COAST GUARD BUSY ON DISTRESS CALLS

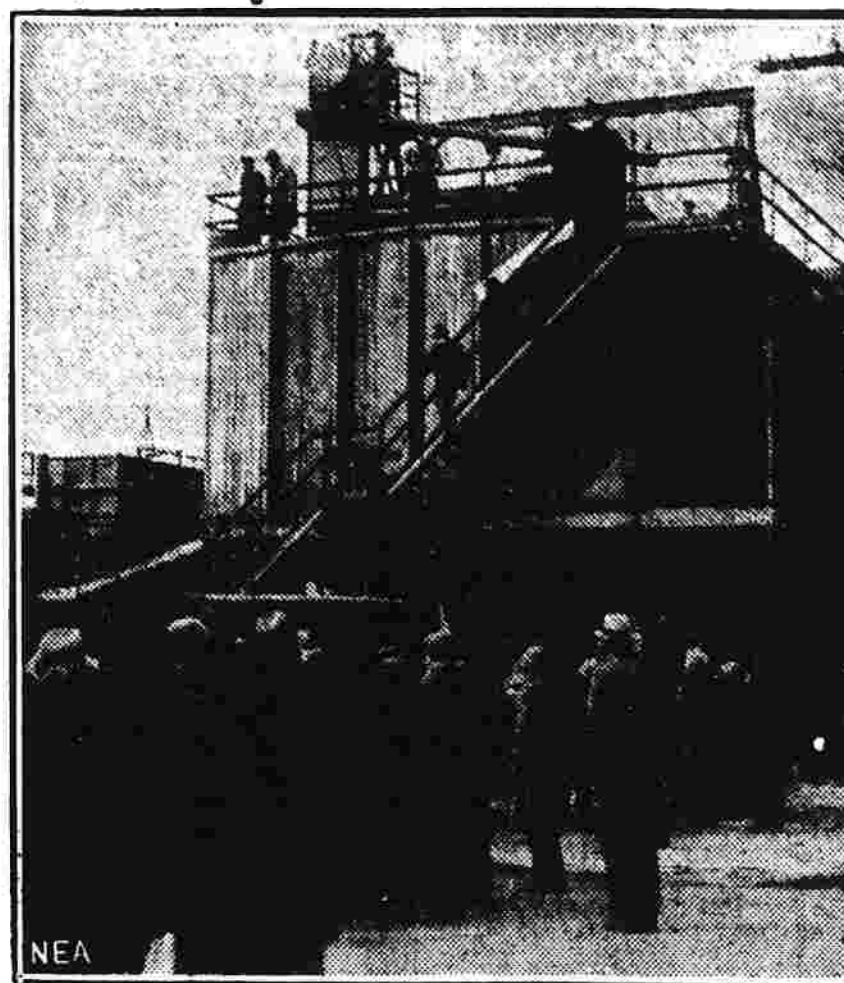
Boats Rush In All Directions As Vessels Report They Are Helpless In Seas.

TIMID CHILDREN NEED SYMPATHY

Mental Hygiene Expert Describes Way to Induce Self-Confidence.

Dr. S. Harcourt Peppard, director of the Bureau of Mental Hygiene, today urged parents of timid children to give them the help, encouragement and sympathy which they need to bring them a more self-confident mental attitude. Dr. Peppard described self-confidence as the mental attitude in which the child recognizes his capacities and limitations in comparison with other members of the group and in which his estimation of himself is such that he is able to make his own decision and to stand up for his rights; has a feeling of comfort and ease in the presence of others.

Lacks Confidence
 The timid child, on the other hand, is shy, self-conscious, speaks volubly, has few friends, answers questions almost ineffectually, strangers and needs constant urging in the presence or to join competitive games. Timid children want to be like others, but their feeling of inadequacy, lack of security and fear of failure in competition prevents them. As a result they resort to day dreaming, to achieve a fancied world of their own making in which it is easier for them to live. With such fantasies and imagined achievements dominating them and becoming their outlet of emotions, they cannot possibly make proper use of their endowments, can never attain any degree of success either in terms of their own standards or in terms of the standards of the group.

