

SLEUTHS AGAIN IN HARTFORD

STATE'S OFFICIALS AT HOLCOMB BIER

Offices at Capitol Closed, Courts Adjourned and Business Stops In Southington. Southington, March 8.—(AP)—Citizens and officials of the State which he served during a long and distinguished career joined today in a final tribute to Marcus H. Holcomb, Connecticut's World War Governor.

Offices at the Capitol in Hartford, Connecticut courts and Southington stores were closed to honor his memory. Members of the Legislature who served during the six years he was governor and former associates who worked with him while he was a Superior Court judge came here for the funeral in the First Baptist church.

Kenneth Wynne, executive secretary, was designated as his personal representative by Governor W. L. Cross, who is in Syracuse, N. Y. Lieut.-Gov. Samuel R. Spencer represented the State as acting-governor.

Many Messages The State military forces were represented by the governor's staff. Unable to attend the funeral, Adj. General William F. Ladd was represented by Colonel George A. Ward.

Since his death Saturday messages paying high tribute to "Uncle Marcus" as he was affectionately known to his intimate associates have poured into the home where the 88 year old former governor resided for many years. Six of his fellow townsmen were chosen as his active pallbearers. They were John Orr, Harold Rogers, Lindsay P. Hutton, Oscar G. Knapp, William E. Smith, and Dewey S. Blake.

The list of honorary pallbearers included many of his former political associates and representatives from nearly every State governmental department. The body which lay in a mahogany coffin was taken from the home to the church at 1:30 p. m. Accompanying it were many floral pieces, from friends, organizations and state officers.

HOOVER SUGGESTS MORE REDUCTIONS

Government Officials Also Tell of Plans To Save Millions Yearly. Washington, March 8.—(AP)—President Hoover took the position today that the best remaining means of slicing Federal expenses is for Congress to help cut down or suspend duties and functions of various government branches.

The President disclosed at a conference with newspapermen that the Cabinet has been canvassing to determine what changes could be made in the activities of government departments that would result in less cash being required from the Treasury.

Frank T. Hines, veterans administrator, has proposed alterations in the law governing allowances and pensions, the President said, which may save as much as \$60,000,000 annually.

Postoffice Routine In addition, Postmaster General Brown has drawn up suggestions for changes in postoffice routine and Secretary Hyde has done similarly for agricultural expenditures, with both moves designed to save millions yearly.

The Chief Executive pledged his aid to the special House economy committee and to the ways and means committee, but said he believed there was little room left for cuts of appropriations under present administrative functions. (Continued on Page 2.)

Three Others Injured While Pilots Are Practising Night Landings. The aviators recently were employed by the Century airlines, following the dismissal of other pilots by the company when a salary disagreement arose. The plane struck the skeleton of an old wind mill.

FAMOUS CASE SHIFTS TO STATE ONCE MORE

JOHNSON'S STORY BEING RECHECKED

Sailor Suspect Cannot Account For Two and a Half Hours of His Time On Night of Kidnaping—Entirely New Angle Also Being Investigated Around Colchester—Jersey Police Discard Theory That Ladder Was Used In Crime—Convicted It Was Inside Job. Hartford, March 8.—(AP)—Three New Jersey detectives conferred with State Attorney Hugh M. Alcorn and County Detective Edward J. Hickey today about the story told by Henry (Red) Johnson, held at Newark for questioning in the Lindbergh baby kidnaping.

They were understood to want information given the Hartford officials who examined John Hansen Junge of Englewood, N. J., a friend of Johnson. Johnson, during the 2 1/2 hours he was questioned Friday and Saturday by Hickey and Alcorn, stuck to his assertion that he spent the night of the kidnaping driving around Englewood with Junge.

Route Retraced The purpose of his hurried trip to Englewood Saturday with Hickey was to have him retraced his route and to check the time. It proved that the distance he mentioned could be covered in about 15 minutes. (Continued on Page 10.)

BOY EMPEROR HEADS MANCHURIAN STATE

Henry Pu-Yi Takes Over Government During Ceremonial.

Changchun, Manchuria, March 8.—(AP)—Henry Pu-Yi, former "Boy-Emperor" of China, who stepped down from the ancient "dragon-throne" and went into exile as a bewildered child 20 years ago, arrived here today for his inauguration tomorrow as head of the new Manchurian federated state.

The former exile came as a jauntily dressed, self-assured young man ready to rule again the land from which three centuries ago his forefathers, the ancient Manchus, descended on China to establish a dynasty of which he was the last sovereign.

Five hundred flags of the new state flew from the locomotive of the special train as it pulled into the station here. The young former emperor was accompanied by his wife and by Chang Ching-Hui and several others of the founders of the new state. He alighted from the train to receive the greetings of General Mah Chan-Shan, governor of Manchuria, and other Manchurian notables.

