Dirty Work At Crossroads In Boys' Plane Contest

Dark Conspirators Use the Well Known Fib to Get a Peek at Model of Rivals and Swipe Their Ideas.

Not all the stealing of plans and specifications occur in the movies or in the Nick Carter books, according to James Dowd of the West Side playground, who is conducting the airplane model contest which will be held on Thursday of next week. Boys who have entered the contest have been found guilty of attempting to swipe the plans of other entries through an ingenious ruse.

The case came to light when one of a pair of boys who are collaborating on a model asked Mr. Dowd why he had sent two other lads down to their workshop to look over their model plane. Mr. Dowd said he had done nothing of the sort. Then it came out that the boys had gone there entirely "on their own" with the object of examining the model plane and using some of the plans themselves.

Dark Plotting. The boys came to the workshop and told the other two boys that they had been sent down by the director of the playground. The owners of the plane were skeptical at first but finally allowed their visitors to examine the model. One of the boys, however, maintained that Mr. Dowd had not sent the boys down and his suspicions were borne out when he asked the director about it.

The airplane exhibit is scheduled for Thursday of next week at the West Side playground when the models will be placed on exhibition. Competent judges will pass on the models and will award prizes for the best smaller plane, best larger plane and for the best plane in the exhibit.

It is understood that a number of boys have been constructing model planes which they will enter. The contest is open not only to south end boys but also to boys from all parts of Manchester.

The models do not have to fly in order to be placed in the exhibit.

THIRTY WINS IN YEAR. It has been a long time since a major league pitcher has been able to win 30 ball games in a season.

Charlie Root of the Chicago Cubs is the only hurler who has a fair chance to turn the trick this year.

Root Has Chance. Despite the remarkable ball which Root has pitched for the Cubs this year his chance to reach the mark is just a remote one.

While the chance is rather remote, Root can make the grade if he continues to pitch in the home stretch as he has in the first 100 games of the season.

To win 30 ball games a pitcher must get more than his share of the breaks. He must be well backed in the field and at the bat.

The season of 1920 when Bagby won 31 games, showed perhaps a dozen other pitchers equally effective.

Then there is another feature of the breaks in luck that helps, it is with you. I have in mind the role of pinch pitcher.

Root in order to win 30 ball games this year must continue to get such breaks as Bagby did as the starting pitcher and as Rommel did if he is used in relief roles.

ALL-METAL AIR BOAT IS BUILT IN ENGLAND TAKES 5 PASSENGERS

London—A new all-metal air boat, claimed to be the fastest flying ship of its size in the world and capable of remaining in the air for 14 hours, has recently been constructed by the Blackburn Aeroplane Company here.

The chief feature of this new air-ship is the all-metal hull, which not only is lighter than a wooden hull but save a water soakage of 600 pounds. The hull also takes the place of floats on a seaplane. Iris II, as the plane is called, is not a

seaplane but a flying ship. Driven by three Rolls-Royce "Condor" engines, developing 2,100 horsepower, the ship can take off from the water for flight at 50 knots.

The navigator's cockpit, with every equipment, is similar to the captain's cabin in a sea-going vessel. There is a separate accommodation for the wireless operator. The ship is so constructed that it can cruise on the water or remain at its moorings for nine

CREDIT MEN TO FIGHT FRAUD IN BANKRUPTCIES

National Ass'n. Has Fund of \$1,000,000 to Battle Professional Cheats.

Tulsa, Okla.—As a result of the growing "profession" of bankruptcy in businesses throughout the United States...

The fund is to be apportioned to the various branches of the organization, as it is needed, and a special prosecutor will be appointed to assist the branch managers in preparing their cases for court.

The greatest crime to combat in bankruptcy cases is probably the concealment of assets. This is exemplified in the case of Floyd Conrod, Okla., merchant, now serving a term in the Leavenworth Federal penitentiary for conspiracy.

