SHOCK, WEAK HEART, CAUSED MILL DEATH

Cheney Brothers in Letter of Explanation Accept Full Responsibility as Result of Accident.

It was definitely learned last night that the death of Edward Stevenson of 21 Ridge street, 62 years old silk worker at Cheney Brothers, was due to a combination of electric shock and a weak heart.

Received 220 Volts. Another interesting development was the uncovering of the information that the motors which operate each of the looms carry 440 volts of electricity instead of 220 as first believed.

The guard had become charged with electricity. Kane was running all six of the looms, Jones rested a hand on two of the guards and the shock was sufficient to lift him completely off his feet.

Electricians Called. As soon as Jones got injured, and a call was made for electricians, Kane continued to operate the remaining four, but refrained from touching the guard adjoining the other pair of looms.

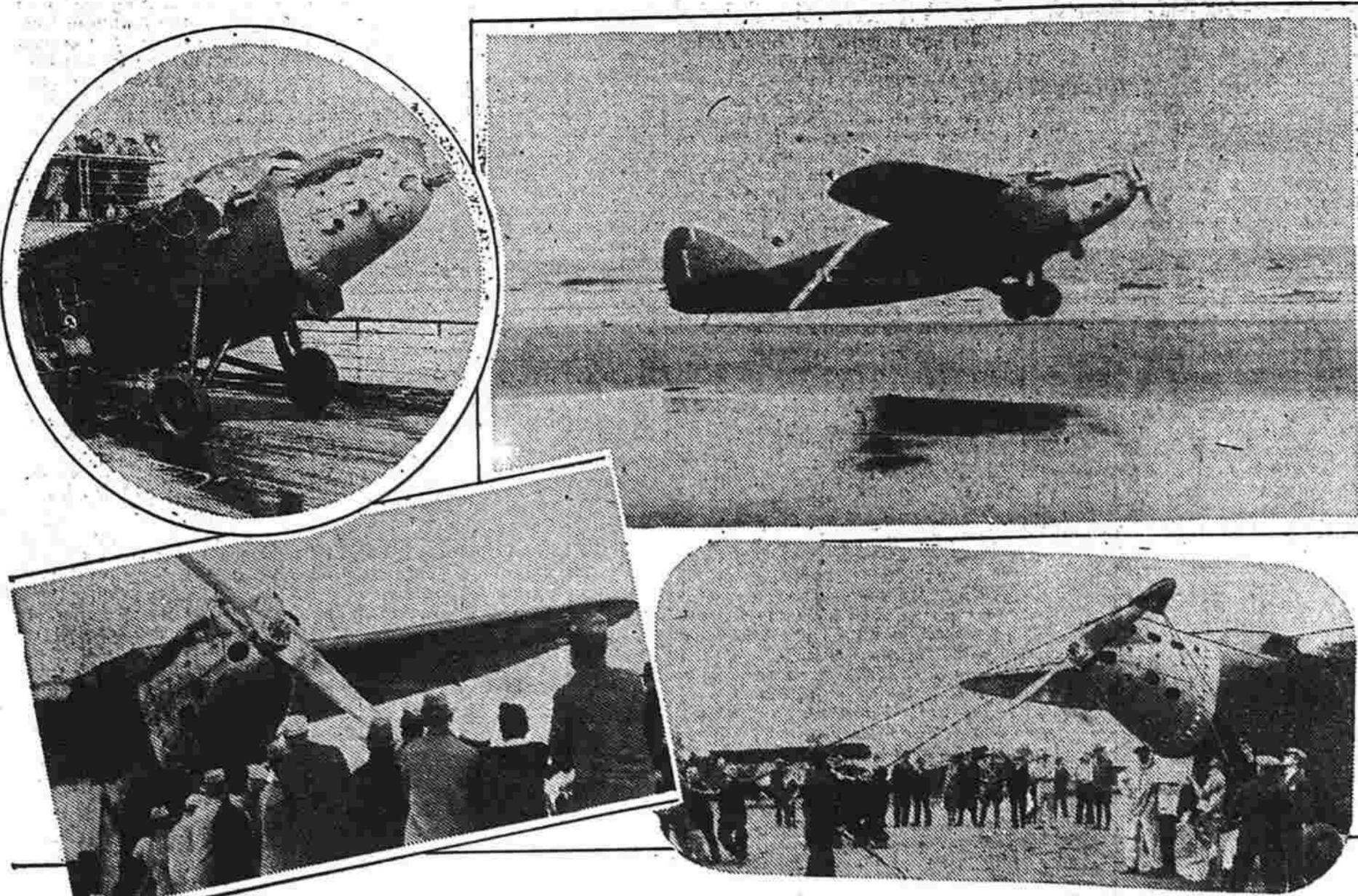
SPRINGFIELD PILOT CLAIMS HIGH MARK

Charles Antaya Pushes Light Plane to Height of 13,200 Feet in Late Afternoon Flight.

Springfield, Mass., June 15.—What is considered to be an altitude record in Springfield for a biplane powered by a 90-horse power, OX-5 motor was made just before dusk yesterday by Charles Antaya, pilot for the Northeastern Aircraft Corporation, operating at Dunn Field, Longmeadow.

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Dawes Presents His Credentials To King

Windsor, England, June 15.—General Charles Gates Dawes, United States ambassador to England, presented his credentials to King George today at Windsor Castle.

This was the first time since the beginning of his illness seven months ago that the King has received a foreign diplomat. During that time diplomats were received by Queen Mary or the Prince of Wales, acting for the monarch.

Arriving at home today, returning alumni devoted the day to keeping in shady places as the thermometer soared to unusual commencement time heights.

BORDER GUARD IS HELD FOR MURDER

International Falls, Minn., June 15.—After a secret arraignment in the sheriff's office under guard of deputies, Border Patrolman Emmett J. White of the Federal Customs force was back in the county jail today facing a more serious charge of second degree murder.