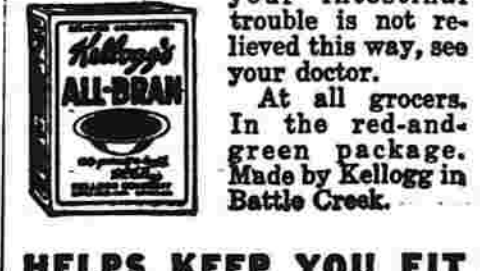

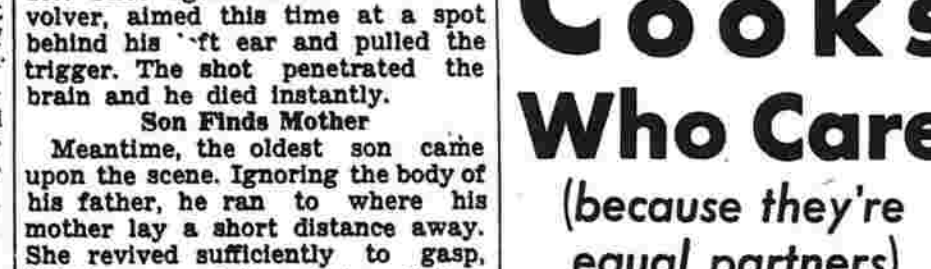

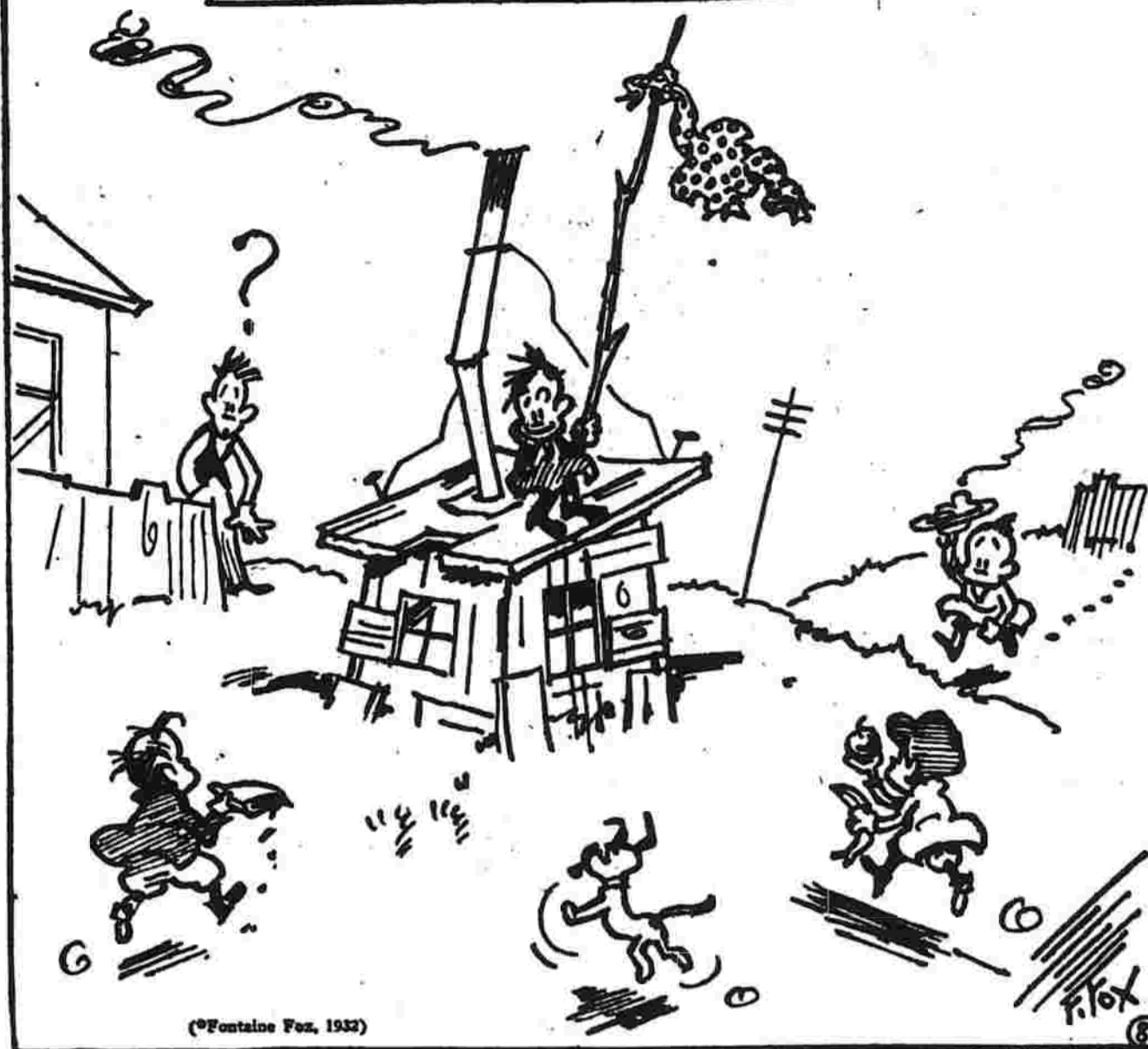
