward the group and, with his finger, singled out to me a picturesque man who wore a huge-rimmed black hat.

"There's a great old fellow, and an interesting item for you, said the showman. 'As fine an old tent showman as ever made the rounds. And nerve—but maybe you've heard of him. Speedy's his name. Known as Captain Speedy..... famous high diver."

"But he doesn't do much high diving now, I don't know just when it happened. It may have been an accumulation of happenings. Anyway jumping from a 90-foot ladder into water did something to his eyes. He still goes once in a while, but not so often. He can't see the tank very well now."

"The orner's bee worried about him. There are times when all the lights of Broadway are just a dim haze to him, but he still can recognize his old friends when he sees 'em. 'The orner's afraid that his eyes may get worse, or that some day he'll try the dive and won't see the tank very straight."

"D'ye want to meet him?"

I hesitated. Twenty years ago

this invitation would have seemed too marvelous for imagination. Memory flashed back to the bare-foot boy, the sky-going ladder, the flicker of gas lights—all the illusions—

"Thanks," I said taking another peep at the huge figure in the huge hat. "Thanks—I've another engagement down street."



**ALLIANCE RENEWED OVER SLUSH FUNDS**

Reed (R., Pa.); Denno (R., Ill.) and Bayard (D., Del.), were filled when Vice President Dawes named Senator Fernald (R., Me); Goff (R., W. Va.) and King (D., Utah). When it does organize Senator James A. Reed (D., Mo.), who sponsored the investigation, undoubtedly will be elected chairman. Under Reed's direction, the inquiry will be directed first into the charges that \$5,000,000 were spent by the Pennsylvania senatorial primary.

Borah's hearty endorsement of the investigation added to the gleam of Democrats over the unexpected developments in the national political field.

In Other States  
"I do not know what amount was expended in Pennsylvania or whether the amount spent was beyond a reasonable sum and I did not vote for the investigation, because of any convictions on that matter," said Borah. "I do support such an inquiry because charges were made, not only in Pennsylvania, but in other states, that fabulous sums were spent on senatorial primary campaigns. I can't see how the Senate could sit silent and inactive when it is charged that millions and millions of dollars were expended to nominate men for the Senate."

**SPORT FEDERATIONS DEMAND OLYMPIC SAY**

The future of the Olympic Games will be decided in Paris in July, according to all indications, at a meeting of the International Sporting Federations.  
According to reports in local sporting circles the Federations are ready to teach the International Olympic Committee a lesson for refusing to admit representatives of the Sporting Federations into their councils. The decision was taken by the International Olympic Committee in their May meeting at Lisbon.  
Already the International Tennis and Rowing Federations have stated definitely they will not sanction participation of athletes under their jurisdiction in the Amsterdam games unless representatives of the Federations have a say in the organization of the games.  
The July meeting of the Federations, according to Federation spokesmen, will witness a definite rupture between the Olympic Committee and all International Federations except those of track and field sports and possibly swimming.  
Olympic officials are not particularly worried. They expect that at the last minute the whole difficulty will be arranged amicably.

**GAS TUBES WILL BE CERTIFIED BY LABORATORY TEST**

**Safe Tubing Sold in Connecticut in Future Will Bear Stamp of American Gas Association.**

Worry over the safety and efficiency of flexible tubing used to connect various gas fired appliances with outlets will no longer be necessary, according to the Connecticut Committee on Public Service Information, which has issued a statement to the effect that a dozen styles and sizes of gas tubing will be subjected to a series of laboratory tests by the American Gas Association. These types of tubing which are found to be safe for use will in the future bear the stamp of the association and will also bear the date of manufacture, for rubber tubing which has been stored more than a year is apt to be dangerous.

Connecticut gas company officials have often warned gas customers against the use of old or cheap tubing for connecting up gas appliances, but accidents still occur because some have failed to heed the warning. Cases have often been found in which holes in the tubing were plugged with soap, wrapped with tape or rags, or glued. All of these remedies are dangerous and it is far cheaper and far safer in the end to buy new tubing.