White had been scheduled to appear for a hearing Monday but the delay was granted by Judge Brown, who also is United States commissioner here, at the request of Walter Nelson, customs collector in International Falls, pending arrival of a special government attorney to conduct the defense.

Arriving to offer his services as a prosecutor, C. J. Larson, Duluth lawyer and former Congressman, commended Prosecuting Attorney David Hurlburt, for placing the murder charge against Guardsman White.

Washington, June 15.—President Hoover will sign the new farm relief bill at noon today, it was announced at the White House.

NEW BRITAIN YOUTH SNIPPER OF HAIR

Boston, Mass., June 15.—Saved from a crowd of women on a trolley car who threatened to mob him, Willard A. Mouradian, 21, Massachusetts Institute of Technology senior and son of a prominent New Britain, Conn., woman doctor, today was charged with snipping the hair of a 14-year-old girl in a subway-forest hills street car last night.

It was the second time within two weeks the college student had snipped with a small pair of scissors a hair of girls, according to his own admission, police said. When asked to explain his actions, police said he replied that he had an extreme fondness for beautiful tresses.

THOMPSONVILLE BOY DROWNS ON PICNIC

Theodore Zacc, Enfield High School Pupil, Loses Life in Crescent Lake Yesterday.

Thompsonville, June 15.—The annual picnic of the Enfield High school, which would have been the first amusement event in connection with the commencement season at the school, was transformed into a tragedy this afternoon, when one student, Theodore Zacc, was drowned and two others were injured.

BY STONES OF WALLING PLACE, JEWS RECALL TRAGIC HISTORY

The International Sunday School Lesson for June 16 is "Judah Taken Captive"—Kings 25:1-21.

Thoughtless tourists in Jerusalem regard only as a "sight" the Friday spectacle of Jews at prayer by the Western Wall, or "the Walling Place," as it is familiarly known.

Before the war only a small group of venerable eastern European Jews, some of them professionally employed for the service, could be seen mulling prayers before the few tiers of huge yellowed limestone blocks which are all that survive of the glory of Solomon's Temple.