Conrod filed a petition in bankruptcy when, according to his friends, business seemed to be exceedingly good. A receiver appointed to take over the case went immediately to the store and found it with very little merchandise on hand.

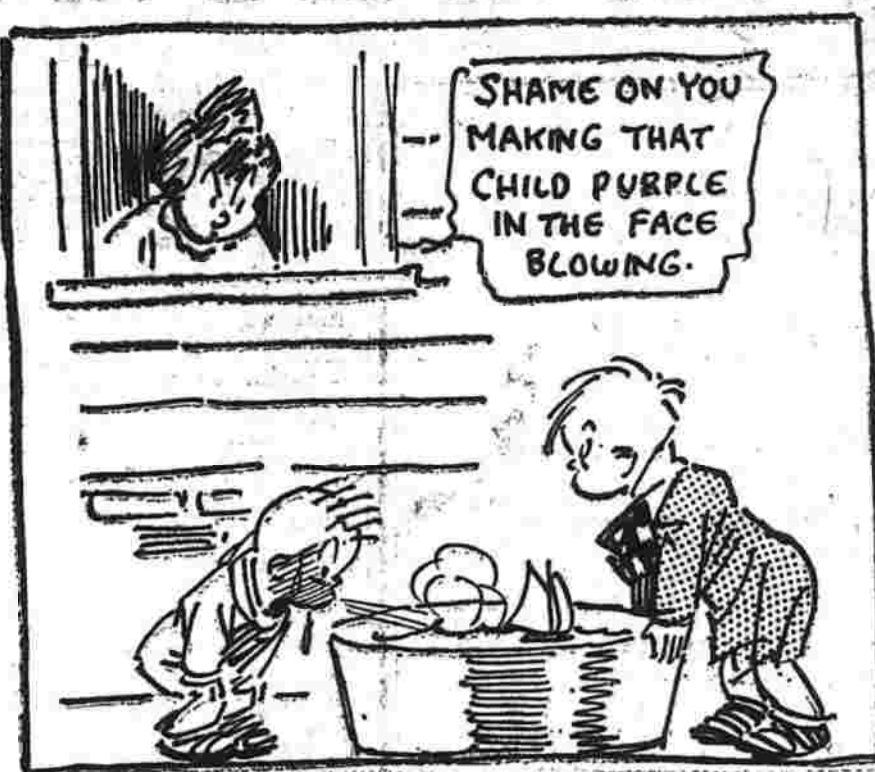

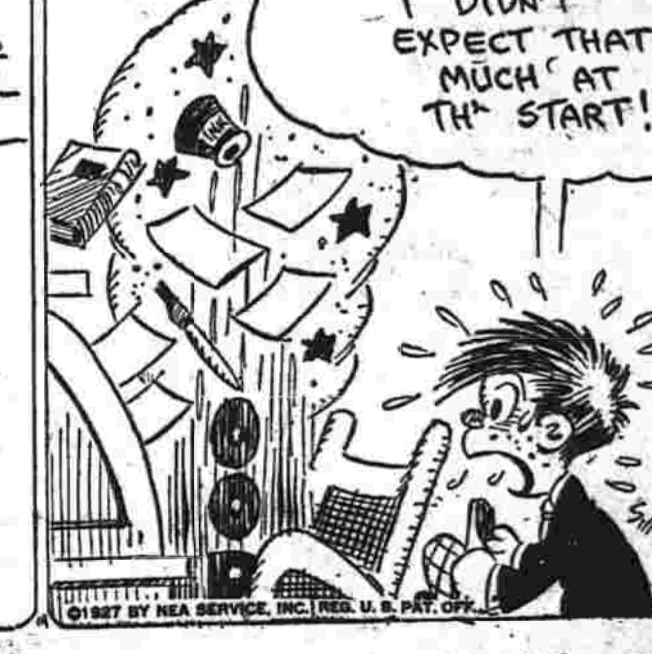