Before receiving this stamp, however, tubing will be fully examined and tested. On account of the great variety of uses—and of abuses—to which gas tubing is subjected, it is necessary that the tubing remain open for free flow of gas when stepped on or rocked on, or when bent or "kinked." The tubing must so firmly grip the gas cock that when someone trips over it, it will still stay in place. The alternate stresses of heat and cold must not cause it to leak.

*Here's the King Of Chicken A La King!*



Albany, N. Y.—He's the "king" of chicken a la king—the man who gave the world one of its tastiest dishes one summer's night in the early days of the twentieth century. His name is E. Clark King.

King never received a penny for the use of his name in connection with the dish that millions throughout the world have relished.

**At Resort Hotel**  
It was at the old Brighton Beach hotel, New York, that the dish first saw the light of day. Mr. King was proprietor. One evening King asked the chef, a man named Greenwald, to try a new dish which he had been experimenting.

The chef prepared it. Mr. and Mrs. King enjoyed it. The next day it was served to the guests. They enjoyed it. And from there its name spread until it became universally known and favored.

The old hotel, once a popular society gathering place during the summer, with its adjacent race track, now has become a memory. But the dish goes on forever.

**The Recipe**  
Here is the original recipe:  
To two tablespoonsful melted butter, add half a green pepper cut in fine strips and one cup mushrooms sliced thin. Stir and cook five minutes. Add two level tablespoonsful of flour and half teaspoonful salt. Cook until frothy. A pint of cream and stir until sauce becomes thickened.  
Put it all into double boiler, add three cups of chicken cut in pieces, cover and let stand to get very hot.  
Meanwhile cream a quarter of a cup of butter, beat into it the yolks of three eggs, one teaspoonful of onion juice, one tablespoonful of lemon juice and one-half teaspoonful of paprika.  
Stir this mixture until the eggs thicken a little. Add a little sherry and finally shredded pineapple before serving on toast.

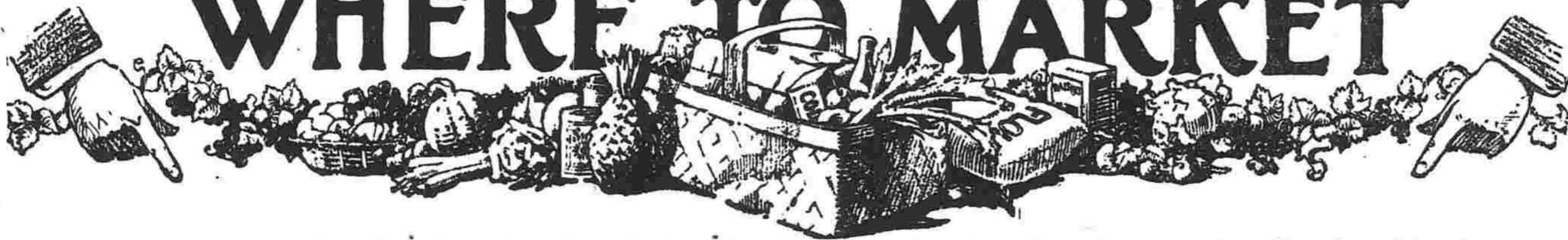

Cause Of Erysipelas

This is the second of a series of three articles on Erysipelas. Tomorrow: Treatment.

BY DR HUGH S. CUMMING Surgeon General, United States Public Health Service

The direct cause of erysipelas is a very small vegetable germ as an onion which occurs in chains, some short and some quite long. Because it is round and because it grows in chains, it is called a streptococcus, the word "cocci" meaning a round body and "strepto-" meaning chain—Streptococcus, a round body growing in chains.

In a typical attack of facial erysipelas, the patient often has a chill followed by a high fever, which continues throughout the course of the disease. May Suffer Severely The inflammation may begin on the nose, cheeks, ears, or at any point where there is an abrasion of the skin. The suffering may be severe. If the patient is weak or if the scalp is involved, or if the infection is unusually severe, delirium may be present.