Now crowds through the spot every Friday. Jews from every nation under heaven may be found there.

The professional prayers are submerged in the multitude, and their voices are lost in the general murmur of psalms and prayers. I have seen an alert English-speaker

Jewish people had wildly acclaimed King Saul as their King. The interval had witnessed greatness and glory in the nation, as well as sorrow and suffering and shame, according as the people had been true or recreant to Jehovah.

Pictured in strong colors, beyond any man's mistaking, the history of the Jews is an example of the relation of political prosperity to the personal character of the people. As the day's Golden Text recalls, in a familiar passage from one of the Hebrew Wisdom Books, "Righteousness exareth nation; but sin is a reproach to any people."

Morality and Greatness All sorts of folk will study this lesson and every one will read on its very surface the teaching that apart from righteousness there is no permanent prosperity. Individual morals are not an academic matter, to which the state may remain indifferent.

True, the kingdom was only God's second-best thought for the Jews. He had offered them a throne under heaven, but they had preferred a monarchy, in order to fall in with the fashions of the neighboring nations.

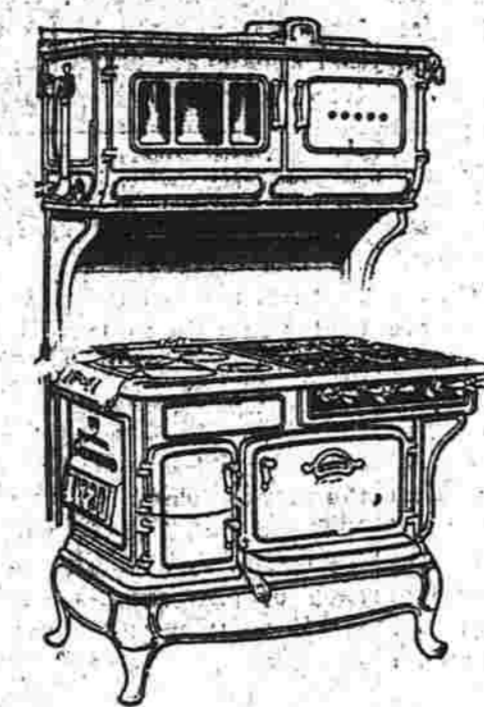

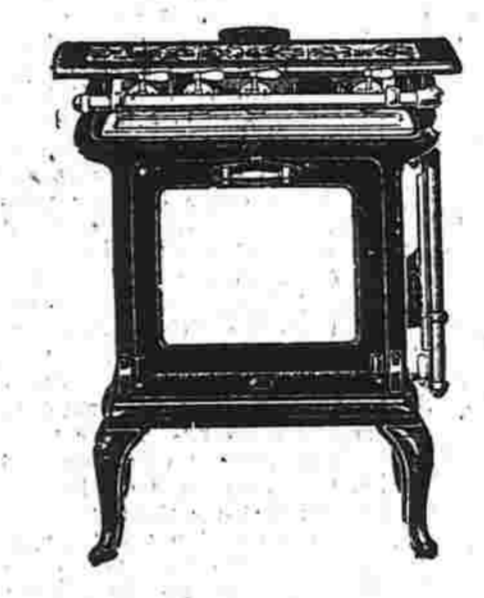

Boost Manchester--Beautiful Homes Make It A Residential City

LIVING ROOMS FORM CORE OF HOME DESIGNS

First Floor of Dwelling Is Built Around Cubicle Most Used by Family.

By WILLIAM HARMON BEERS.

Last week we discussed the planning of the second floor of the house. We will now take up the first floor.

On the first floor we will suppose our family needs first, a living room or sitting room. In large houses this room is called a drawing room because in some of the big houses in England the family would withdraw into this room for privacy. Second, a dining room. Third, a kitchen. Fourth, a pantry and fifth, an entrance hall. These are our five main units. As accessories we have a kitchen, pantry or closet, a coat closet, cellar stairs and outside a piazza and kitchen porch.

