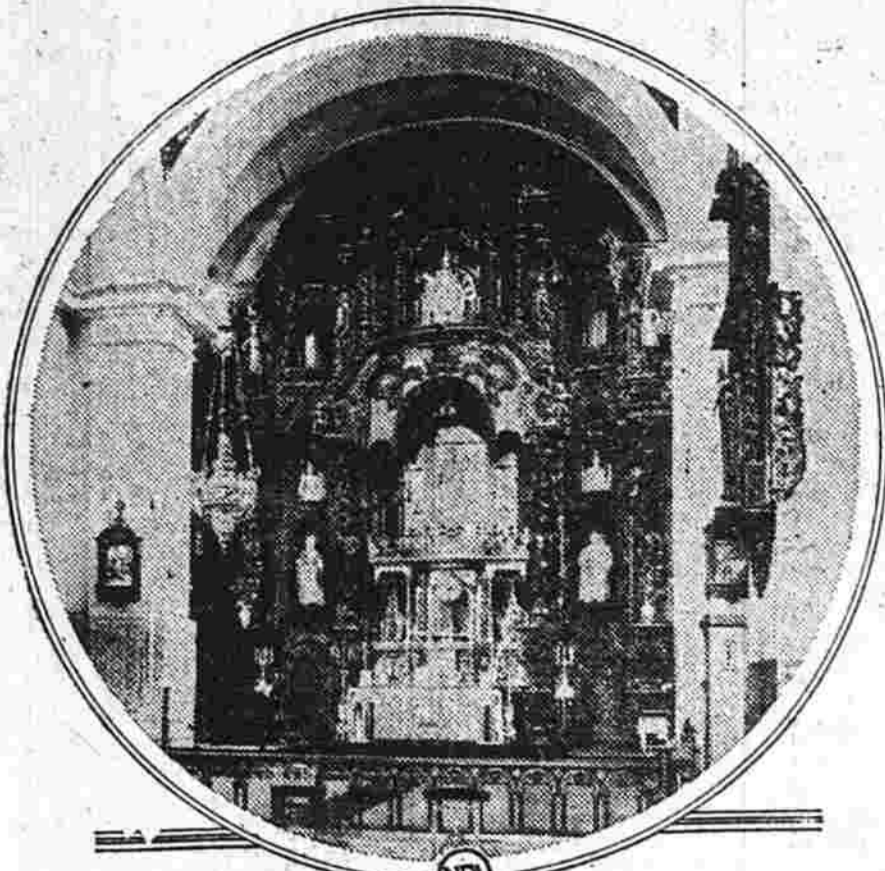


Old Spanish Spirit Lingers In Lima, But North American Influence Gains

Washington, Jan. 15.—In Lima remain more than traces of ancient Spanish rule, but the stamp of North America is being ever more deeply impressed as the diversified infiltration of American capital and American trade continues to increase.



Lima, Peru, is becoming North Americanized socially and commercially, but the old world background still is there. This photograph of the sanctuary of the church of San Marcelo recalls early Spanish influences.

Some of us in the Hoover party stepped from the centuries-old cathedral, largest in this hemisphere, into a street paved by contractors from the United States and enters a North American-made motor car to be driven to a North American-built hotel or country club.

Enroute to the country club, with its polo field, swimming pool, golf course and tennis club, its background of Inca ruins and its Swiss servants who speak French, German and English, one passes over splendid American-made boulevards and highways through replicas of our own suburban developments, with their houses made of adobe brick but for sale on the installment plan in the American fashion.

Built in U. S. Style
Earthquakes and high prices for cement and steel maintain adobe at Lima's favorite building material, but very lately some seven and eight-story buildings have actually been erected in the heart of the city. One of these is that of W. R. Grace & Company, which would be a magnificent office building in any country.

In 1920 the Foundation Company of New York made a \$50,000,000 contract with Peru for a sanitary improvement program in 30 cities, including modern water and sewer systems, new pavements and macadamized roads and so on. The Foundation Company also established a cement plant and a refrigerated warehouse, which is the only place in Lima where animals may be legally killed for consumption.

