

MCCOOK DECISION MAY COST THE STATE OVER A MILLION

FIVE POWER PARLEY TO TALK ARMS CUT

Japan, France and Italy to Be Invited to Fall Conference; Washington Officials Confident of Outcome

Washington, July 26.—A five-power naval conference, the principal aim of which will be to reduce existing navies to the uttermost limit consistent with international policing safety, was definitely forecast here today for the late autumn or mid-winter.

This is the goal toward which President Hoover and Premier Ramsay MacDonald are now striving, and with every indication of success. When the time is deemed ripe, that is, when the negotiations now going on between London and Washington have reached a point where an Anglo-American agreement is in sight, the governments of Japan, France and Italy will be invited to send plenipotentiaries. In all likelihood the conference will be held in Washington at MacDonald's instigation.

Thus far in the world history there has been but one successful naval disarmament conference. That was the original Washington conference. It was successful because Great Britain and the United States readily came to an agreement on the most important features of limitation and dominated the parley. Since that time, eight years ago, half a dozen conferences, large and small, have been held, all of them abroad, and none of them have been successful because adjustment of the Anglo-American differences had not been made before hand.

Ready Beforehand

This time, President Hoover and the British premier apparently are determined to have that adjustment in the bag, so to speak, before the statesmen put their feet under the conference table. They feel that by talking about naval differences between the two countries under the protecting cloak of diplomatic negotiation much more will be accomplished than in airing them publicly before the world at a Geneva conference table.

General conditions are considered peculiarly appropriate for a conference this winter.

Naval construction is virtually at a standstill throughout the world. Great Britain and the United States have just agreed to forego building for the time being. The long standing reparations controversy, which has had Europe in a turmoil for a decade, has been shelved, at least temporarily and perhaps for good. The war debts controversy, another ten-year old irritant in international relations, has been similarly put on the shelf. All nations have agreed to abolish war, through acceptance of the Kellogg treaty, and thus ten years after Ver-

GERMANY TO START ATLANTIC SERVICE

To Carry Mail and Freight First With 19-Ton Planes; Passengers Later.

Berlin, July 26.—After protracted trials Lufthansa, Germany's great commercial aviation enterprise today accepted 3 Rohrbach Romar flying yachts as the first units of a trans-Atlantic air fleet. The new amphibians will be first tried out in test flights over the Baltic. It is planned to make a trial flight to South America later in the year preliminary to the establishing of a mail and freight air line to South America in 1930.

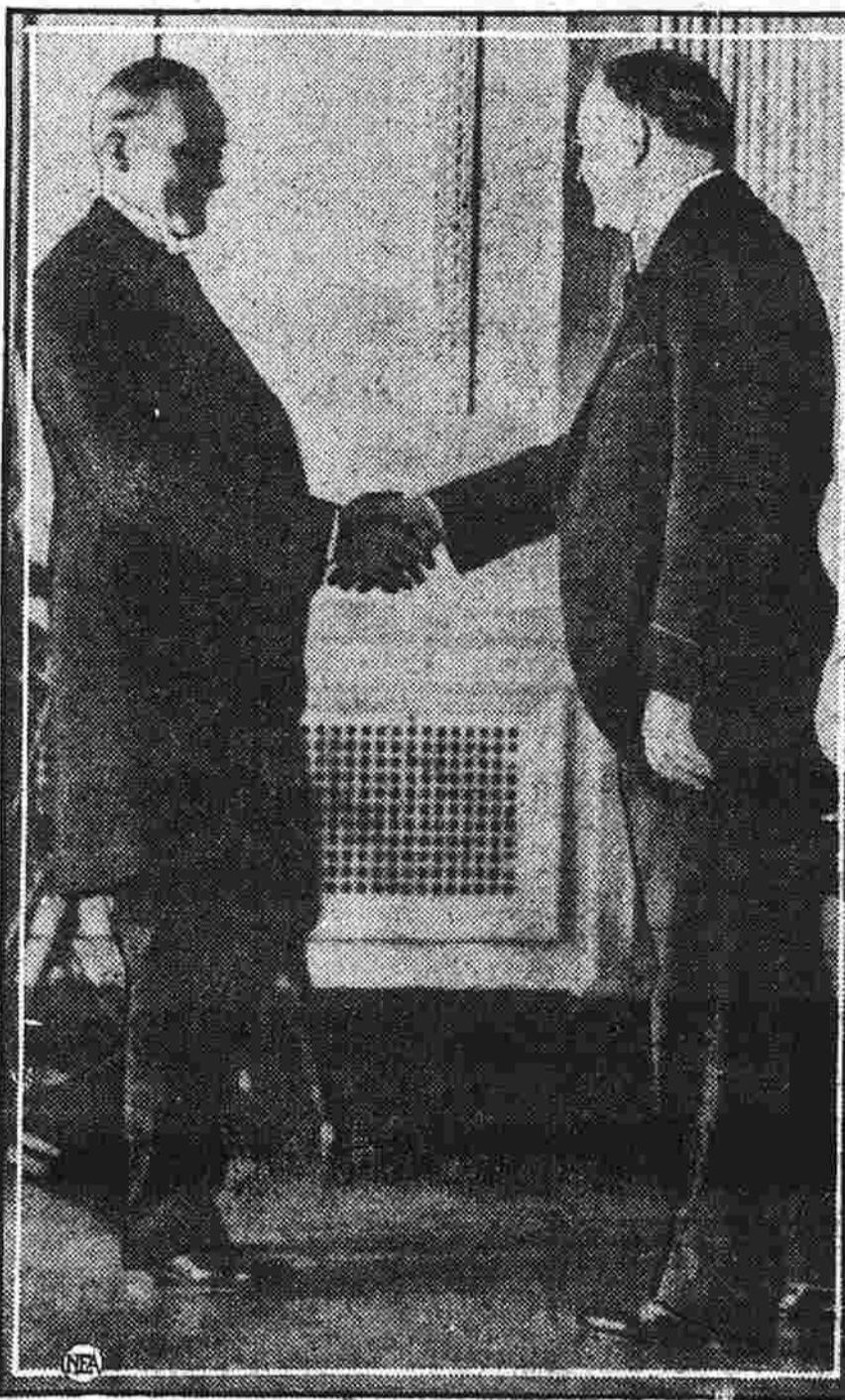
Starts With Freight.

Lufthansa officials told International News Service: "Recent mishaps show the North Atlantic is still too difficult for an air line, but the South Atlantic is different.

"We shall start with mail and freight because it is better business and less dangerous than carrying passengers."

The Rohrbach Romar flying yacht is a 19 ton hydroplane, driven by three motors and capable of carrying 15 passengers. It is able to fly 2,500 miles.

AMERICAN SHIPS TO BE FASTEST

Two New Ocean Liners to Be Speediest in World, Officials Announce.

