CHEMIST PROMISES MORE, BETTER CROPS TO FARMER

CHENEY TRADESMEN IN ANNUAL BANQUET

The farmer may feel secure against the invasion of his field by the chemist. For chemists agree they will never be able to compete with the economical and highly efficient product the farmer gets out of the soil. Resulting from the fertility of synthesizing foods, chemists have applied their energies toward finding means to help the farmer cultivate his soil to better advantage.

Artificial Sugar. Professor E. C. C. Baly of the University of Liverpool succeeded last year in making a sugar out of carbon-dioxide and water with the aid of ultra-violet light. But the amount he got was so slight, the work entailed so great, and the cost so high that there is not the slightest chance of his method replacing the natural in the production of starch or sugar.

Food, which is made so easily and economically by nature, is found to be too complex for the chemist to attempt its artificial production. In fact, he doesn't know what it actually consists of. He does know there are carbohydrates—starch and sugar—in food. He does know they contain fats and mineral salts and water. And he is able to reproduce all these in the laboratory, although at quite some cost.

But there are two constituents of food that puzzle the chemist. These are the proteins and vitamins. The chemist has succeeded in analyzing the proteins to a great extent. But he has no hope of reproducing them. Yet these are essential as energy-producing factors in food.

To Help Nature.

Chemical research on plants and other foods, therefore, is directed toward improving natural production methods rather than replacing them at a high cost and with doubtful results. Fertilizers are being developed, agricultural poisons found, sprays used and other means devised toward helping the farmer produce a bigger and a better crop year after year. Soil research is one of the major lines in which chemists have directed their attention, all for the benefit of the farmer.

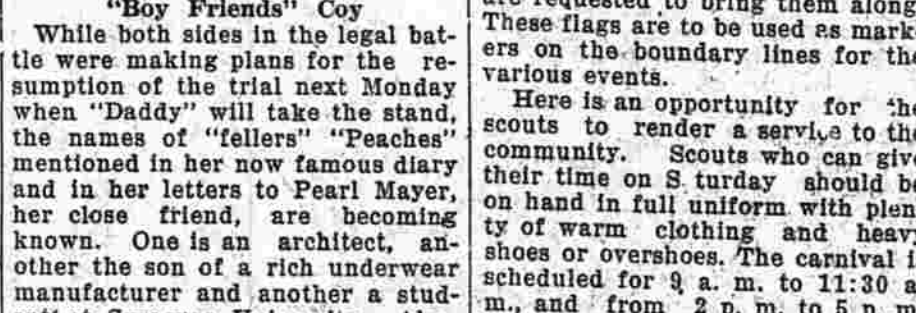
The chemist has even gone to the extent of devising methods of utilizing the by-products of the farm, materials that heretofore have been discarded as worthless. The alkaline treatment of straw promises to make available an enormous amount of fodder.

Production of milk from soy beans or peanuts, still in its experimental stage, may result in an additional source of revenue for the legume or peanut planter, while the dairy farmer need have no fear of its inroads on his profits because of its limited value.

The chemist also has found how to convert cottonseed oil into a hard fat, thus helping the cotton grower and allowing him to compete with the packer.

QUEER QUIRKS OF NATURE

Bright, shining, green leaves, creamy white flowers exhaling an exquisite fragrance, leaves emitting a pleasant odor upon being crushed—every easterner knows and loves this tree, "Magnolia glauca."

It is found from Massachusetts to Florida and along the coast to Texas and southern Arkansas, usually in damp places, in swamps, and along the borders of lakes and streams. The tree, though beautiful, has little commercial value. There are many local names for this favorite such as sweet bay, laurel magnolia, swamp bay, white bay and beaver tree.

The settlers in Pennsylvania found that beavers were exceedingly fond of the fleshy roots of the sweet bay and made profitable use of this discovery by baiting their beaver traps with the root, and naturally in such localities the trees became known as the beaver tree.

Europe, too, has its sweet bay tree, belonging to the family to which our sassafras and spice bush belong. It is most often seen in this country as a tub plant for decorative purposes.