To fit these parts into our plan, which is thirty-feet long and twenty-five feet wide, we may have to give up some pre-conceived ideas, but we will find that we can do so comfortably and have good large rooms at that.

To make this first floor plan a success, let us imagine what the family of four will do and how they will pass their days and then we will fit these rooms to one another to meet their needs. The mother will be at home the greater part of each day, and with the high cost of living keeps only a general housemaid to help her with her duties. The two children are away at school from 9 to 12 and from 1 to 3, and the father leaves for town at 7:30 in the morning. The greater part of each day, therefore the mother is alone. The children are home for luncheon at noon and the entire family are together in the evening for dinner. As you see, the living room will be in constant use after dinner and spasmodically during the day.

A free access from the living room to the dining room is a prime requisite, likewise to the hall and to the front hall. As suggested before, it will be a distinct help if there is a circulation from the living room to the dining room independent of the hall, as this will give privacy to the family and protect it from strangers or book agents. Mind, we are considering these units now as simple bare rooms or blocks and attempting to show how the architect's mind works when he makes his preliminary sketches. Consideration of chimneys, heating, lighting, etc., will be taken in due course, but for the present we will have all we can handle if we consider each of these rooms as empty blocks.

AL'S BUST SCRAPPED

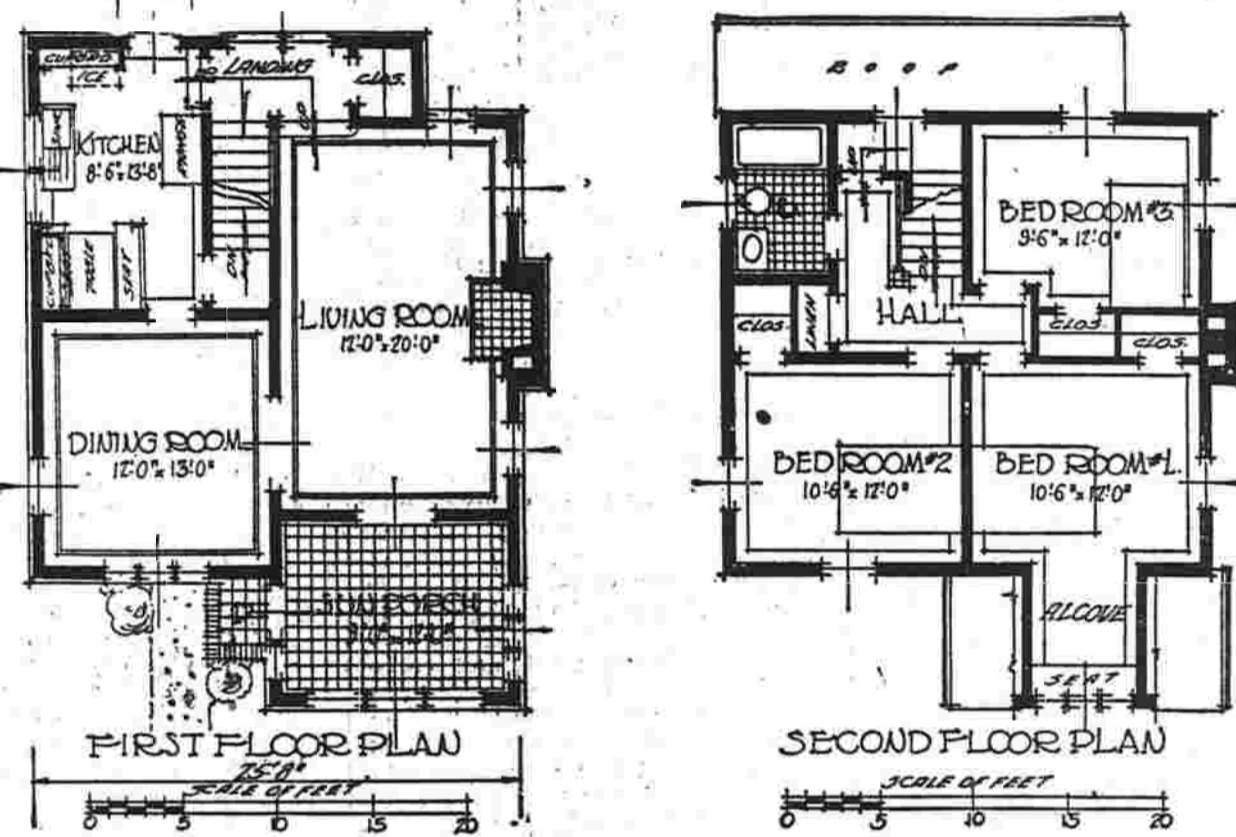

An English House of Character and Economy



To obtain an English Cottage type of house with an economical floor plan, one that has no lost space in beauty and economy, two most essential factors in the design of the modern American home.

The architects have, in the house illustrated herewith, obtained both of these essential qualities to a very marked degree, as a study of the accompanying illustration will show.

The construction is stucco over frame although brick veneer could be used with very good effect. The enclosed Sun Porch is a delightful little room that serves also as an entrance vestibule. The entire plan layout is direct and compact with not an inch of space lost.

Three good bedrooms and a bath together with ample closets complete the second floor, while on the third floor, there is space for an additional room if required.

A cellar under the entire house provides the space for the laundry, the heater and such.

A lot with a frontage of 40 feet would give good free space but not allow for a drive. With a driveway on one side, a frontage of 45 feet would give a good setting.

