## **NEGRO BOGEY** CAUSE OF DRY ORDER PANIC

#### Senators See Chance of Federal Hand in Enforcement of 14th and 15th Amendment.

Washington, May 27 .- President Coolidge's now famous order, offering federal police authority to state officials as an aid to prohibition enforcement, may never be carried into effect, it was indicated loday on Capitol Hill, because of legal obstacles in the state constituion of California, where the government planned its initial trial.

While the Senate Judiciary committee prepared to launch a formal investigation into the legality of the order, word spread through Congress that the California state constitution would prevent any local official there accepting employment at the hands of the government. It was said that the question would be tested immediately in the courts if any state officer accepted a federal dry badge.

Would Be Death Knell. As the Treasury already has announced the order would not be tried out anywhere else for the present, any serious legal obstacle in the Golden Gate state would sound a virtual death-knell for the order. The Senate's inquiry, however, will be carried to a conclusion because Congress feels the order has set a precedent which must not

stand unchallenged. The first step in the inquiry will be to determine whether public hearings shall be held and whether witnesses will be called. Some members of the committee desire to summon Attorney-General Sargent, who has since approved the order, and Secretary of the Treas-

## In the Kitchen with 6 Famous Cooks

NOVEL MEXICAN DISHES Pacific Coast Expert Tells How to Prepare Them

someness. Mrs. Kate Brew Vaughn, MRS. KATE home eco-BREW VAUGHN nomics director, Los Angeles, and author of several cook books, was taught how to make these



dishes by a Mexican lady.

Fragrant and Delicious Mrs. Vaughn gives the following directions for making enchiladas. The gravy may be made the day before. Its ingredients are: 4 ounces chili peppers, 1½ pounds tomatoes, 2 slices hard toast, 1 small onion, 1 pinch each of clove, thyme, pepper, sugar, and salt.

Open peppers, and if it is not de-sired very hot, remove veins and seeds. Soak in boiling water about 10 minutes. Skin tomatoes by hold-ing over flame. Put toast and onion through food chopper and then train all the ingredients in order to make a smooth gravy. Melt two tablespoons shortening in frying pan, add gravy, and simmer slowly until smooth and thick.