Romance attaches to this sweet bay or laurel, for the ancients held it sacred to Apollo and chaplets and wreaths were fashioned from its leaves and used to crown heroes and victors. From this custom of honoring the poets of an-

cient times the term poet laureate has come down to us.

Stage

New York, Jan. 23.—In three sure successes of the Broadway season may be found pace-setters for a new fashion in drama which may be labeled 100 per cent American.

This does not imply any flag waving or patriotic theme, but rather that they concern persons, places, color and vernacular native to this country and this day.

Slangy, rough, vulgarian are the people of this eminent trinity—"Broadway," "Chicago" and "The Barker." And though their subjects are drawn from opposite poles and their authors from equal distances they have a vastly interesting similarity of viewpoint.

"Broadway" is of the dank backrooms of caberets, a plot that drags in hoodlums, murder and sets off that essentially Broadway product, "the hofer." "Chicago" satirizes the tabloid methods of trials involving "lady murderers" and "The Barker" tells of snake-charmers, bullyhoo and hoodlums, dancers, shillbills, cappers and other people of the tent show racket.

The first was written by a pair of dyed-in-the-wool Broadwayers; the second by an ex-sister from a Chicago newspaper who fled to Prof. Barker's play laboratory; and the third by a Columbia professor of journalism who during a certain summer vacation went forth with the pitch shows.

What all have in common is the capturing of more-or-less unknown tribes and presenting them with considerable honesty. There have been plays of the circus, but they have been honey and sugar after the fashion of "Polly of the Circus." There have been plays of the courtroom, but they have followed melodrama rather than the sparing criticism of the yellow journal methods so much in vogue of late. There have been plays of the theaters and chorus, but they generally hid those drab, parasitic figures and surly none caught the lingo of the night life as did "Broadway."

Of the rest, Alice Brady and Eva LeGallienne seem to have selected the most durable wares. Miss Brady has had a stormy season, being tossed from role to role only to watch the play collapse in spite of her splendid efforts at rescue. Her latest is "Lady Alone," written by one Latitia McDonald who, we understand, is none other than Mrs. Wallace Irwin in disguise. This tale of a young woman who tosses herself from a comfortable marriage into a feverish love affair, only to find her new love's ardor cooling in a most logical fashion, has many fine ingredients but not enough to establish it for more than a conservative run.