Washington, July 26.—The American flag will fly about the fastest passenger cruisers on the high seas, despite German or British rivalry, if the United States Shipping Board's plans for developing the American Merchant Marine meet with success, it was learned today.

Two new giant American passenger liners, faster and larger than any afloat, will be placed in trans-Atlantic service by 1932 by America's answer to the time smashing voyage of the North German Lloyd's Bremen. The board meanwhile stands ready to aid financially any other American company in constructing other new liners to meet the expected competition from British shipping.

Fund Available. In one of its far-seeing moods, Congress already has created a fund of \$250,000,000, from which the Shipping Board can advance loans to shipbuilding concerns. The board has power to advance 75 per cent of the cost of the vessels at low interest rates. Thus far, American shipping interests have borrowed approximately \$20,000,000 while the board has about \$80,000,000 in cash to finance additional loans, while the remainder of the \$250,000,000 will be appropriated to meet future shipbuilding activities.

1,500 ACTS OF LEGISLATURE HAVE BEEN CALLED INVALID

11 Killed, 6 Injured When Gun Explodes

London, July 26.—Many sailors were killed and wounded by a gun explosion on board the new 19,000 ton British cruiser Devonshire during target practice in the eastern part of the Mediterranean sea. It was officially announced this afternoon. The admiralty characterized the disaster as a "serious gun accident." It was believed that eleven were killed and six were injured.

The Devonshire, which carried 5-inch guns, was completed and put into commission this year. Her guns were being tested in practice firing in the Mediterranean when the accident occurred.

THREATENING NOTE SENT TO DR. SNOOK'S LAWYER

Tells of Letter in Court While Examining Witness; Judge Refuses to Allow Him to Explain Further.

Courtroom, Columbus, O., July 26.—A threat was sent to him through the mail, Judge John F. Seidel, one of the attorneys defending Dr. James H. Snook, college professor, for the murder of Theora Hix, a co-ed, asserted in court today while examining a prospective juror.

Seidel was interrogating J. B. Collison, a retired druggist. He asked him: "Have you received any telephone calls or threatening letters since you were subpoenaed for jury duty?"

The juror said "no" and then Seidel declared: "Well I have. I received a threat in the mail last night."

He started to say more but Judge Henry L. Searlett stopped him. "Proceed with the examination," the judge ordered. This was done.

DEFENSE COMPLICATED. Columbus, O., July 26.—Dr. James H. Snook's defense in the slaying of Miss Theora Hix, beautiful young university co-ed, is gradually becoming more complicated.

It became evident today as the tedious task of selecting the jury was resumed that to his claims of "self defense" and temporary "emotional insanity" he will add the plea that she administered to him a "love potion."

Apologies, was the word used by Judge John F. Seidel, of counsel for Dr. Snook, in designating the particular kind of drug that it will no doubt be alleged, was taken by the defendant on the night of June 13 last when, in a frenzy of emotion, he battered the girl into unconsciousness with a hammer and then slit her throat with a pen knife "to relieve her suffering."

Nurse Questioned. In questioning one of the tentative accepted woman jurors, Miss Edith Dyringer, a nurse, Seidel bluntly asked her: "Do you know what aphrodisiacs are?" and when the stout, middle-aged nurse replied that she did not, the portly attorney for the defense volunteered the explanation that "they are potions which are said to stimulate sexual excitement in human beings."

Emphasis on the "dope" angle was laid by Seidel in interrogating jurors. Would they be prejudiced against Snook if it developed that he and his co-ed "had taken drugs together" to determine the human reaction? he asked. Repeatedly he warned the jurors that drug stimulation and "illicit sexual relations" are going to play an important part in his trial.

The illicit love affair of Dr. Snook, the deposed college professor, and Miss Hix had stretched over a period more than three years, Seidel asserted. Would the fact that this may be a mixed jury of men and women cause any of the jurors to be reluctant about discussing the sordid details of this "affair" in the jury room?

TO CALL SESSION OF OUR ASSEMBLY

Ruling of Supreme Court of Errors Comes as Stunning Surprise to State Officials—Governor Away on Vacation, Expected Home on Monday to Take Steps for Calling Special Session of Legislature—Session Will Run Into Months—Practice of Governors in Signing Bills More Than Three Days After Adjournment of Assembly Causes Court to Give Decision.

Hartford, July 26.—The McCook decision of the Supreme Court of Errors, by which some fifteen hundred acts of the Legislatures of the past ten years, appear to have been declared invalid, may cost the State of Connecticut a million dollars or more.

The decision came as a stunning surprise to state officials and as a result the departments were almost in a state of turmoil. Business of the state came practically to a standstill as the attorney-general's office started steps toward the calling of a special legislative session. Such a call is in some quarters expected next week when Governor Trumbull returns to the state.

The governor sent word from Association Island, Lake Ontario, today, that he would not return until Monday. If necessary, his message said, he would take steps to call a special session.

Ernest L. Averill, deputy attorney general, in charge of that department of the state during the illness of B. W. Ailing, today started looking over the procedure of calling a special legislative session.

Cost to Be Staggering. The cost of an extra session will be staggering, say those who have studied the proposition. The session must run into months. A normal session receives about 1000 proposals and costs about \$900. The laws that the McCook decision indicates are no laws at all, run to about 1600.

A legislative term now costs Connecticut upward of \$300,000. That sum was made necessary by the new rule of paying each member ten cents a mile for transportation to and from the State House. By irony of fate, that very rule is one of those apparently knocked out by the McCook decision. A governor failed to sign the measure within the time prescribed by the constitution.

Many pieces of business that state officials are now engaged upon were halted with suddenness today because the officials discovered they apparently are illegal.

Sixty-four men formed into fourteen scouting crews and three roving bands are at work, most of them in eastern Connecticut while twenty-eight men are working in corn fields seeking the destructive insects. Others are patrolling twelve roads in the eastern counties. Three roving crews are patrolling the main highways into the state from New York, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island, holding up all traffic to look for contraband farm products and flowers.

Roads Entrolled. The roads patrolled are located as follows: Thompson, Killingly, East Haddam, and Clinton, two each; Canterbury, Willimantic, Salem, and Saybrook one each. A guard is located on the Boston Post Road in the town of Port Chester, N. Y., also.

The federal government has placed a ban on celery, green beans, beans with tops and rhubarb, also.

Blanket Action Impossible. Parliamentarians said today the Legislature could not take blanket action and make all the laws affected valid in one stroke, but must act on each one separately—a job which will take three months at least. A great many members of the Legislature are farmers, there is always mumbling and complaining if a session lasts too far into the spring planting season, and three months now would oblige the farmer-legislators to sit in Hartford shuffling over routine measures and forgotten issues during the entire harvest period.

There is another alternative. The state, which is one party to the action in which the decision was rendered, can appeal to the United States Supreme Court. There is a difference of opinion, however, as to whether this would act as a stay of execution, and it is doubtful if it will be resorted to.

