GERMANY AND FRANCE STRIKE HANDS AT LAST

'No More War" Pledged Amid Scenes of Wild Joy as Teuton Nation Enters CHINESE FIRE ON the League.

Geneva, Sept. 10 .- "For France this day means we are finished with war . . . machine guns have yielded to peace . . . we have had enough glory on the battlefields to satisfy both of us. . . ."

With his hands extended towards Germany's delegates, Aristide Briand, French foreign minister, uttered these dramatic words today in welcoming Germany, long the traditional enemy of France, into the League of Nations amidst epochal scenes of enthusiasm. Herr Stresemann, German foreign minister, had prefaced Germany's entry into the League with a speech to the Assembly, declar-

ing Germany's policy to be one of

peace and voiced a plea for gener-

al disarmament. History Making Speech. M. Briand replied to Herr Stresemann with a speech that must go down in history as marking the final ending of the great World war, a speech which pledged France to consider Germany as a friend in the future.

THIRD DEGREE **BREAKS STORY** OF VESTRYMAN

Gorsline Admits He and Girl Were Close By as Hall and Mrs. Mills Were Shot to Death.

Somerville, N. . J., Sept. 10 .-Ralph V. Gorsline, vestryman of the Episcopal church of St. John the Evangelist, admitted to the authorities today, they announced, that he was in De Russey lane on the night four years ago when the Rev. Edward W. Hall and Mrs. Eleanor R. Mills, his sweetheart,

were murdered. Gorsline heard shots, screams and voices speaking on that vital night, he told the authorities, according to Inspector John W. Underwood who directed an all-night examination of Garsline and Miss Catherine Rastall, a choir singer. and companion of Gorsline on the night of the double murder.

Third Degree For hours during the night Gorsline and Miss Rastall had been grilled by detectives who had sought to break down the story they told four years ago-during the first

Gorsline's story then was that he met Miss Rastall by chance in front of the New Brunswick Y. M. C. A. and drove to her home, a mile from the Phillips' home. This occurred at 10 o'clock on the night of the crime, September 14, 1922. He had reiterated during the first investigation that after leaving Miss Rastall at her home he went home

Gorsline was questioned by relays of detectives incessantly, almost all night. He was not alloweû to go to sleep. Both Gorsline and Miss Rastall

By CHARLES P. STEWART. Washington, Sept. 10 .- Congressional campaigns must cost the postoffice \$10,274,000 every two years, according to figures produced in the controversy between Senator O. E. Weller of Maryland and Representative John Philip Hill of the same state.

Weller is trying for a Republican Senatorial renomination Sept. 14. Hill is trying to get the nomination for himself. Hill accused Weller of sending

out political letters under his senatorial frank, to save postage.

Weller rejoined that Hill during the last session of Congress, read into the Congressional Record, as speeches, everything he wanted to say to the Maryland voters, and now is sending out the Congressional Record under his frank.

The nub of it is that Weller estimates Hill's campaign postage stamp bill would have been \$22,000 if he'd paid for his outgoing mail.

If Weller's figure is right as to Hill and if other congressmen are as free with their correspondence as he, we begin to see one reason why there's a postal deficit. The terms of 32 senators and 435

representatives expire simultaneously biennially. Multiply \$22,000 by their total-467-and you get \$10,274,000, or \$5,137,000 a year which the Postoffice Department works for but

doesn't get. Probably, in reality, \$22,000 per congressman is too high. Nevertheless, the amount of free mail that goes out of Washington, when a political campaign is on, is al-

most unbelievable. The postoffice never has attempted to determine its volume exactly -what's the use? It wouldn't pay anything anyway-but "trainloads of it" is the way it's described at the department.

Chairman W. R. Wood of the Republican Congressional campaign committee predicts that the next Congress will be almost as dry as the present one.

It won't be wet, at any rate. At least theoretically, a wet House of Representatives is a possibility, but not a wet Senate, unless some dry senators flop over to the wet side.

All the representatives go out of ffice at once but only one-third of the senators.

Consequently, if the wets are numerous enough, they can change the complexion of the lower house at a single election.

Now the present holdover twothirds are dry by so large a majority that the Senate would still be predominantly dry, even if all the one-third who are elected or reelected this year should be wetwhich, of course nobody expects. Wets, then shouldn't count much n any modification of the drought from the 70th Congress.

They can gain, but they can hard-The chances of flops by dry lawmakers into wets, however, should-

n't be underestimated. There are plenty of them who are just as ready to vote one way as the other, to suit their constituencies. If the drys gain ground in November, the 70th Congress will almost completely dry up. If they break even, or if the wets gain just a little, things will stay about as they are now. But let the wets gain a great deal and it will be flop, flop, flop pretty fast.

All the same, Representative Wood is on tolerably safe ground in predicting that the next Congress will be dry.

TO PREVENT MEASLES.

Intelligent persons no longer be-Heve that every child has to have measles, or indeed any other disease. It is now realized that the aphorism, prevention is greater than cure, is so obviously true that it demands no argument in its sup-

While measles itself is not generally a serious disease, its complications are sometimes so severe that they result in death or in women he ever knew." disabilities which last throughout life. Furthermore, the disease is unusually contagious, and conditions are especially serious when it develops in an institution such as a school or orphanage housing large numbers of children.

Prevention. Unfortunately, we have not yet for measles the specific organism or specific methods of prevention that are available for diphtheria and scarlet fever. True, several investigators have reported the isolation of organisms, and have offered evidence in support of their contention that these are the direct cause. None of the evidence thus far available has been sufficient to convince the majority of bacteriologists that the organism concerned is definitely established as the causative agent.

The most promising methods for creating resistance to measles consist in the injection into those exposed to the disease of the serum or fluid matter of the blood of children who have recently recovered from the disease. In New York City more than fifteen hundred children in institutions in which cases of measles were prevalent received such preventive inlections. Almost eight hundred of these children were later exposed with the disease.

Fairly Successful. The evidence, as reported by Drs. Park and Freeman, indicates that the use of this serum in an infected child may prevent the development of the disease, modify the severity of the attack, or some instances fall. However, in more than 95 per cent of cases the results were beneficial either in completely preventing the disease, or in making the attack very mild. An extremely mild aftack is an excellent result, since one attack of measles usually causes the per-

son to be so resistant that he will not suffer from the disease again. Drs. Haas and Blum used this method in attempting to protect 174 children in an orphanage in New York City. They found that the injections had a protective influence and that the children who did develop measles suffered far less from complications or from any severe symptoms than those who had not received the protec-

tive inoculation. They also found it possible to collect the blood serum and to preserve it over periods from two weeks to four and a half months before injection, thus making it easily available.