Standard Oil controls 70 per cent of Peruvian oil production. The Singer Sewing Machine Company, which has a remarkably effective organization in South America, sells to natives all over Peru on three-year payment plans. Here, as throughout Latin America, Hollywood supplies nearly all the motion pictures. Lima likes them and there are so many movie fans who attend their theater every day that programs have to be changed daily. Society attends the cinema on Saturday and Sunday.

Rose Since the War
The United States has been the dominating economic influence in Peru only since the war. Britain had that position previously. She still has the Peruvian railroads, though it was an American, Henry Melges, who built the world's highest flying railroad, which runs over 67 bridges and through 65 tunnels to a height of 15,665 feet in the Andes.

Today, American investment in Peru between 200 and 250 millions, is more than double the British. More than 40 per cent of Peru's imports come from us, only 16 per cent from Britain and nine from Germany. Her exports are more than \$100,000,000 a year, and imports around \$75,000,000, though export figures are misleading, owing to large profits taken by American investors here.

TO SUBDIVIDE HARVARD INTO SMALLER 'HOUSES'

Cambridge, Mass., Jan. 15.—In complete plans for the subdivision of Harvard University into smaller social and residential "houses," said to be one of the most radical changes in the educational policy at Harvard, and made possible by the \$3,000,000 gift of Edward S. Harkness of New York, former Yale man, were included in the annual report of President A. Lawrence Lowell, made public today.

The present plans call for the construction of two "houses" and additional "houses" will be added from time to time. Each of these so-called houses will contain about 250 students, who will it was said, represent a cross-section of the entire college, so far as regards to subjects of concentration, geographical distribution and finances.

Daily Health Service HINTS ON HOW TO KEEP WELL by World Famed Authority

COLD SORES, CHICKEN POX AND SHINGLES ARE RELATED

The disease commonly called shingles is known scientifically as herpes zoster.

A similar variety of this disease is herpes simplex, also called cold sores.

The type which occurs about the body following the root of a nerve is a more serious condition than the cold sore. In a discussion of this subject in Hygiene, Dr. Clark W. Finerud quotes the old superstition that if shingles meet the patient will die, and points out that it is probably a perfectly safe aphorism because the nature of the disease is such that shingles probably never has encircled the body in any human being.

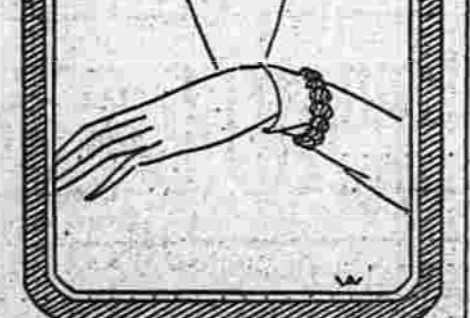
Shingles usually occurs following some infectious disease, but in many instances it is impossible to associate the condition with any definite disorder. Apparently it is associated with the infection of the root of one or more nerves which causes an inflammation of the nerve, pain, and an affection of the skin over the nerve.

The skin responds to the infection by an eruption of water blisters an inch or so wide resting on a swollen skin. The physician diagnoses the condition because the blisters are limited in their distribution to the area of skin served by a single nerve. Thus it is that the disease usually occurs only on one side of the body and not on both sides.

People with herpes zoster or shingles complain most of the burning pain in the area involved, and it is not infrequent for neuralgia to be associated with the skin eruption.

Organism Not Found There is much evidence to indicate relationship between this disease and chicken pox, but thus far the causative organism of neither disease has been discovered. Apparently the responsible organism is so small that it can be filtered through the most dense of clay filters, for this reason being called a filterable virus.

When the inflammation subsides, the shingles disappear so that the chief attention of the physician in such cases is given to keeping the person in a state of good nutrition and free from infection.