So far as preliminary check today disclosed, no laws of broad import are affected. Such legislation the governors usually have made a point of attending to with despatch. It was the routine measures mostly, acts authorizing private corporations to make capital increases or reduce par value of their stocks and towns and cities to issue bonds, or technical measures which required study and investigation that were allowed to remain in the executive portfolio pending the gubernatorial pleasure. Gov. Trumbull still has not signed certain acts passed by the Legislature, which adjourned in the spring.

Bearing On Business. The bills affected, while not of general significance, nevertheless have a vital bearing on private and public business throughout the state, and no one seems to know how until the situation is remedied. Corporation lawyers are likely to be called on for some quick and ingenious ratiocination.

Laws affected other than those dealing only with routine matters, include the Waterbury zipper bill, a measure which consolidated the separate school districts of Hart-

LOTT IS BARELY BEATEN IN MATCH

Loses to Borotra After Torrid Five Set Struggle But Tilden Is Easy for Cochet.

Roland Garros Stadium, Paris, July 26.—American hope for a return of the Davis Cup this year virtually died on the shields of William T. Tilden and George M. Lott, Jr., this afternoon, the Yankee pair being soundly beaten by the French in the first two singles matches of the challenge round.

With only three matches remaining, France thus gained what amounted virtually to a chattel mortgage on the cup for another year. It now needs only one more victory, either in the doubles match tomorrow, or in the final two singles on Sunday, to retain the trophy it has held since 1927.

It had been expected that the absence of Rene Lacoste would place the French in jeopardy, but there was no evidence to support this notion today, although Lott seemed to be outclassed. But he reckoned without the fighting qualities of this young man who was making his debut to challenge round tennis.

The American, visibly gathering himself for the effort, stormed Borotra's defenses to rush through the first three games of the second set and, after the Basque had fought back to three-all, the set at 6 to 3 finally went to Lott who carried the next three games on sheer grit of the kind that brooks no defeat. Lott's tennis at this point was inspired.

Both fought grimly for the all-important third set, the games being even at 4-all when Borotra tapped some hidden reserve, smashed point after point into the back court and went on to win the ninth and tenth games and, with them, the set, at 6 to 4.

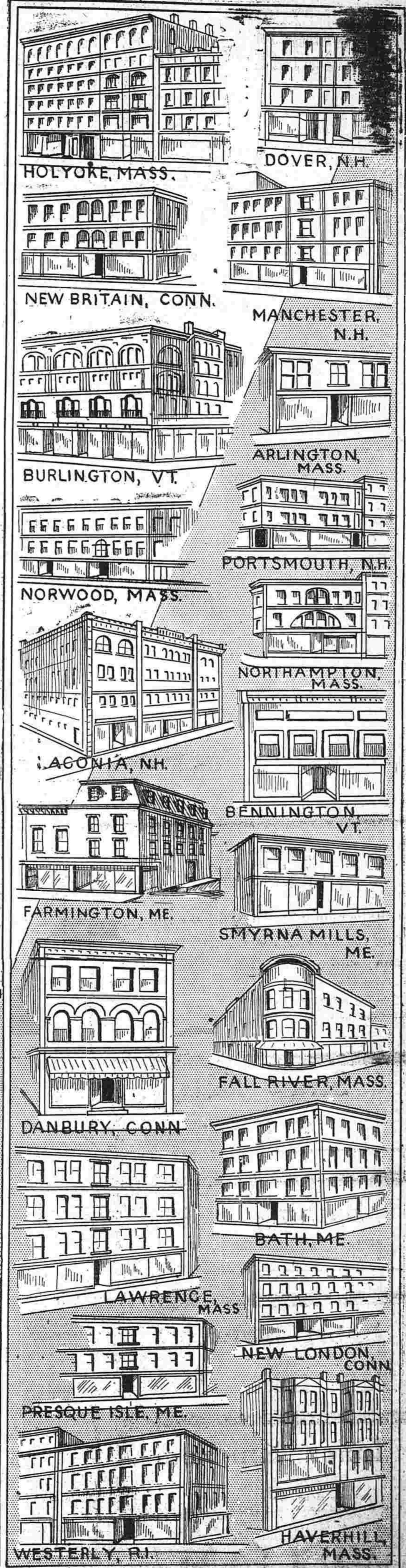
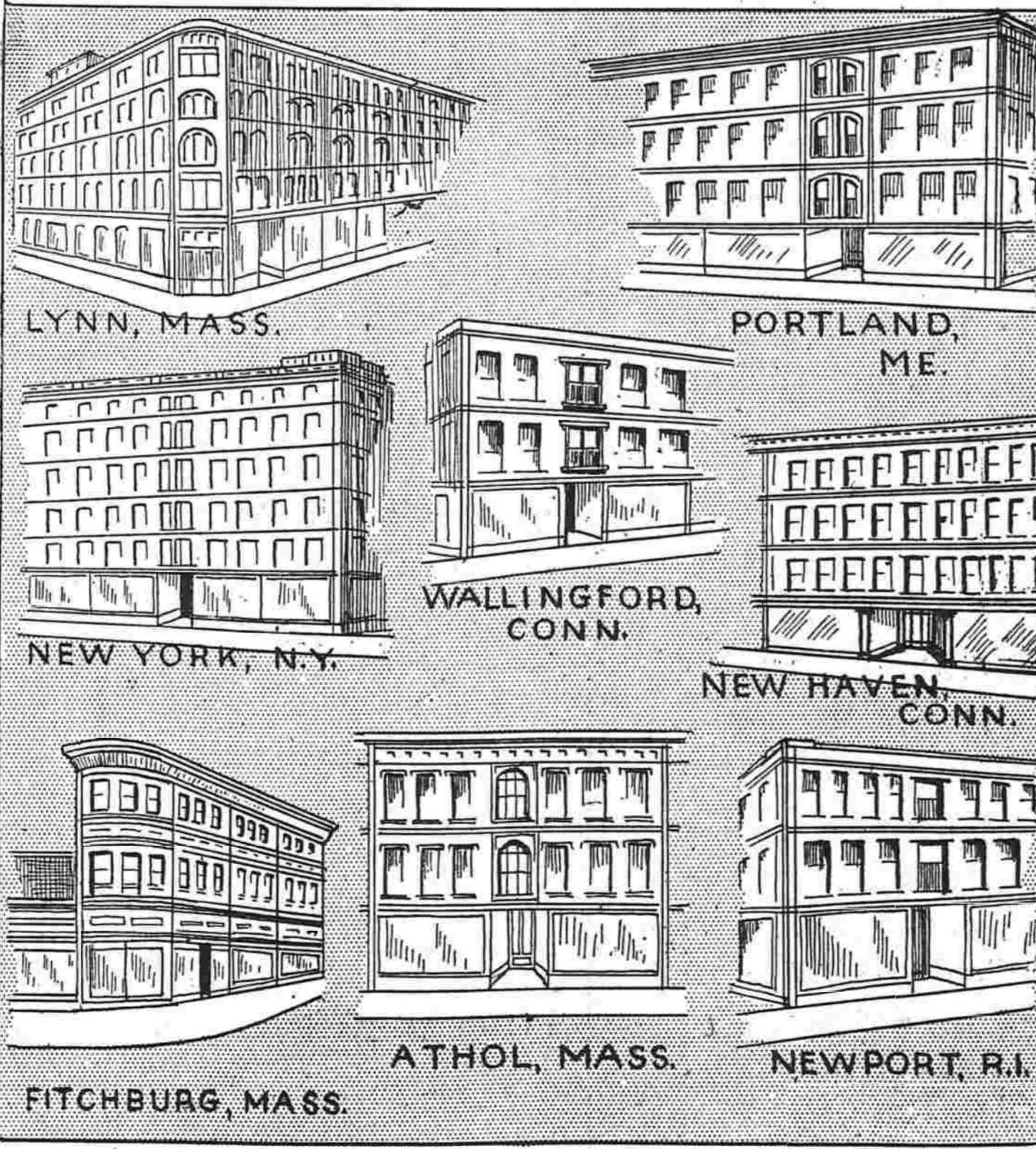
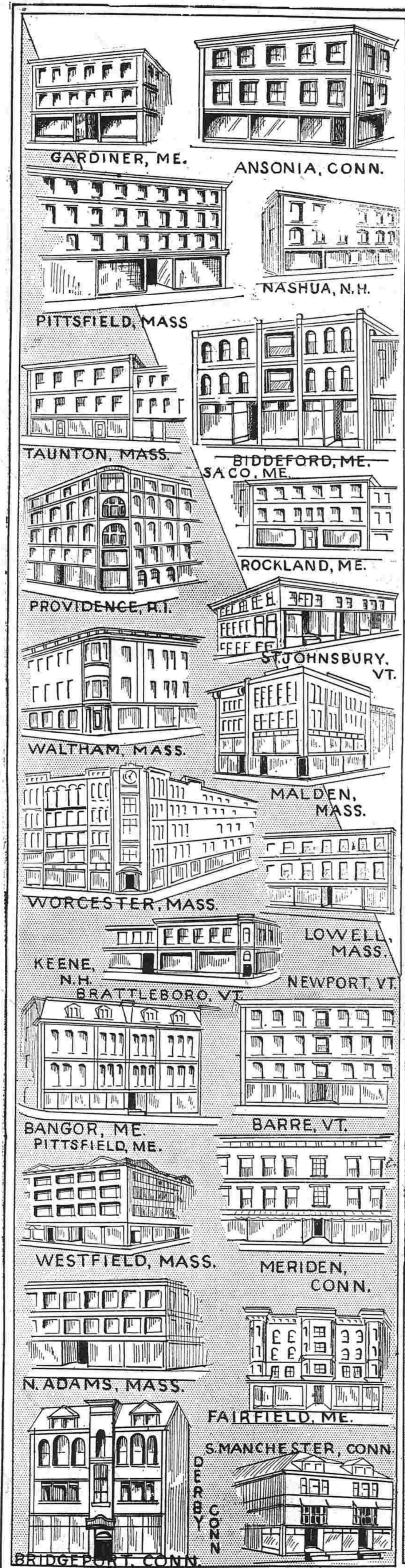