Cost about \$10,000.

ROOF ON WHICH SNOW MELTS A HEAT WASTER

Roofs from which snow does not quickly melt are fuel savers and reducers of home heating costs. It is the nature of heated air to rise. If no barrier resistant to heat is interposed beneath the roof, the air warmed at considerable cost by the heating plant will expand much of its warmth in melting snow.

Roof insulation touches the pocketbook nerve. Cost of material and installation may hurt, but think of the loss suffered throughout the cold weather as symbolized by roofs from which snow quickly melts. That is the other side of the picture, the more important side, when it is realized that this loss mounts year after year.

Insulation for the room, while it should be built in when the house is constructed, may be added at any time. The roof may be lined with it, probably the easier method, or it may be used as plaster base on the

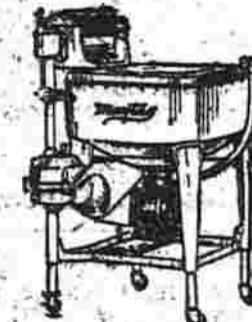

Modernizing Starts With Interior of the Home

MARKED CHANGES POSSIBLE IN THE AVERAGE HOUSE

Interior Decorating One Phase of Effort

The Home Modernizing Movement is calculated to improve the home both inside and out. Remodeling may be necessary in many cases where the exterior of the residence still bears the stamp of the architecture of twenty years ago. Yet modernizing rather than the more limited remodeling is the aim of this campaign.

Modernization is an embracing word. Your home may have the modern lines that are now in vogue yet contain many accessories that are out of date or the home may be lacking in those conveniences that have recently come into such generally accepted use.

Home modernizing really starts with the interior of the home. It is here that the home life functions and it is only right that the home be equipped with the newly devised equipment that makes living so worth while.

Even though the exterior lines of the dwelling be smartly up to date, now is the time to thoughtfully consider the interior to see if you are receiving full satisfaction from it.

Marked changes are possible in the average house. The layout of the rooms is often inconvenient and unsatisfactory. Certain rooms may need enlarging or alterations. A lack of closets is a handicap to the housekeeper. The stairs to the upper floor may be inaccessible or narrow.

Styles Change in Furnishings. Consider also the furnishings of the home. Styles change in furniture and the parlor set of fifteen years ago is now out of date. Carpets, covering the entire floor, were necessary in the days of soft wood but nowadays have been discarded in favor of rugs. Chinese or Oriental rugs may be beyond the limits of the family purse, but domestic rugs of similar pattern and most artistic are available today.