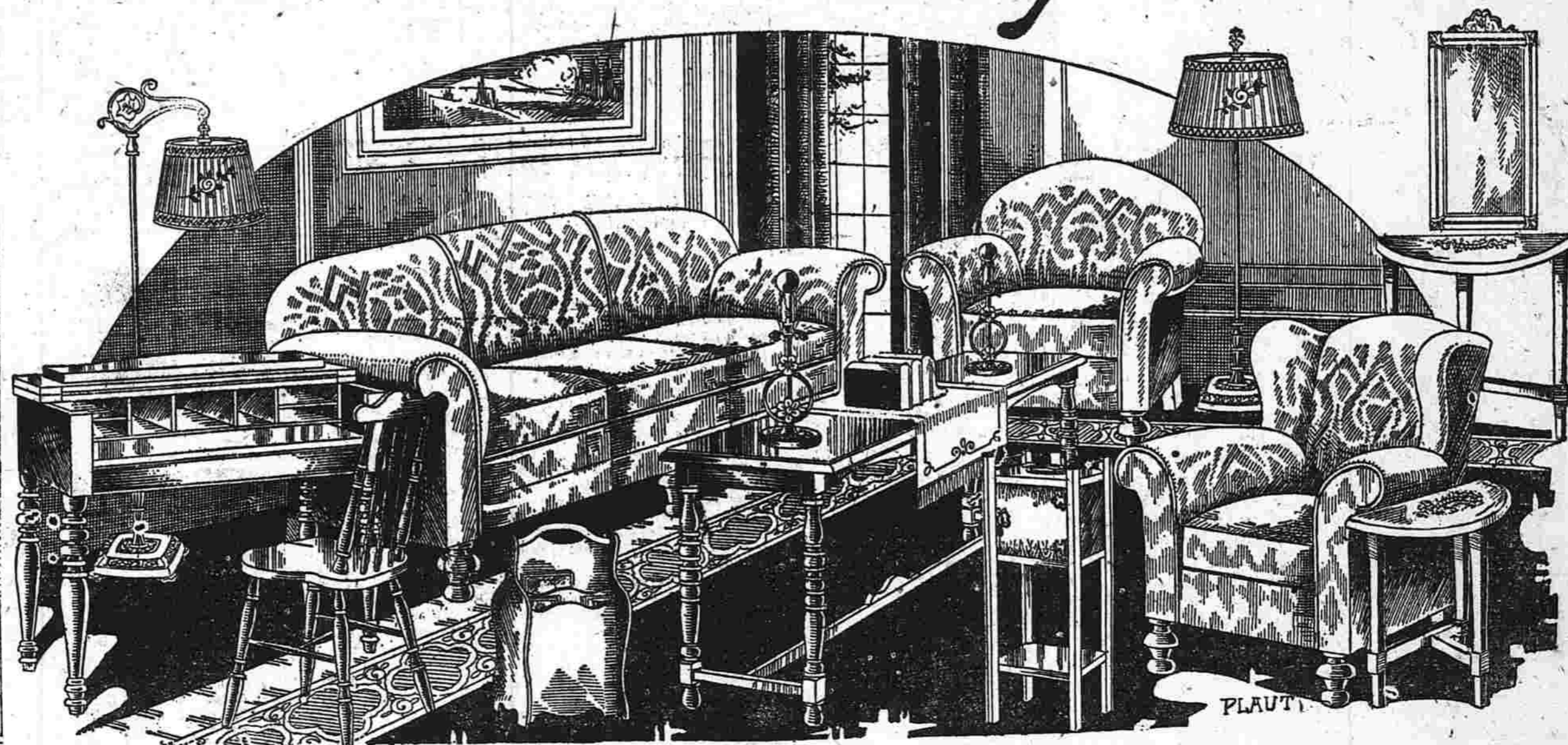

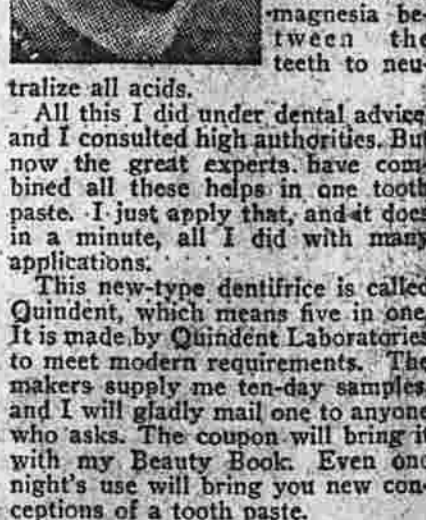

Heart of Montparnasse Is Home of Great Artists

Paris.—It has been attacked bit-terly by its enemies.

The witty arrows of dozens of writers have been sped against it.—But Montparnasse is still the center of the world of art.

Montparnasse is that section of Paris bounded roughly by the Avenue de la Observatoire and the Rue de Rennes on one side and by the Seine and the Avenue de Orleans on the other.

The Carrefour Vanin, where the Boulevards Raspail and Montparnasse meet, is the pulsing heart of Paris' art center. In this district cluster the cafes and studios of art students from the world over.

And seated under the gaily striped awnings which shade the Terraces of the Cafe du Dome, the Rotonde and the Select, it is the nations of the world, the writers, the painters and the sculptors from everywhere.

American Favorites
The Cafes Dome and Rotonde are favorites with the Americans. The Dome is frequented by the artists, students and literary folk, who gather on its terrace in the mornings for their cup of cafe creme (so-called) and to discuss the latest gossip of the Quarter.