Today is the Anniversary of

POSTOFFICE ORGANIZED.
One hundred and fifty-four

years ago today, on July 26, 1775, the Continental Congress established a postoffice department with Benjamin Franklin in charge as postmaster general.

Franklin was authorized to establish a line of posts from Falmouth, Me., to Savannah, Ga., and as many cross posts as might seem to him necessary.

In 1792 rates of postage for letters were fixed which remained unaltered for nearly half a century. They were: for 30 miles and under, 6 cents; over 30 miles and not exceeding 60 miles, 8 cents; over 60 and not exceeding 100 miles, 10 cents; and so on

up to 450 miles and over, for which the charge was 25 cents. In 1845 the rates were lowered and a scale based on weight as well as distance was adopted. The element of distance as a

factor in fixing rates was abolished in 1856, and a uniform rate of 3 cents was established for letters not exceeding one-half ounce in weight.

There was no house-to-house delivery service in the first postal system in the United States. The mail was sent from town to town by horseback and the residents called at the local postoffice for all their mail.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Adhesions and Constipation

Question:—B. J. H. writes: "I would like to know what the symptoms of adhesions are. Was operated on for ruptured appendix about a year ago and suffered no ill effects until a couple of weeks ago. Have had continual headache, as if from stomach, usually constipated, and pains in back that lead up to back of head."

Answer:—Adhesions binding the intestines together are a common cause of constipation. The only way you can be sure whether or not you have adhesions is to have an x-ray examination made. Adhesions may produce symptoms in almost any part of the body if they are of sufficient strength to interfere with the functional activity of the stomach, intestines, or other abdominal organs.

No Starch for Diabetics

Question:—H. G. asks: "Will you please tell me if the entire wheat bread is starchy, and if it is good for the diabetic instead of gluten bread?"

Answer:—Entire wheat bread or plain white bread has a preponderance of starch over all other food elements. Gluten bread has slightly less starch, but the diabetic should not use bread of any kind, as he can get along very nicely if no starches are used, but may be forced to take insulin if he insists on using any form of carbohydrates.

Question:—G. H. asks: "Will you kindly tell me what causes the corners of the mouth to get sore? Also, the remedy for this disagreeable trouble?"