Light Diet The diet should be light, mostly liquid and water should be given freely.

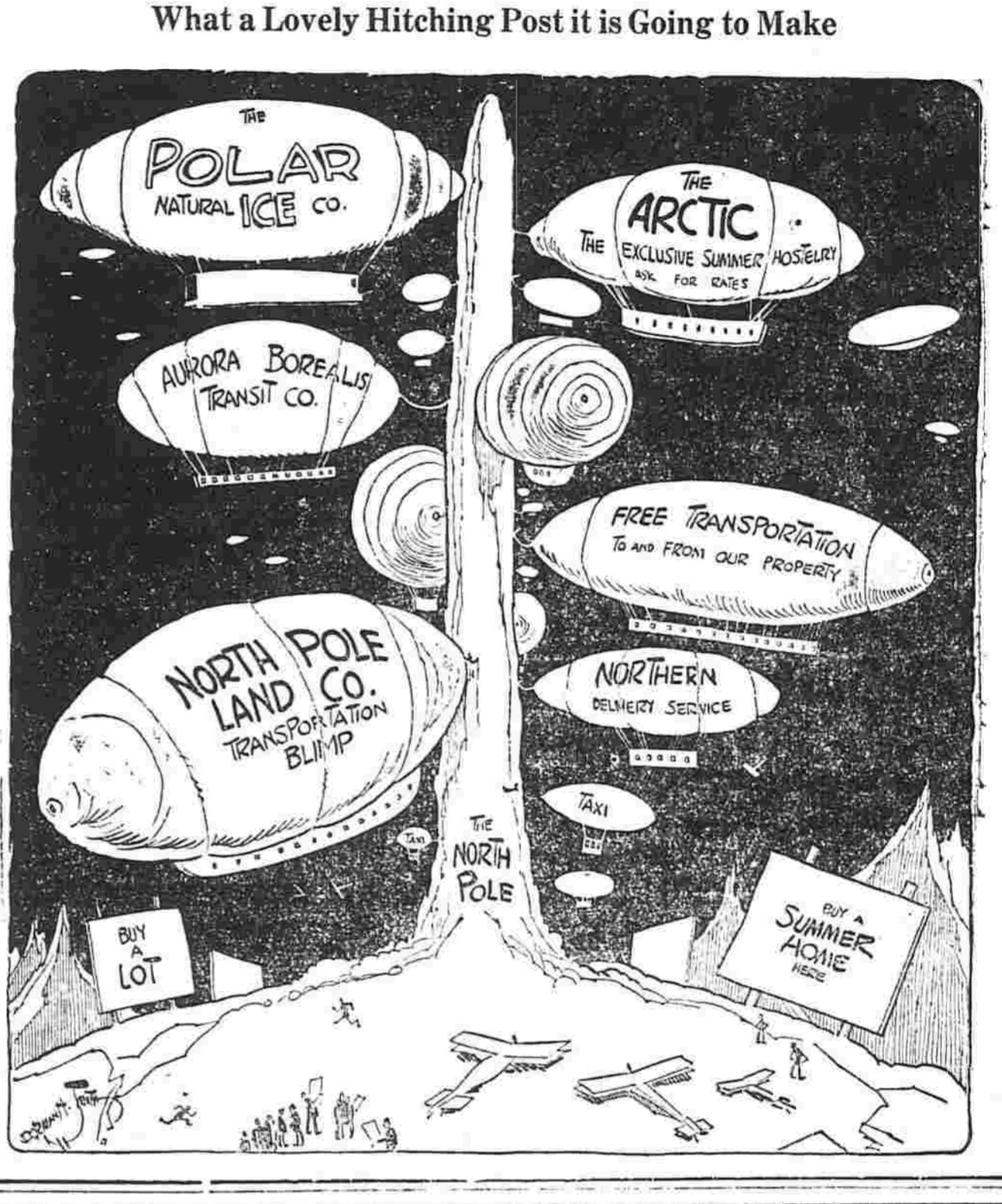
