

INCREASING INTEREST SHOWN

Model Home Now Going On Rapidly

The Herald Elizabeth Park Model Home is now taking definite shape with the placing of the framing and the rough sheathing. Doors and windows are beginning to show where they will be located and the end of the week will see the rafters in place and roof in readiness for the roofing material.

Contractor George Forbes has a sizeable force of men working. If one is interested, he will find it worth his while to follow the progress of the house from now on. It is certainly well built and is illustrating this fact by pointing out for instance that all partition framing carrying the second floor loads and above are carried directly through the first floor and are seated on the main sills. This is the best type of construction and insures the least possible settlement and deformation. One of the main sills is cut near the center to allow for the fireplace and chimney and where the building code would require only one lally column to carry each end of cut sill, two lally columns will be used, which means cutting the sills right in two and insuring a very substantial beam.

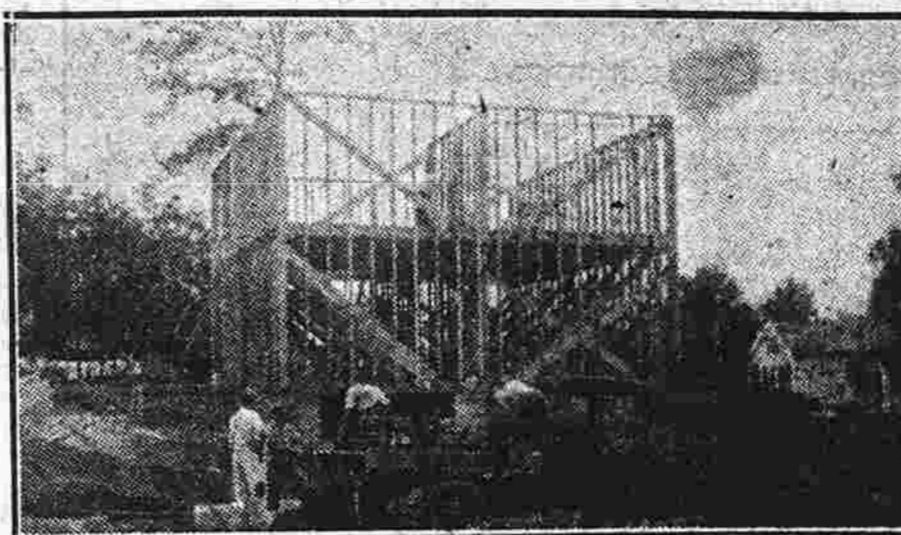
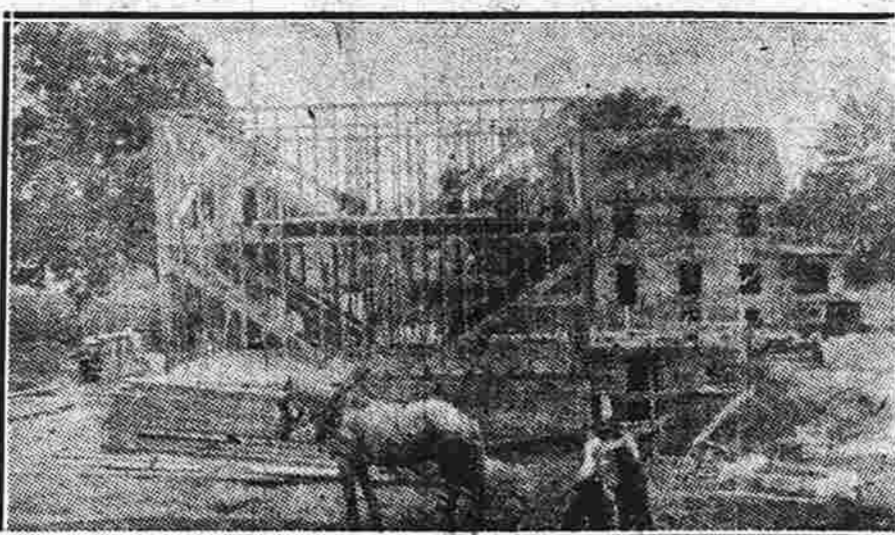
Basement Cleared
The basement has been cleared of debris and has been graded preparatory to concreting the floor.