The arrangement of the furniture is new. Years ago the chairs and tables were placed along the walls with stiff formality, but now they are scattered around the

rooms in a studied disarray. A cozy, homey atmosphere is secured which is not possible with the more formal arrangement.

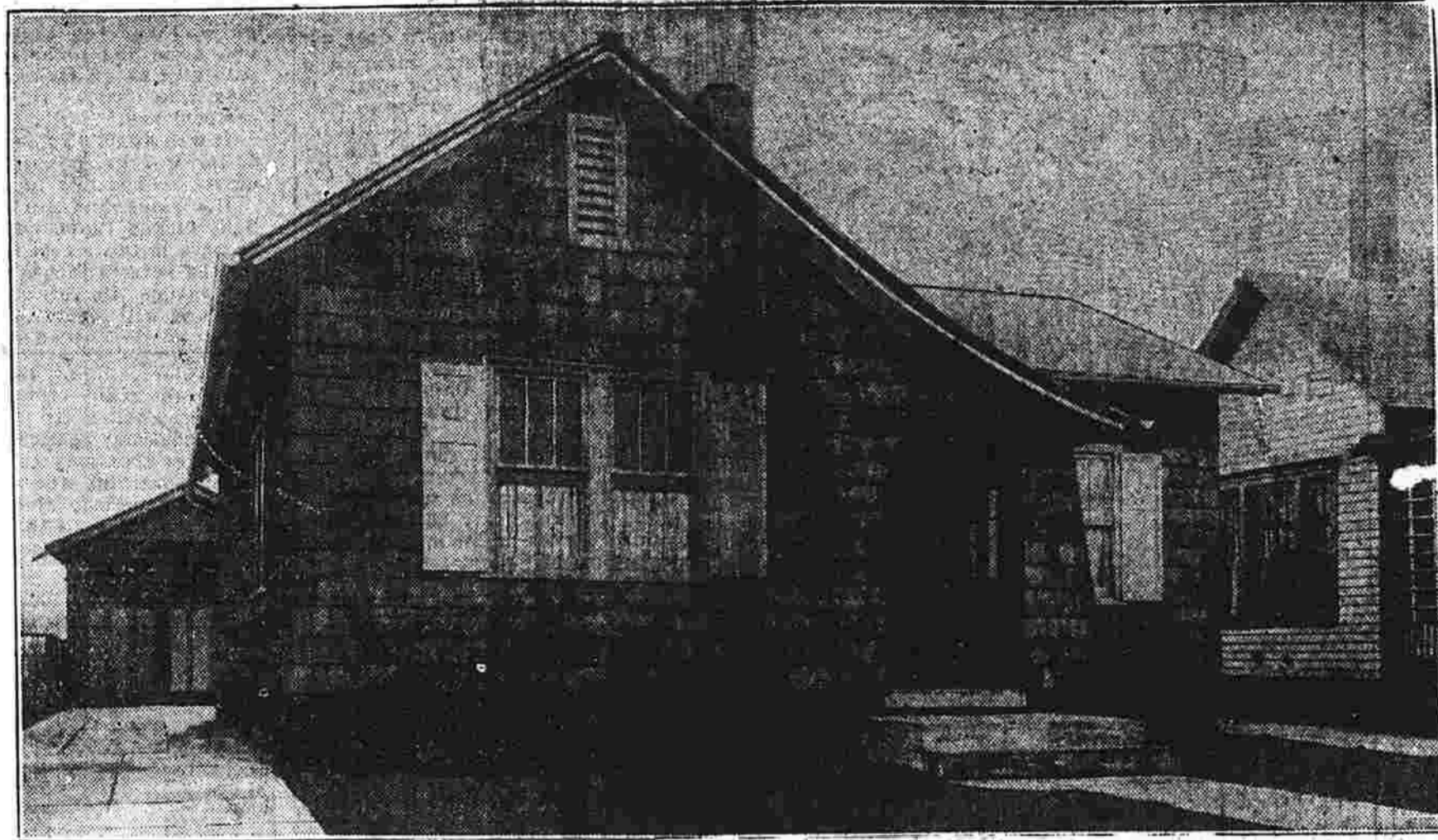
New home accessories are constantly being placed on the market. While the average home can purchase furniture at infrequent intervals, new effects can be secured by frequent changes of lamp shades, curtains and drapes, table covers, cushions and the like. Changes in wall decorations are also another angle of home modernizing. Lately canvases covered walls, painted with several coats of flat paint, have been popular. The standard wall paper, however, comes out each year with new designs and color effects and will always remain in vogue.

