HOOVER PLANS REAL RELIEF FOR FARMERS

Nominee of G. O. P. to Incorporate it in His Acceptance Speech-Meets Grain Belt Leaders.

Aboard Hoover Special, Enroute to Palo Alto, Cal., July 19 .- Herbert Hoover will present a specific farm relief program to American agriculture in his speech accepting the Republican presidential nomination at Palo Alto, Calif., August 11, it was learned today on good

authority. Hoover will pledge himself to devote his best administrative efforts toward solving the problem, show that he recognizes agriculture as the basic industry of the country propose immediate relief through the development of inland waterways, the adjustment of freight rates on farm products and the orderly marketing of surpluses with government aid without invok-

ing the equalization fee. This much was revealed as the Hoover Special rolled down out of the Rockies; and left the green farm problem.

Farm Company Hoover had farm company clear across the western prairies. First Gov. John H. Hammill, of Iowa came aboard, talked farm problems to him and called him the next Then, Gov. Adam McMullen, the Nebraska Insurgent, joined the nominee. McMullen declared Hoover safely Republican, along with the

rest of the farm belt states. A slightly different problem conwestern mountain ranges. Wyoming, Gov. Frank D. Emerson told him of the cattle industry's 6 problems, all closely linked to those of the wheat and corn states.

Emerson boarded the train last night at Cheyenne. The nominee was to hear more of this problem on reaching Ogden, today, where Gov. Fred B. Balzar, of Utah, will meet l.im.



The town appropriates a fixed sum for the general care of the cemetery but this appropriation does not provide for the care of individual lots, The sexton of the cemetery will take care of a lot for the small sum of \$3 a year, that is, he will keep it mowed and in a respectable condition. By depositing \$100 with the town treasurer the town will give any lot perpetual

In many towns of the state cemetery associations are formed to take care of this work. Some time prior to the death of Judge H. O. Bowers there was talk of organizing such an association by men and women interested in the Buckland cemetery. The judge and his brother, the late Senator Arthur E. Health and Diet Advice

HEALTH DIVIDENDS (11) Continuing our discussion of Realth Dividends" from yester-

In order to explain to you in very definite way just what I consider a good regime for a successful life, I am going to give you some instructions which, if carefully observed and followed, will undoubtedly be helpful.

Upon arising in the morning it is a good plan to take about ten minutes time to perform some vigorous calisthenics. Do these exeriges before an open window (in which the neighbors are not looking) and then take a cold shower bath after you have become thoroughly warmed with the exercises.

Your breakfast should consist of one or two eggs prepared in any manner except by frying, two or three pieces of Melba toast, which is prepared by cutting white bread one-fourth of an inch thick and toasting it in the oven until it is a golden brown all the way through This toast should not be buttered until it is to be eaten. In addition you may choose one of the following stewed fruits: prunes, pears, apricots, figs, raisins, peaches, or ripe figs. Use only the pure, sundried, unsulphured fruits. An average of five prunes or an equal quantity of the other foods is sufficient to obtain the greatest value. These fruits must be prepared and served without cream or sugar, except the ripe figs on which you may have a little cream but no sugar. After eating, it is tetter to spend a few minutes in relaxation or reading some light literature such as the morning paper. I am not, by any means predicting that Gene is going to lose his championship to Tom Heeney, but my observation of his training methods for the past three days. forces me to make the statement that for an athlete as intelligent as he is supposed to be, Tunney knows very little about diet rules which are so essentially important to scientific physical training.