Mason Contractor John Mahoney is at work building the fireplace and chimney and his men are engaged in the construction of a retaining wall on either side of the entrance to the garage in the basement. These walls are being built of field stone, laid up in neat cement mortar and will add much to the appearance of the east elevation of the house, being far superior to a plain concrete wall. Grading is proceeding in the rear of the house and can be finished for the most part as soon as the retaining walls around the garage approach are done.

Water Main
A 6 inch water main which is being installed under the direction of Superintendent Charles Loomis of the Manchester Water Company is nearly done. An 8 inch sewer is being put in at the present time by the Elgin School and Utilities district under the supervision of President F. A. Sweet.

In commenting on this work, Mr. Smith said that he was greatly pleased at the rapidity of the work and believed that they had made a record job in the laying of both water and sewer pipe. The Manchester Gas Company will follow with the laying of gas pipe soon and as soon as these public utilities are laid, Paul Brandt will start laying nearly a mile of concrete sidewalks in the tract.

LAUNDRY TRAYS GIVE MORE EASE

Adjustable in Height, May Be Put Away From Walls; The Modern Method.

Carrying out the spirit of modernity expressed in the model basement, new laundry trays, intended for installation away from the wall so the washing machine may be used at either end or side, have recently been placed on the market. These so-called four-way trays have the convenience of the new styled bath fixtures in point of ease in use and wholesome attractiveness.

They are adjustable when installed, making it possible to regulate their height according to the requirements of the person to use them, an important factor in eliminating fatigue. Enduring white enamel finish makes them easy to clean. Their position, away from the wall, eliminates pockets liable to collect dirt.

The new trays are symmetrical in shape and projections inside have been eliminated to remove the annoyance of having clothes catch on faucets are placed above the tray and totally outside.

Faucets are of the chromium-plated type, equipped with a swinging spout which tempers the water and fills both compartments. Below this spout is a connection and valves for filling the washing machine, which can easily be rolled entirely around the tubs and placed in any position desired for wringing or washing.

The enamel with which they are finished is declared to be impervious to the action of cleansers and minerals in the water.

COLOR SCHEMES FOR THE MODERN KITCHEN

Washable paint finishes have been a boon to housewives for a number of years. Who shall say that the decorative qualities of these same labor-saving paint finishes are any less valuable because they lighten the heart, cheer the soul and make working conditions pleasant? The difference between working in a dingy, dark kitchen painted a dull olive green and in one where sunshiny, yellow walls and old blue woodwork are a joy to the eye as well as a boon to the dust cloth, is partly psychological and partly practical—but one which often marks the happy housewife from one who is disgruntled and discontented.

The sanitary importance of using paint or enamel finishes in the kitchen cannot be over-emphasized, since paint affords no food for vermin or bacteria. It is smooth, hard surface collects the minimum of

dust and germs, which can be wiped off easily with a damp cloth. To make doubly sure the walls may be thoroughly washed. Pipes, cabinets and cupboards should all be painted or enameled so as to present smooth, washable surfaces to be cleaned. The floors, of course, should be well varnished or painted and varnished.

This is the practical aspect of the question, but the psychological side, and the aesthetic, too, should have consideration. When you use paint for sanitary reasons you are using, at the same time, the most flexible of decorative mediums. It is just as cheap, just as easy, and equally as sanitary to paint your kitchen walls primrose color as it is to paint them white, or some dark color that is depressing. It costs no more to make your kitchen attractive than it does to make it an efficient workshop.

Here are some color schemes for kitchens that may be taken as a starting point. The kitchen is not the exhibition room, where calls come to visit, and criticism, so to say, it may combine any colors that the housewife may desire. It's her room. If it pleases her to work amid a riot of red and purple, it is her privilege to do so. Walls may be a warm gray, almost a buff, with woodwork of a rich color. Green combines well with apricot, so why not have the inside of cupboards painted Midas or lettuce green, and the kitchen chairs and table set with black. With gay curtains of green and white gingham, this would make a kitchen that would be a joy forever. Another suggestion is to have walls ivory with trim of mustard color enameled with sage and beige brown, while furniture and woodwork are painted bright Chinese red. A cool green kitchen trimmed with peacock blue, mauve or apricot, or one of sunshine yellow trimmed with jasper green and bright orange would help considerably to alleviate the dreariness of dish washing, potato peeling and the hundred and one uninteresting tasks that befall the housewife.