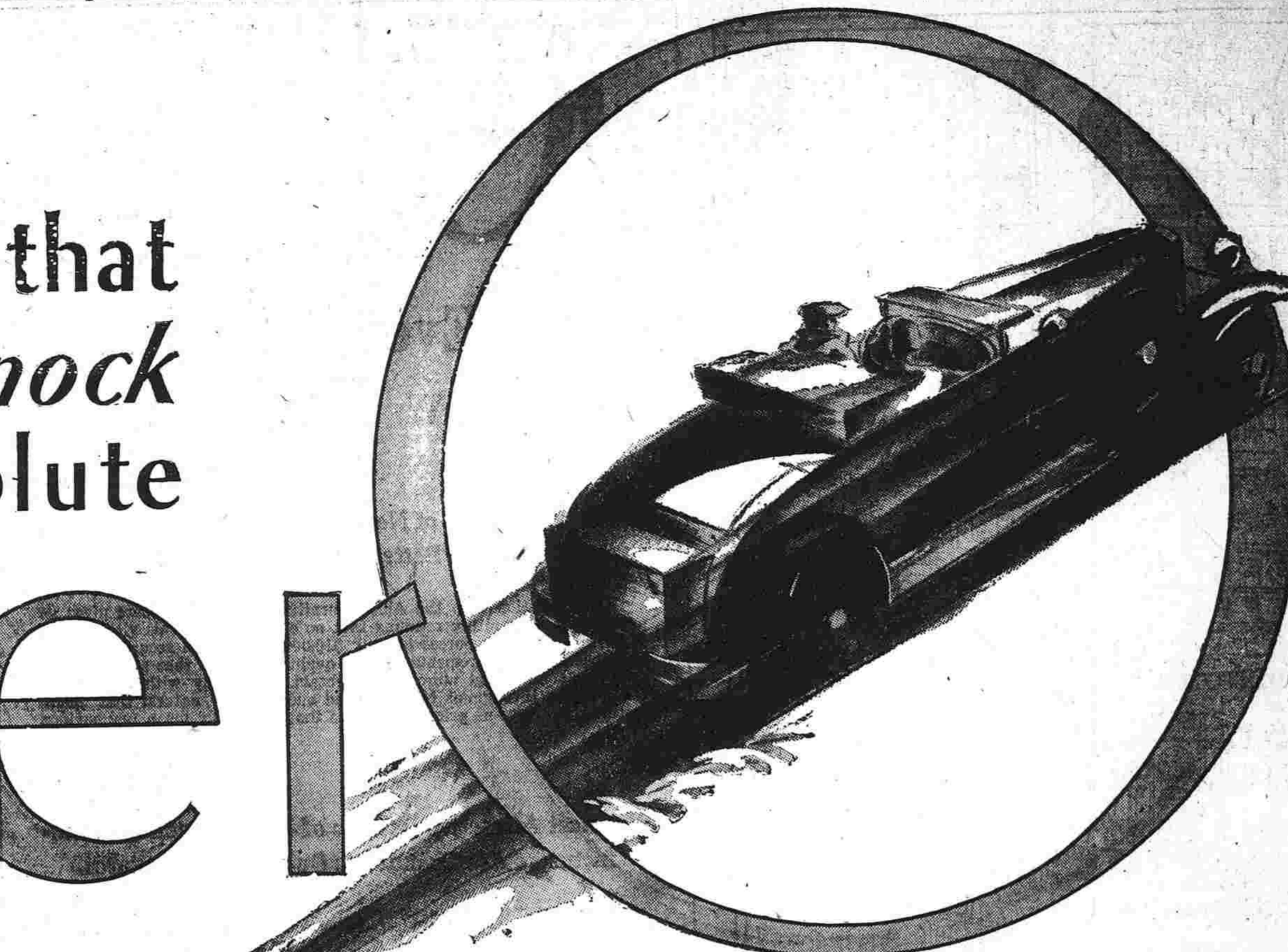

SOCCER PLAYERS PLAN TO ORGANIZE

Collective action is in immediate contemplation by soccer players previously associated with out-of-town clubs in New England—the formation of a players' union such as is in operation in England a movement suggested by successful individual appeals to the United States Football Association for reinstatement.

Davy Edwards, the well-known goal-keeper, who with the Barrie brothers jumped from Bethlehem to Fall River last week before President Patterson yesterday and judgment thereon were to be promulgated either yesterday or today. New England players, realizing that acceptance of the proffered terms by club owners is practically compulsory in that transfer to another club is impossible unless by mutual consent of the owners, are of opinion that the formation of a union is the most expedient step for the protection of their interests, through which source united appeal might be made.

"The sole interest which club owners have in the players now" said President Patterson, "is their own self-preservation until such time as they think we are going to make overtures to them. But we are not going to make any. That much is final. Let the players organize if they have a mind to do so and decide for themselves as a group what action is most conducive to their best interests. If they lay a proposition before me authentically indorsed then I shall deal with it promptly. But we have no room for the malcontents. Air Rights Question Bobs Up In Chicago

Chicago. — Chicago's downtown real estate was all platted, subdivided and occupied many years ago. Nevertheless, Chicago's realtors are still plating and subdividing in the very heart of the city, as gaily as if they were out in some unoccupied suburban farm area.

This is because of the sudden development of Chicago's air rights—a property that would have been utterly meaningless a generation ago but that now is emerging as one of the major items in the city's progress.

The air rights are the rights to make use of the open air, above railroad tracks and yards.

Put Buildings on Stilts. Obviously, a railroad has no use for the air over its tracks, so long as it has sufficient to give clearance for its trains. And builders are beginning to discover that skyscrapers can be put upon stilts, so to speak, right over the tracks—and, as a result, it is estimated that there are 200 acres of this new kind of "building sites" in downtown Chicago.

It all started when the enormous \$35,000,000 Merchandise Mart was proposed.

This gigantic building, which will be the world's largest business structure and which will house 2000 manufacturers, wholesalers and importers, straddles the tracks of the Chicago and Northwestern Railroad.

Since there was no precedent for the legal arrangements that had to be made before it could be built, lawyers and surveyors and engineers and architects had to go into many conferences before a proper system could be devised.

It ended by the railroad selling to the builders specified spots on the ground beside and between the tracks where the huge caissons to support the building were to go. Then it was agreed that the "air lot" was to begin 23 feet above the ground level, to cover the entire area of the property.

At the same time, the Chicago Daily News started its new building, also straddling the Chicago and Northwestern tracks. The News building is completed; the Merchandise Mart is expected to be ready for occupancy next spring.

Construction of these two buildings has made Chicago realtors realize that there are scores of excellent building sites in the heart of the business districts. The Northwestern railroad has a long stretch of tracks just north of the Chicago river.

On the west bank of the river is another long stretch of tracks belonging to the Pennsylvania, Burlington and Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroads. The Illinois Central also has extensive trackage along the lake front facing Grant Park. This kind of work has given the



