SEIZE 2,000 QUARTS OF BOOZE ON SOUND

New London, Feb. 10.—(AP)—The quantity of liquor obtained by the Coast Guard in the seizure of the fishing boat Notus had increased to 2,000 quarts today as the result of additional findings under water and on shore near where the vessel was captured Saturday night.

The Notus grounded on the north shore of Long Island about two miles west of Montauk Point Saturday night. Apprised of the grounding, Coast Guard headquarters here notified the destroyer Downes and off-shore patrol boats to proceed to the fisherman's assistance.

BUSINESS NORMAL LAMONT REPORTS

Unemployment Situation Also Improved Says Secretary of Commerce Dept.

Washington, Feb. 10.—(AP)—An approximately normal level in the production and distribution of commodities in the United States for this season was announced today by Secretary Lamont after a study of business survey data received at the Department of Commerce.

He asserted also a conviction that the unemployment situation was more favorable than might have been expected in view of the Stock Market slump last fall.

"It is to be remembered that January and February represent rather low point periods in the calendar schedule of American business," Secretary Lamont said.