Many newly constructed homes use no wall covering, the plaster being tinted and finished in a rough yet striking texture.

Plastic paints with which effects in modified texture can be achieved give a finish half way between the smooth plaster and the very rough textured effects.

Sweeping Lines Enhance Beauty of Dwelling

After contrasting the two houses shown to the left, doubting Thomases who believe that they are not the same are invited to cast an eagle eye at the house next door, found at the right in each picture.

That the house next door is the same is plainly evident by the group of three windows, and the gable end. The points of contact are evi-

dent and prove that these before and after illustrations show what modernization means to the exterior lines of a house.

Once a Lowly Cottage. The smart-looking bungalow at the top of the page was once the lowly cottage shown below it. The sweeping roof lines and arched entrance reveal the spirit of today—a far cry from the ginger-bread adorned architecture of the early nineties.

When the owner of the cottage decided to invest in modernization, he instructed the contractor, first of all, to get rid of the old fashioned front porch with its ugly trimmings.

In its place he devised a plain little entry way covered by an extension of the roof which sweeps down in a fascinating curve. An arched entrance with a shingled column supports the extension of the roof.

Shingles Used. The plain cladding of the older structure has been superseded by shingle sides which add so much to the homey intimate atmosphere of this bungalow. Incidentally stained shingles, stucco, or brick veneer are popular sidings for small houses and permit effective color schemes.

A ventilator with horizontal louvers allows the entrance of air into the attic, insuring a draft in hot summer weather so that heated air will not accumulate and warm the rooms below.

The large fixed bay window that lighted the front room of the house was torn away when the building was modernized. A broad opening filled with two sliding windows now occupies the place. Quality paneled wooden shutters flank each window opening at the front. Shutters of this type are usually distinctive and aid in setting the house apart from its neighbors.

Interior Also Modern. The interior of the house is as modern as its exterior. The various rooms of the bungalow have been made up-to-date and every convenience that will add to the comfort and convenience of the occupants is found.

Like most old houses soft wood floors had been used in each room.

These floors were relaid with hardwood and waxed to bring out their rich effects.

Electrical outlets are found in each room so that floor lamps can be used without cords reaching to the center cluster of hanging lights as was necessary before modernization. The fixtures of the center cluster of lights has been made smartly up-to-date, the old fashioned combination gas and electric fixtures being discarded.

A new heating plant in the basement, a modern appearing tub and shower in the bath, a colored gas range and electric refrigerator in the kitchen comprise a few of the touches of modernization that came when the old place was made up to date.

The experiences of this owner are not unique. Hundreds upon hundreds of dwellings just as hopeless looking have been made up to the minute when modernized.

Electrical Outlets Necessary Many Electrical Accessories Used Today

Electrical outlets are much in demand in the modern home. The increased use of electricity and the many varied types of accessories makes an abundance of outlets necessary.

The older houses contained few if any outlets, a cord running from the center cluster being necessary if the housewife needed additional service.

The newest houses contain two or three outlets in the mopboard, each room being so equipped.

Often the center cluster of lights in the living room is not used because of the vogue for floor lamps. The appearance of the center cluster adds or detracts from the decorative effect of the room and the cluster should be kept up to date. Changes in design are frequent and the cluster must be renewed occasionally if the room be modern.

Each room of the house has electrical accessories peculiar to it. Out-

lets are always necessary if full service is to be secured.

Floor lamps are found in many rooms of the house. In the bedroom will be used electric warming pads, heaters and bed lamps. The dining room needs outlets for toasters, waffle-irons, grills and percolators, since many housewives prepare some dishes at the table.