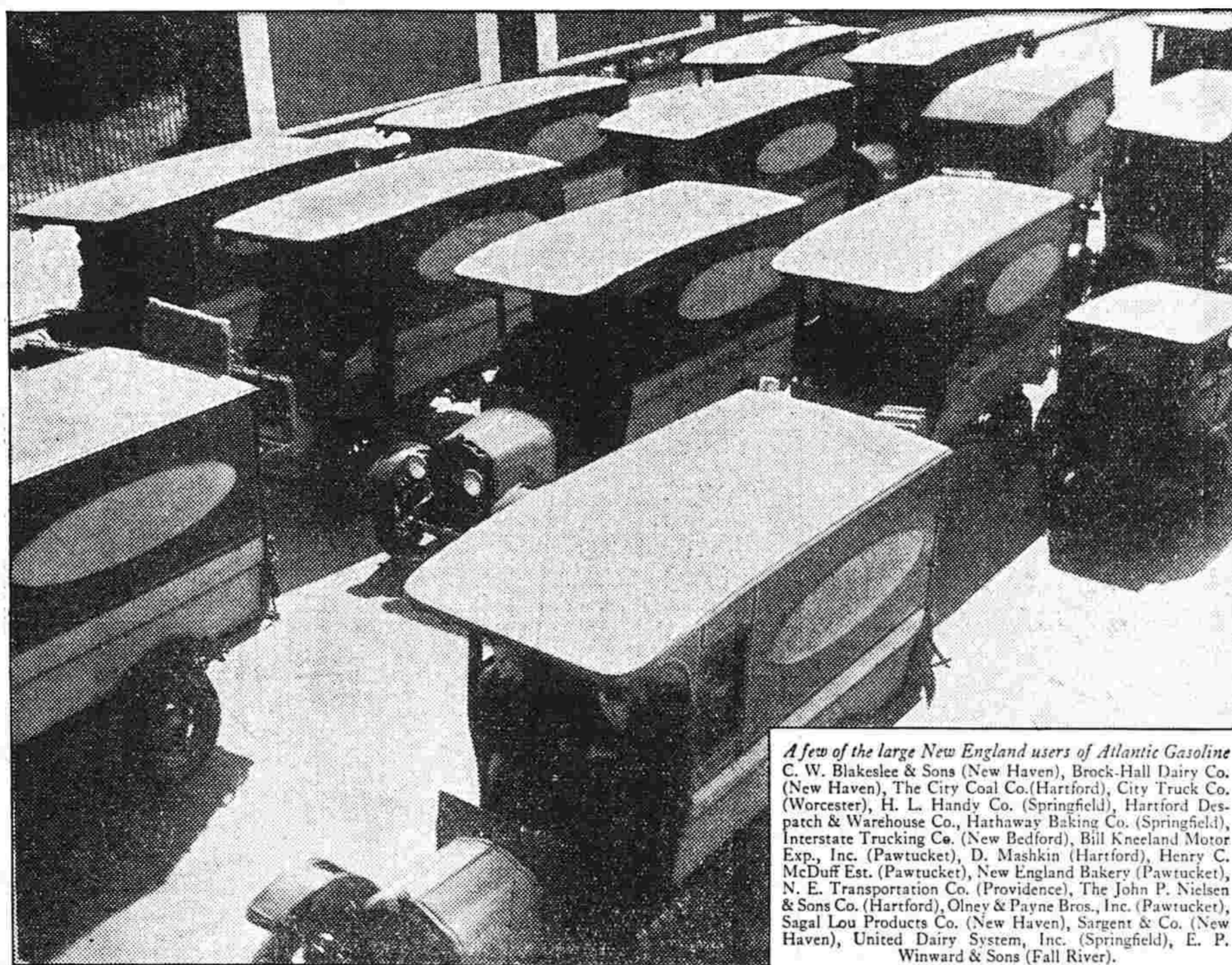
Chicago's Merchandise Mart, rising over the railroad tracks, as it will look when completed.

engineers many new problems. Special and costly foundations have to be laid to carry the enormous weight of the superstructures in such a way as to prevent vibration due to train operations. Yet the columns which support the buildings must occupy the narrow spaces between the tracks so as not to interfere with railway work.

ARMY NOW SEEKS BIGGEST PICTURE

Flying Cameramen to Try
for Photo 200 Miles
Away; Beat All Records.

Wright Field, Dayton, O. — And now the army is going to try to photograph objects 200 miles away. Seeking to excel the present record of 175 miles for long-range photography, Captain Albert W. Stevens, ace of the army's aerial cameramen, and Lieutenant John D. Cockrille, pilot, will make a 6,000-mile cruise to the lofty peaks of the Continental divide and return in a specially prepared photographic plane. They hope to prove that photographs of military value can be taken from a distance of 200 miles.

The flyers' route from Dayton lies across the states of Montana, Oregon and Washington, including the Cascade and Rocky Mountain ranges. It will cover, in fact, very much the same territory that Captain Stevens, piloted by Lieutenant Macready, photographed in 1924 when the present 175-mile record was made.

This mountain region was chosen for the long-range photographic test because it will, in most instances, be a simple matter to embrace in one exposure three or more outstanding peaks. With distances between the nearest peaks known, it will be possible to gauge the distance of the farthest point photographed from the camera lens.

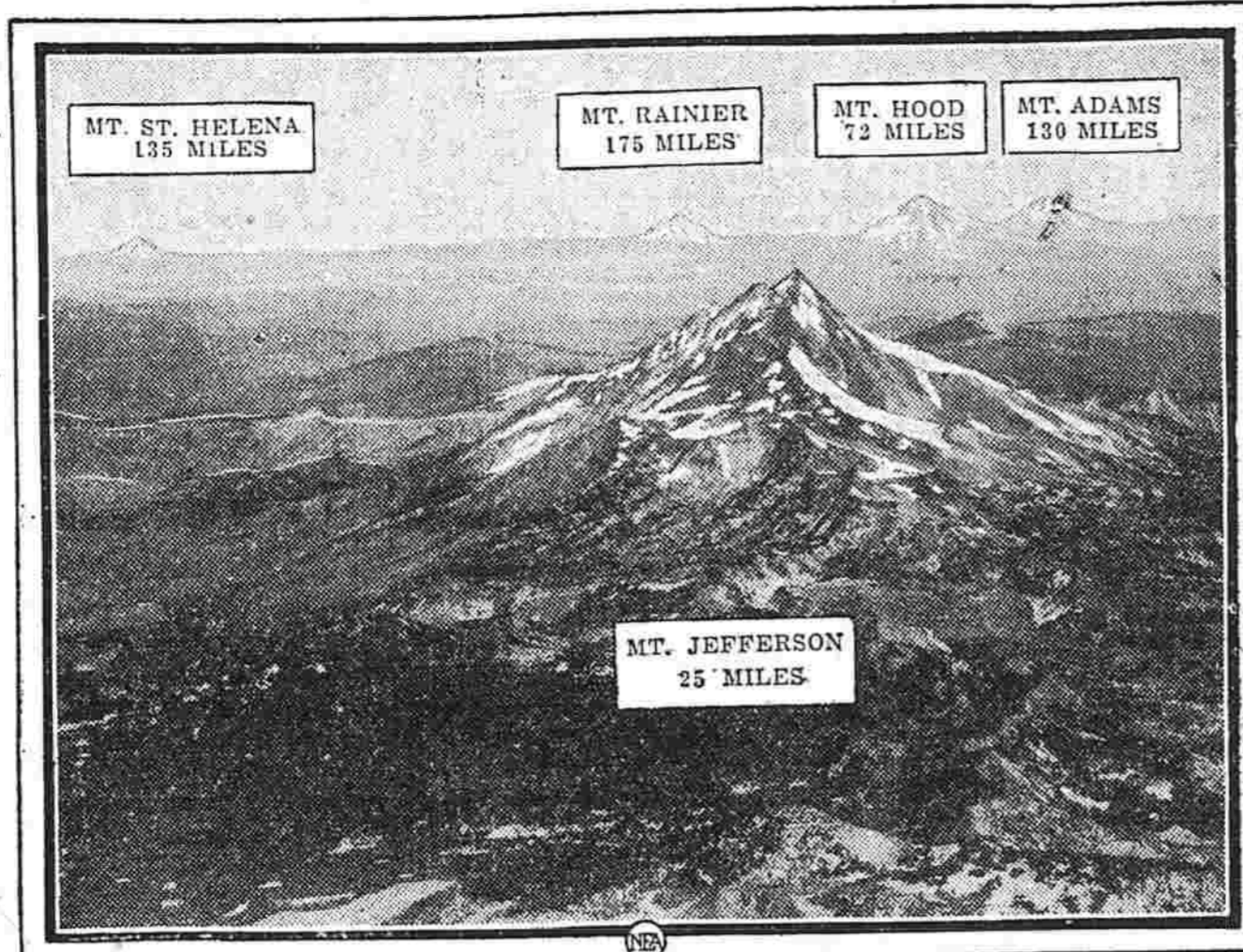
Their plane is a DeHavilland fitted with Loening amphibian wings and powered by a Liberty engine. The camera is an army Fairchild K-6, using a 500 mm. focal length lens, special film and a red filter.