 Washington, March 10.—(AP)—R. C. Marshall, Jr., of New York, who headed the Army's construction work during the war, testified to a Senate committee today in favor of a large public works program to relieve unemployment but said a huge new government bond issue to finance it would be a "mistake." The hearing was on a bill by Senator La Follette, (R., Wis.), for a nation-wide building program to be paid for by a \$5,000,000,000 "prosperity bond" issue.

CUMMING TAKES OATH
 Washington, March 10.—(AP)—Hugh S. Cumming today took the oath of surgeon general of the Public Health Service for the fourth time. He predicted later that the current economic situation would result in a change in the relation of the medical profession to the public. He doubted that result would be socialized medicine or state medicine as it now exists in some countries, but he said: "No profession has been so hard hit, as a whole, as medicine, because we can't have moratoriums on the doctors' duties, whether or not financial returns are available," he said. "At the same time the practice of medicine has come to require greater and greater outlays in addition to mental work, and many believe that while service is available to the very rich and poor, it is expensive to the middle classes."

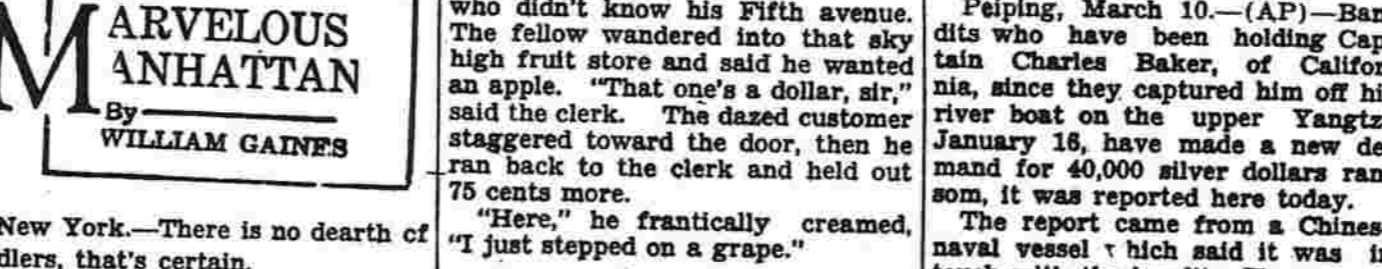

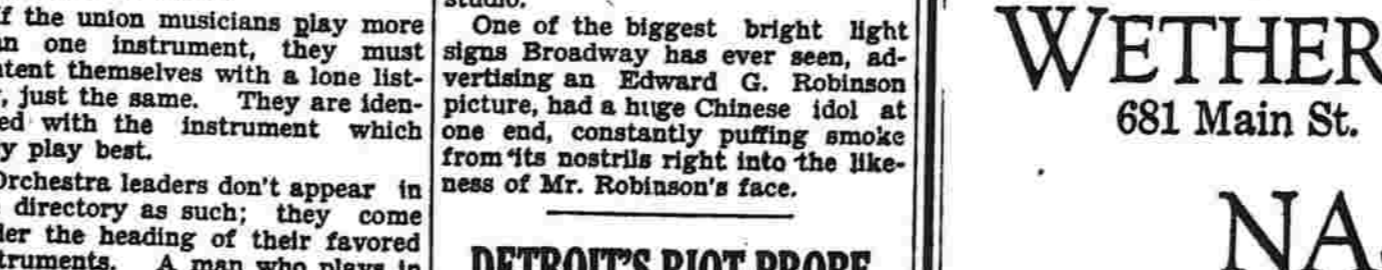
TO DEPORT BORIS

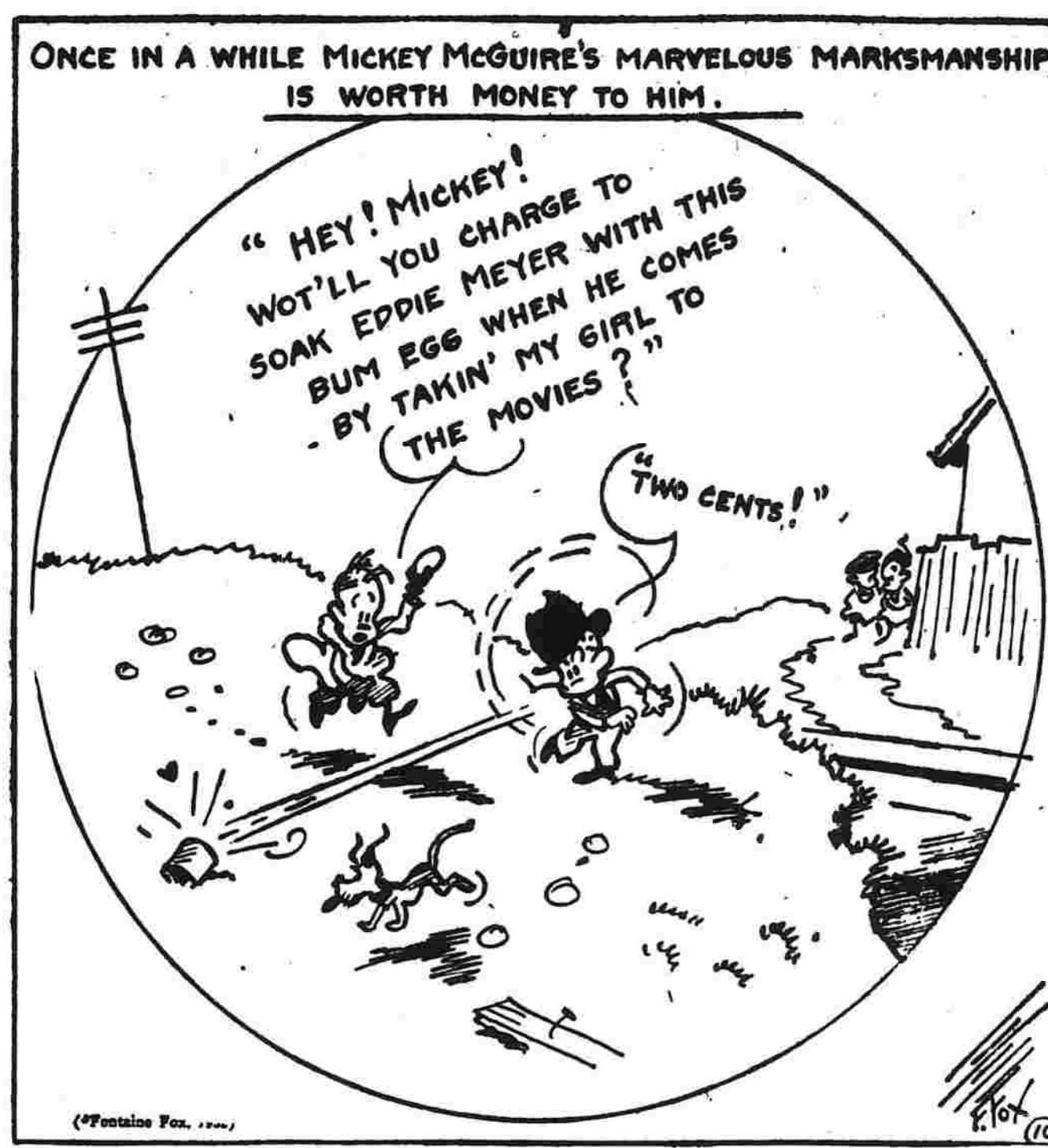