LUMBER CO. CLOSES BIG \$500,000 DEAL

Sells 39 Houses to Springfield Syndicate; Located in Three Towns.

As told in the Herald several days ago the Manchester Lumber Company, owning thirty-nine different pieces of property in Hartford, West Hartford and East Hartford, has had under consideration the sale of these properties to a Springfield, Mass., syndicate.

This deal which involved about a half a million dollars, was closed this week, the sale being completed through the agency of Aubrey Maddock, a former newspaper man of Westley, R. I. and Hartford and now engaged in the real estate business in Hartford.

The properties include twelve single houses, twenty-three family houses and three three-family houses. There is also one six-family house.

The houses that were sold to the Springfield men were bought by the latter as an investment and are to be resold. Three of these properties are located in West Hartford, eleven in East Hartford and the remainder in Hartford.

Roof Of A Building Is Most Important

Last week we discussed factors concerning both the inside and outside of your house. Let's go to the top of the building and give a bit of consideration to roofs. In the first place the pitch of a roof is the determining factor in the life of the roof's surface. A flat pitch means a poor roof and means that whatever type of roofing may be used will wear out much sooner. Roofs should have sufficient pitch to have moisture and water drain rapidly.

Tin roofs were very popular at one time for dwellings, but people soon found out that they attracted a great deal of heat and that they were easily punctured, which of course meant a leak and when they became old they were unsatisfactory because of rusting within and without and that soldering or patching holes was an endless task.

Slate roofs have been used more or less extensively on the so-called mansion type of house. Slate roofs require heavier framing than any other type of roof and will also attract more heat.

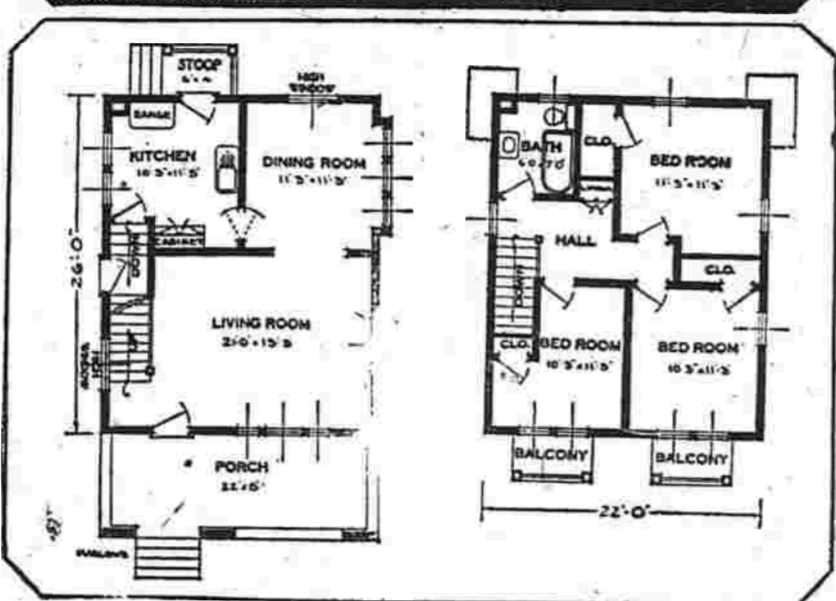
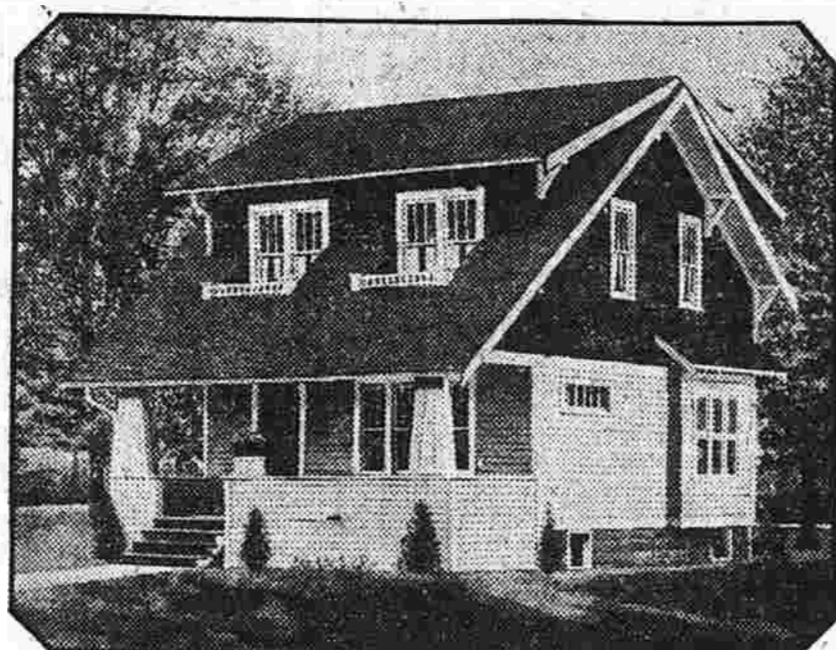