With this film and filter it is believed that the longer waves of the spectrum can be made use of and thus greater distances achieved. In fact, the only limits of terrestrial distances capable of being photographed, it is thought, will be those caused by the curvature of the earth itself. With the aerial cameraman flying at 17,000 feet (the ceiling for an observation plane) the curvature would come at between 200 and 250 miles.

In war, the value of high altitude or long distance photography is obvious. It means the ability to secure layouts of enemy territory far beyond the reach of enemy anti-aircraft guns. In peace, it has an important map-making value for the benefit of surveyors.

Captain Stevens, an overseas veteran, saw photographic service with the signal corps at Chateau Thierry, St. Mihiel and in the Meuse and Argonne offensives. Lieutenant Cockrille was commissioned as a flyer in 1918 and following a period as instructor at Calstrom Field, Florida, he saw foreign service in the Philippine Islands.

NEW YORK TO BUILD TWO NEW TUNNELS

New York, July 26.—By appropriation of \$5,000,000 the city stands committed today to construction of two vehicular tunnels at a cost of near \$200,000,000.

One tunnel will extend from Tenth avenue, under thirty-eighth street beneath the East river with connections in the Boroughs of Queens and Brooklyn. It will cost \$103,000,000.

The other tunnel will be built under the Narrows linking Brooklyn and Staten Island and will cost at least \$75,000,000. The Manhattan tunnel will be about 22,600 feet in length or about twice as long as the present Holland tunnel connecting New York and New Jersey under the Hudson river.

It was estimated it would take four years to build the tunnels which will be of the double decked type.

Smarter Cops To Cope With Smarter Crooks



Here's the debonaire Grover A. Whalen, New York's police commissioner and head of the city's 18,000 cops. He has his own ideas on coping with crime.

BY HORTENSE SAUNDERS

New York.—The crooks are getting smarter now that certain forms of crime are entering the "big business" class and more educated men are being drawn into the ranks, so the cops should be smarter, too.

With this thought in mind, Grover A. Whalen, New York City's debonaire police commissioner and head of the metropolis' 18,000 policemen, is getting ready to launch his "Cop College."

It will be opened in September in a building just across the street from police headquarters, formerly a candy factory, which is now being renovated for use as a temple of learning.

Criminals Educated Now

"Criminals are getting smarter all the time," says Whalen, "and more high school and college men

are entering their ranks. Science and invention are making it easier for them to work faster, more effectively and to flee quicker from scenes of crimes. Policemen, too, must be smarter and better educated to cope with them."

Wherefore, the "Cop College."

This institution will offer academic opportunities to aspiring policemen. There'll be classes in the art of being a detective, in traffic administration, horsemanship, etc. Lawyers will teach the policemen how to make out warrants, affidavits and other legal papers properly, so the defendants won't later escape from the clutches of the law on some flimsy technicality.

The policeman will also be taught the law on the rights of themselves and of others—which recalls Commissioner Whalen's famous statement of several months

ago: "There's a lot of law in a nightstick."

Has Many Innovations

The "Cop College" is only one of Whalen's many innovations since the snappy and debonaire ex-department store manager became New York City's commissioner of police last December. He passed into this job from the general management of Wanamaker's great New York store, where, as an example of sartorial elegance and perfection, he had been the envy of every floorwalker.

During this time the impeccable Whalen had also served as New York City's official "glad-hander",

heading Mayor Walker's silk-hatted and frock-coated reception committees that went down the bay to welcome visiting royalty and return heroes and lead them down Broadway in triumphant parade.

The 43-year-old police commissioner, who looks barely more than 35 and dresses with a fastidiousness that would put a matinee idol to shame, knows his New York. Like Ex-Governor Al Smith, he was born on the East Side. After passing through high school and attending law college for a time, he went to work in the office of his father, a building contractor.

Entry Into Politics

Whalen entered politics when he organized a business men's better government committee that later supported John F. Hyland for mayor. When Hyland was elected, he became the mayor's secretary. Later, he was a city commissioner. Retiring, he became general manager of Wanamaker's store.

Always an organizer and a go-getter, Whalen directed preparations for the trans-Atlantic flight of Commander Byrd, largely financed by Rodman Wanamaker. He grew in importance as a public figure.

When Arnold Rothstein, the

gambler, was murdered last winter under a veil of mystery that even seven months has not dispelled, Mayor Walker met the situation by reorganizing the police department and appointing Whalen as its head. Whalen's new police reorganization lured diverted public attention from the Rothstein murder, but the mystery of Rothstein's death is still unsolved. So is the mystery of the more recent murder of Frank Marlow, another Broadway gambler-king. This was followed by another police shake-up.

"Secret Police" on Job

But the dauntless police commissioner hopes to cope with such cases in the future. One of his newest innovations has been the appointment of a squad of 50 "secret police." These men will wear no badges, carry no guns, no police credentials, and their identity will be unknown to anyone—policemen included—except one or two of Whalen's trusted subordinates. They will mingle anonymously with known gamblers, racketeers and crooks, frequent their hang-outs and spend money with them. All the time they will keep their ears and eyes open—and when a crime is committed they probably will have enough information to give Whalen an inside track.

To rid the police force of graft, Whalen says he plans to raise their pay. To encourage them, he plans medals and promotions as a reward for meritorious services and personal bravery.

Extradition proceedings were begun today to bring Martin to New York from his estate, Ripowam Lodge, in Stamford, Conn., to plead on a Grand Jury indictment.

He was arrested on a charge of abandoning one of his two children. She charges her husband has frequently allowed her and the children to be in want. He hasn't paid her alimony since September last on a Supreme Court order for \$200 a month for their maintenance. Mrs. Martin's attorney said.