The Rotonde, on the other hand, is the night-time rendezvous of those tourists in search of atmosphere, whom at the same time like to season it with luxury. An expensive dinner, an "almost" jazz orchestra and a smooth dancing floor is offered after Bohemia, and they go home after several hours of this wild life of the Latin Quarter with "something to write home about."

Perhaps on their way they have glimpsed a few members of the "Horde of Montparnasse," a group of painters who make the Rotonde their headquarters. Many of these artists are quaintly garbed. Their beards and flowing locks would cause a sensitive barber to faint. Now and then the "Horde" holds a grand reunion, sometimes to have the frame and at others just out of sheer exuberance of spirits.

The reunion parade is invariably led by Grawovsky, the cowboy of Montparnasse, who, although he has never seen America, has adopted the picturesque dress of our Western cowboy, even to the spurs.

They Never Cross
Meanwhile from the opposite side of the street the "Domers" look on, if at all, with an indulgent smile. While the two camps are only a few yards apart, they might well be separated by oceans. "East is east and west is west, and never the twain shall meet."

One may, upon occasion, drop into any of the tiny French bars in the Quarter or sometimes into the "Chez Vikings" where the descendants of the Norsemen hold their nightly revels, but never by any chance would one be found in the rival cafe.

In the evenings the cognoscenti desert their beloved Dome for the Bar de Diane, around the corner on the Rue Delambre. Here one orders real American food and drinks, sits on tall stools around the bar, or sits about the piano.

At 2 o'clock, when the genial Dutch proprietor closes up shop, the party is adjourned to the Cafe Select, on the corner of the Rue Vavin, which is open all night.

Between its morning croissant and its dinner aperitif, the Quarter is seemingly deserted. The Quarter is at work.

Among the best known of the painters may be mentioned Picasso, the leader of the ultra modernist school; Fujita, the famous Japan-

ese illustrator; Howard Simon, the young etcher; Jerry Bloom, a New Yorker celebrated for his portraits, while two well known painters from Philadelphia, who are making their marks in the art world are Tommy Jones and Howard Ashton Patterson.

The best known of the sculptors is the great Brancusi, followed at a modest distance by Roy Sheldon, and Gwen le Gallienne, daughter of the famous poet and sister of the actress, Eva le Gallienne.

Literary Men
The literary number among their ranks such well-known names as that of the poet Ezra Pound, Cheever Dunning, the promising young poet Charles Norman, and last but not least, Conrad Bercovici, whose tales of gipsy life have found a wide and appreciative audience in America.

The latest recruit in the musical world, this side of the Atlantic, is the poet Ezra Pound. He has written an opera based on the life of Francois Villon, using that eminent Bohemian's verses for the libretto, while his inspiration for the music came from the songs of medieval troubadours, which he found in French museums, inscribed upon old parchments.

The youngest American composer, as well as one of the most promising, is George Antheil, whose "Ballet Mechanique" lately caused a profound sensation in the musical circles of Paris. Damrosch calls this unassuming young man as America's greatest composer and will present Antheil's "Symphony in F" in New York this winter, while Stokowski will present it in Philadelphia.

Julian Freedman, who has just completed his latest work, an opera entitled "The Earthen Flute," which will be produced in Paris this winter, is another important musical figure of the Quarter.