Cypress Shingles Going back to the wood shingles, there is a type cut from cypress grown in the southwestern part of the country that is said to give a hundred years' wear. As you know, cypress grows in swamps and bogs and the only wood known to thrive in water, and even after it is cut and manufactured it will continue to resist moisture and rotting. These cypress shingles are cut heavier and thicker in every dimension than the average shingle, but when laid up as either siding or roofing have a very pleasing effect, and has been said before, are claimed by the manufacturer to last one hundred years. The cost of this type of shingle is in excess of the ordinary cedar shingle of the best grade and more than the fire resisting or fire-proof manufactured shingle.

NEW BUILDING SETS JUNE PEAK

Total Expenditures Second Largest Ever Reported, Says Dodge Corporation.

Record June building operations, with an expenditure of \$550,466,200, the second highest monthly total in history, was reported today by the F. W. Dodge Corp. in a survey of construction activity in thirty-seven Eastern States. It showed a gain of 2 per cent over the total for June, 1927, but was slightly less than 2 1/2 per cent below the preceding month's contracts.

Plans were laid during the month for \$1,030,095,000 additional work being 41 per cent above the June, 1927, total. The volume of new construction started since January 1 also established a record at \$3,444,867,700, showing an increase of 8 per cent over the first half of 1927.

New York Operations-Gain New York State and Northern New Jersey broke all previous June records in the total construction awards with the \$175,908,000, or almost \$800,000 greater than the amount reported in June last year. In the first half of this year \$933,713,600 new stock was started in this district, a 9 per cent gain over the same period of 1927.

New England reported the second largest June contract total on record and an increase of 21 per cent for the six months; the Middle Western states set a new mark for the month, central West the second largest, while small gains were indicated in the southeastern and southern areas.

A drop of 7 per cent from last year was reported by the Northwestern states.

A two-way smokehood, part of the equipment which comes with the boilers, allows vertical or horizontal chimney connection, thus permitting placing the boiler close to the chimney, with consequent saving in floor space and bettered draught conditions. No damper is required in the flue connection, as the smoke hood contains both choke and check dampers.

Engineering design, in the new boilers extracts every possible heat unit from the burning gases before their exhaust into the chimney, thus resulting in fuel economy. Regulating valves permit of close adjustment and easy control of room temperature.

SUMMER HEAT BARRED BY MODERN LINOLEUM

It won't be a great while now before the movie palaces are advertising delightfully cool temperature to be enjoyed behind their gilded portals. The "It's not the heat, it's the humidity" days will be here soon, turning fancy to thoughts of iced drinks and electric fans.

When the sultry weather strikes, happens in the average home? Does it remain "ten degrees cooler, inside?" Not as a rule, unless shades are kept drawn and windows tightly closed all day. But who wants to be shut in that way when a bright sun rides in a gloriously blue sky? Of course, rugs can be taken up, furniture and lamps put in slip-covers, and other means

taken to make rooms look cooler. Yet the actual temperature has a stubborn way of remaining uncomfortable. But it seems that there is now a way out. For interior decorators have discovered that modern linoleum installed in a room keeps the temperature down. The explanation is that linoleum, being largely composed of cork, does not absorb heat as readily as other materials. Thus, on a hot day, linoleum remains comparatively cool, quite noticeably so to those who come in from the street. Certain linoleum designs contribute coolness to a room... jasper linoleum for instance, a two-toned, stratified design in cool shades of taupe, blue, green brown, and gray. Bedrooms in particular are improved by this type of floor. There are many other linoleum designs which help you bear the summer's heat.