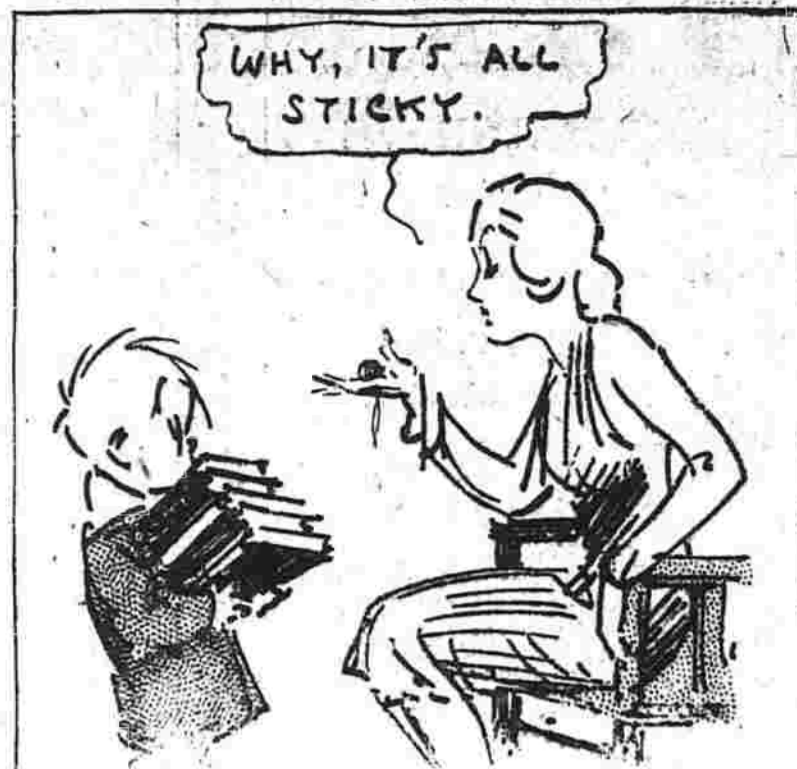

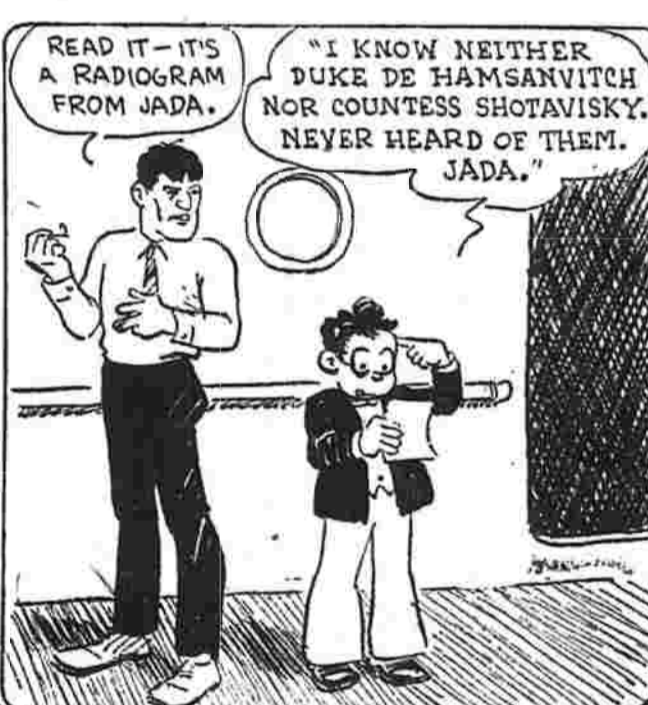

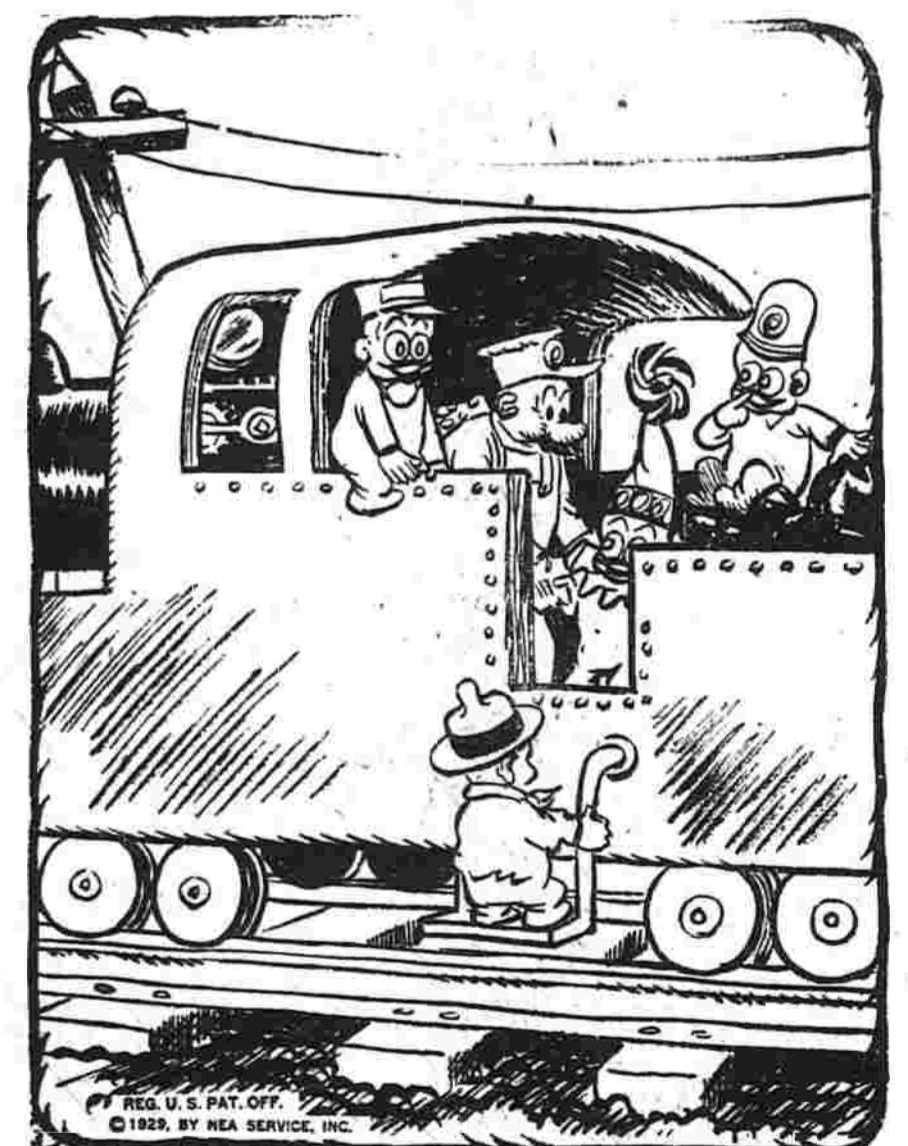