In the kitchen outlets waist-high are convenient and may be used when electricity is used for cooking. Many housewives iron in the kitchen and outlets must be available for this service.

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Whether You Are Building A New Home Or Modernizing An Old One Let

BUY - BUILD AND LIVE IN MANCHESTER

Architect, Owner and Builder Urged to Agree on Actual Cost Of Home Before Construction

By GERALD LYNTON KAUFMAN, A. I. A.

When we are told that the cost of a certain automobile is \$2,000 we can be reasonably certain just what this means. Outside of such little incidentals as "F. O. B. Detroit," a few accessories and a license, the actual cost for the car, just as we see it, is fairly near the quoted figure. But if we see a perspective sketch of a house in a current periodical, with a block plan of the first and second floor and an editorial caption, "This House Costs \$20,000," may we be equally sure just what the figure means?

Architects are constantly confronted with the obvious confusion that exists in their clients' minds, as to the exact meaning of the word "cost." The difficulty of defining the word arises through the complexity of items which may or may not be included in the term "cost," whether we refer to the contract sum or to all incidentals and "accessories" as well. In attempting to clarify and interpret these items it is well to bear in mind that they fall naturally into three main groups, and then to decide for ourselves whether or not we desire to include the total of all together, in what we call the "cost of the house."

It is obvious that the initial cost of the land on which we build a thing entirely apart; it does not belong in any group of items referring to the building budget. Yet one group of expenses incidental to the erection of a home has a direct bearing and an intimate relation to the land, and is entirely outside of the general contract. This includes the contour survey, the approach road, grading, planting, landscaping and rock excavation; also, in many cases, trenching for gas, water, electric and sewer connections and many similar items.

The group that includes the house proper consists of all items comprising the general contract. Yet this in itself is not a cut and dried affair, invariable and inviolate. While in common practice, the general contract provides for the furnishing of all labor and materials, from the commencement of excavating to the delivery of the completed house ready for occupancy, there are still a large number of essentials which cannot be justly, either to owner or to builder, be included in the specifications. Among these are certain items which come in the third group, under the heading of "furnishings," and certain others, which are sometimes made part of contract, and sometimes omitted. Among the latter are plaster painting—often considered as "decorating"—screens, weather stripping, hanging of lighting fixtures, connecting of range and refrigerator, installation of oil burner, and building of outside steps and terraces, which are not a part of the landscaping.

Some architects include all these latter items in the general contract; however, it is frequently to an owner's advantage if certain of them are omitted; only the determination of which ones to omit is something that must be carefully thought out and thoroughly understood in computing this part of the cost.

"Furnishings" should refer only to such mechanical installations as automatically become a fixed part of building. These include all the items in the preceding paragraph, which are not written into the specifications for the general contract, and also the range, refrigerator, lighting fixtures, telephones, washing machines and laundry and kitchen equipment.

It will be noticed in reading over the items touched upon the three

main groups above that they are located, but also that they have a tendency to overlap. An oil burner installation requires outside excavation and therefore falls into Group 1; but it requires alterations to the boiler and has a direct bearing on the responsibility of the general contractor in Group 2, while it may be put off entirely until the house has been occupied for some time and thus considered a part of the equipment in Group 3.

However, the purpose of separation into groups is only to clarify the meaning of cost as applied to a home, so that architect, owner and builder may speak a common language. Were we to go still further a party group might be made up to include architect's engineer's and lawyer's fees; the cost of a bond for the contractor, liability insurance and similar items. They may all be considered a part of the cost of a home, or they may all be thought of as incidental expenses.

In any case, let us be sure when making out our budget just what we mean by the word "cost," just what we expect it to include and what we wish our architect to have it include. Let us bear in mind when we look at magazine illustrations that there is a wide range of interpretations applicable to the price noted in the caption, and let us remember that a house is more complex than an automobile and that something more must be provided for than the accessories, the license and the "F. O. B. Detroit."