Girls play an amazing part in the day's news. Here's Mrs. Sylvia Thurston, just 17, who killed Doris Wentworth, 16, out in Missoula, Mont., the other day. The girl in jail was married at 15. The two girls, another girl and three boys went joy-riding. One girl came back dead to the morgue. The other came back with a discharged revolver to jail. The rest of the crowd explained that the girls quarreled and said they'd get out of the car "to settle it." They did.

QUESTIONS. Where are the parents of a girl who elopes and is married at 15? What of the husband if the girl runs off nights joy-riding with other youths? What of the gun carried by a 17-year-old Mrs.? Everything should have pointed toward disaster to parents, husband, anyone who should have seen it and who, by not doing so, is as much to blame as the girl.

AND ERNA. Then there's Erna-Janoschek, 17, of Oakland, Cal. "The Girl Hickman." Erna playfully strangled to death a year-old baby whom she was hired to watch over. She explained that the baby's mother didn't treat her right and she was getting even. Erna laughs about it, which is why they call her the "Girl Hickman." But singling out these isolated cases and stringing them together as a reflection on all modern girls would be a most asinine thing to do! It's what many a writer and preacher does these days, however.

ON "OLD-MAIDS." And still speaking of girls, Professor Kimball Young of the pedagogical department of the University of Wisconsin insists that "old maids" have no business teaching school. "They tend to be sour and over-sentimental," he says.

For my part I think a male teacher so obsolete that he uses the word "old maids" and clings to the idea that the mere fact of lack of marriage spoils a personality, has no business teaching even the science of education to adult students.

POLLY'LL PREACH. Miss Pauline Rader, just 21 and freshly graduated, the daughter of Evangelist Paul Rader of Chicago, is on her way to India to convert the heathen. We hope that Miss Rader, aged 21, has a sufficiently rich background of experience and wisdom to tell some wized health-lesson of 80 or so just what ails him and just what he needs to do! Youthful preachers at home or abroad rather nauseate me! People have no business to preach till they have lived a little at least!

Mrs. Richard Byrd, she says herself, has never had her picture taken with her husband since his explorations and feats of aviation made him a national figure. "Why should I intrude in his glory?" she is supposed to have said. Which is an attitude very like that of Mrs. Lindbergh who most reluctantly shared honors with her son. And yet Mrs. Byrd proves how real a right she has to share in those honors when she admits that she has never objected to any of her explorer husband's several-year trips, because "that's his job and no woman can keep her man from his job with any real good to herself."

There something there which tells one that Richard Byrd's courage and clear vision necessary for an aviator and explorer are balanced with similar qualities at home.

It is, of course, possible to produce a sudden rise in the blood pressure by injecting various drugs which have the power to contract the blood vessels, and which raise the pressure in the arteries. But the pressure in a garden hose may be raised by constricting the hose.

That the height of the blood pressure may be influenced by various glandular secretions or by changes associated with the gland that take place in the human organism is evidenced by the fact that many women reaching the age of 45 and 50 develop intermittent rises in the blood pressure associated with the changes that go on in the bodies at that time. The blood pressure does not remain at a high level, however, but tends to come down.

With Other Diseases. Rises in the blood pressure are, of course, also associated with many diseases indirectly related to the blood vessels as, for example, inflammations of the kidneys, enlargement or over-functioning of the thyroid gland, and certain forms of heart disease.

Beyond all of these there is a form of high blood pressure or hypertension which seems to come on without any definitely established cause. The changes associated with increasing age are found in many persons with this disorder.

This form of high blood pressure is called primary or essential hypertension. The chief condition associated with high blood pressure is a certain amount of change in the blood vessel walls.

You see, I have been having company. Cousins Grace and Mabel have been here since last Friday, and I have been very busy entertaining them. As you know, this is rather difficult.

Their lives are absolutely empty, in spite of good incomes, a comfortable home, and no pressing worries. They seem to me to have missed everything important in life, and not to know what they missed.

They would consider that sacrilegious, even though they have great trouble keeping help, and that old place is inconvenient and hard to keep up.