Your Income Tax

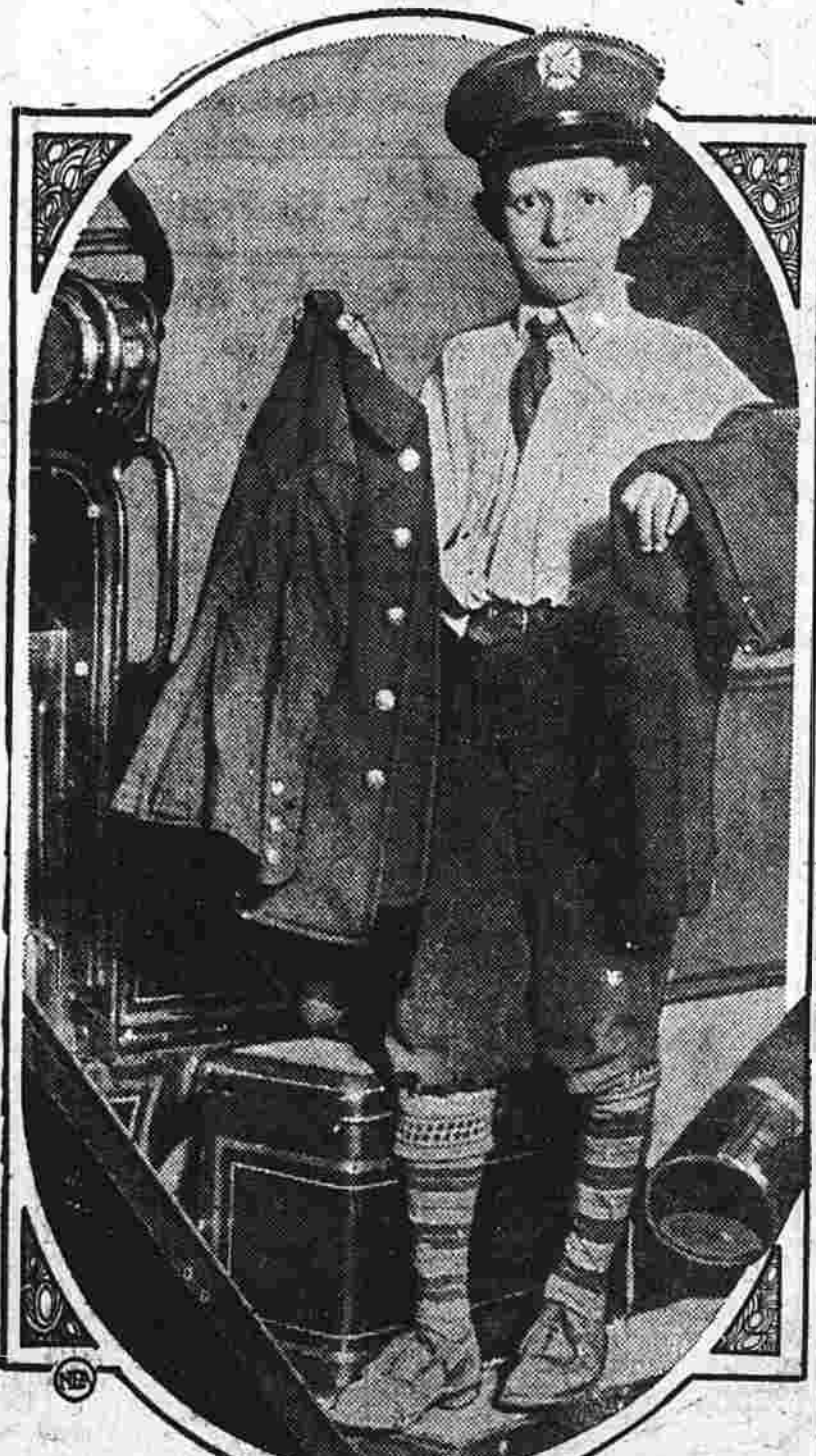
Under certain conditions, living quarters, food, clothing, etc. provided employees are not regarded as income. Where, for example, because of the location and nature of the work it is necessary that employees engaged in fishing, logging, or canning be furnished board and lodging by their employer, such board and lodging are considered as contributed for the convenience of the employer. Therefore, their value need not be included in computing the net income of the employee. The rule applies to board and lodging furnished seamen.

The value of board and lodging furnished hospital employees is to be returned as income unless the employee is subject to duty at any time during the 24 hours of a day and therefore is required to accept quarters and meals at the hospital in addition to his regular compensation.

The rental value of a dwelling "and appurtenances thereof" furnished a minister of the gospel is exempt from income tax.

The value of quarters furnished Army and Navy officers, members of the Coast Guard, the Coast and Geodetic Survey, and Public Health Service, or amounts received as commutation of quarters by such officers or members, do not constitute taxable income.