Grace would like to adopt a child, but Mabel thinks that would be more than they could tackle between them. So they just continue to live on, in the least eventful fashion, making as much effort over buying a new coat or a new range as the average woman would bring up a family.

I think in the future there will be fewer such tragic figures among middle-aged women, because the young people today have more curiosity and courage, and more of a sense of the importance of achievement.

They send their love to you, and were much interested in your life in the city. And encouragement from you doubtless would bring them for a visit. I think it would be kind of you to invite them to your home some day. A little life would do them good.

HINTS ON HOW TO KEEP WELL by World Famed Authority

HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE IS DIVIDED INTO THREE TYPES. Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of three articles on one of the most prevalent illnesses of the day, high blood pressure. Tomorrow: Its Insidious Approach.

By DR. MORRIS FISHBEN. Editor Journal of the American Medical Association and of Hygeia, the Health Magazine. In a recent consideration of the causes of high blood pressure based on an examination after death of 420 cases, Drs. E. T. Bell and B. J. Clawson of the department of pathology of the University of Minnesota divided the cases into three types.

There are those in which the rise of blood pressure is sudden and transitory, those in which the rise comes and goes repeatedly, and those in which it is permanent.

Emotional Reaction. A sudden rise in the blood pressure may follow emotional disturbances, such as fear, anxiety, anger, or worry; may be associated with severe pain, such as accompanies the acute onset of many diseases, or may be associated with unusual physical exertion.

It is believed that sudden rises in the blood pressure of this nature may be a part of some disturbance in the adjustments of the circulation of the blood. In most instances, however, an acute rise in the blood pressure which disappears promptly is of little significance.

DON'T SAY "DON'T"; IT KILLS INITIATIVE. "Don't" is a very good word in the family vocabulary, but like blue, a little bit of it goes a great way.

Mothers are well aware of the wisdom of its use as well as the futility, but they keep on saying "Don't do this," and "Don't do that," because they know no other way to handle an undesirable situation.

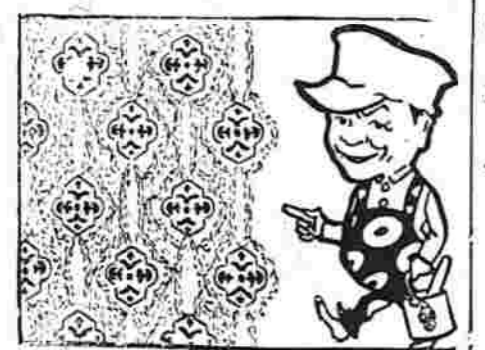
Archibald Sessions spends two days with local man's Antipodean relatives.

NEXT WEDNESDAY STORES' DAY OFF

Annual "Merchants Day" Now Individual Holiday; No Joint Outing Planned.

Next Wednesday will be Merchants' Day, the "day off" of the folks in all retail lines, when the stores will be closed all day. The holiday, falling on a Wednesday according to the agreed schedule for the retail stores of Manchester and filed with the Chamber of Commerce, will not affect the regular routine of the retail stores other than that they will not open Wednesday morning. They will close as usual Tuesday night.

At one time Merchants' Day was an event that was looked forward to by the retail merchants of the town and their clerks with much anticipation. Two or three weeks before the event groups of business men would be found gathering in the different stores discussing the plans for the day for they then celebrated the holiday as a body. The committee that looked up the most suitable place to hold the merchants' outing usually consisted of O. F. Toop, Arthur Hultman and N. B. Richards.

About four or five weeks before the date set for the outing this committee made the rounds of the various shore and lake resorts talking to the proprietors of restaurants and hotels and getting estimates on a dinner for about 500 guests. The proprietors, as a rule, had the committee sample their dinners. By the time the committee had decided on a place for the outing they had dined at practically every worth while shore resort within reasonable distance of Manchester.

Then the big day came. Bright and early, say about 6 o'clock, the merchants and their co-workers would gather on Main street near Park, line up and with much horn blowing and shouting, like a gang of kids on a picnic, the party would start for the resort where the outing was to be held. Those days are gone and today the Merchants' Day is merely a holiday on which store people as individuals, or frequently as groups, make trips to the beaches and lakes, or what will they. The loss of interest in the one big outing is attributed to the automobile, and the premium it puts on individual outing activities.
