

PLAN, BOON TO CHENEYS, GETS HOOVER'S O. K.

Silk Association Executive, After White House Conference, Says Cooperative Aid Is Approved.

New York, March 26.—Jacob Widder of Widder Brothers, chairman of the ways and means committee of the Silk Association of America, told the Manchester Herald correspondent today that President Hoover and Secretary of Commerce Lamont advised him in a White House conference that the problem of production control in the silk industry can be readily solved without infringement of the Sherman anti-trust law.

Must Cooperate

Official Washington is convinced the entire question of over-production is one that cooperative action within industry must tackle, Widder reported. President Hoover and Secretary Lamont both analyzed for the silk merchant the success achieved along cooperative lines by cotton industries.

"One point the President emphasized was that industry must avoid all forms of 'price fixing,' he added. However, that so far as production of determined and concerted action with the industry."

HENRY M. LELAND, AUTO MAN, IS DEAD

"Grand Old Man" of Industry Passes Away in His 89th Year.

Detroit, March 26.—(AP)—Henry M. Leland, the "Grand Old Man" of the automobile industry, died early today in Grace hospital, where he had been ill for several weeks. He was 89 years old.

Leland was active up until a short time before he entered the hospital on February 25. He frequently recalled with pride that he had manufactured rifles for soldiers in the Civil War and airplane motors during the World War.

He was president of the Cadillac Motor Company from 1902 until 1917 when it became part of the General Motors group. At the age of 74, Leland organized the Lincoln Motor Co., now a subsidiary of the Ford Motor Company.

Sino-Japanese Parley For Peace Deadlocked

Shanghai, March 26.—(AP)—Negotiations for a Sino-Japanese armistice were very near a breakdown today as the delegates of the two countries adjourned until Monday in order to refer controversial issues to their respective governments.

The meeting today ended with a deadlock on the issue of withdrawal of Japanese troops and only the possibility of substantial concessions on both sides offered any hope of saving the conference.

The negotiations reached a crisis late yesterday, it was understood, when Lieutenant General Kenkichi Ueyeda, chief of the Japanese delegation, informed the conference that the Japanese would not withdraw before six weeks, and then only to a so-called secondary defense line.

PEACE HOPES REVIVED DURING INDIAN PARLEY

Head of National Congress Visits British Viceroy At New Delhi and Terms of Settlement Are Discussed.

New Delhi, India, March 26.—(AP)—Hope for peace between the government and Indian Nationalists was suddenly revived today when it was learned that Mrs. Sarojini Naidu, president of the Nationalist Congress, had a long conversation with Viceroy Lord Willingdon yesterday.

After the conference Mrs. Naidu hastened to Benares where she had a five-hour talk with Pandit Madan Mohan Malaviya, Nationalist member of the round-table conference.

The belief was expressed in political circles that the conference was intended to pave the way for cooperation and conciliation between Gandhi and the viceroy, Pandit Malaviya, who is next to Gandhi in influence in Nationalist India, was reported upon the way here from Benares to discuss the possibility of a solution with Lord Willingdon.

No Predictions Nobody in authority this afternoon would predict that anything concrete would emerge from the present discussions, but additional significance was given the Nationalist move by the fact that Rev. Charles F. Andrews, Gandhi's biographer, who is now at Delhi, cancelled a proposed trip to China in order to try to bring the Mahatma and the viceroy together if possible.

In government circles there is a steadily hardening attitude toward the Nationalists, but those authorities have not disguised the fact that the government would welcome peace overtures from the Nationalists, who, since Gandhi's arrest

Los Angeles, March 26.—(AP)—Special agents of the Santa Fe railway were investigating today an apparent attempt at kidnaping of one or more passengers from the Santa Fe Chief, fast eastbound train, as it left here at 10:30 o'clock last night.

Two men boarded the train shortly before it left Los Angeles and made a thorough search of the train. One of the men, identified as Dan Burke into a compartment and held him prisoner until the train reached the suburb of Highland Park.

DANUBIAN PROBLEM TO BE DISCUSSED

Germany, Italy and Great Britain To Hold Parley In Early April.

London, March 26.—(AP)—The British government has invited Premier Tardieu of France and representatives of the German and Italian governments to come to London early in April to discuss the question of an international agreement among the nations on the Danube.

The prime minister's invitation was sent to the foreign ministers of Germany and Italy at the same time that his invitation to Premier Tardieu went forward. Paris advises said there was every likelihood Premier Tardieu would accept the invitation.

Final Details Final details for the conference are still not arranged but it was officially stated the meeting would be held "early in April."

Parliament will resume its sessions April 5 and it was expected the conference would be held before then. This pointed to the probability of the conferees meeting between next Friday and the following Monday.

The Danubian plan theoretically is a movement toward Aristide Briand's ideal of a United States of Europe. The suggestion that a four-power conference be held before the Danubian states were asked to discuss a federation was put forward by Great Britain.

From Andre Tardieu's original desire was that the first stage of such a federation should be an agreement among the Danubian countries concerning common measures on the basis of preferential tariffs to remedy economic distress.

Congressman Sirovich, of New York, Collapses As He Reaches Private Office

Washington, March 26.—(AP)—The critic of the critics, Representative Sirovich of New York, is seriously ill with a kidney ailment which brought about his collapse yesterday, and he may have to undergo an operation shortly.

The indefatigable little chairman of the House patents committee burst into prominence just a short time ago by lambasting the dramatic critics of the big cities, accusing them of killing the legitimate theater through reckless and unfair criticism of the stage's best offerings.

SENATOR METCALF OUT FOR REPEAL

Announces That He Will Work For Such a Plank In G. O. P. Platform.

Pawtucket, R. I., March 26.—United States Senator Jesse H. Metcalf, Republican, has advised the Pawtucket Times that he intends to work for an 18th Amendment repeal plank in the Republican national platform to be adopted in Chicago.

"To my mind," he wrote, "prohibition has brought about a great moral crisis that can be safely passed only by repeal. Coupled with this moral crisis is the critical and dangerous approach to confiscatory taxation which might well be put aside with the repeal of the 18th Amendment."

BIRD EXPERIMENT, FISH EXPERIMENT

New London Inventor Tries To Fly But Swims In River Instead.

New London, March 26.—(AP)—Willard E. Blain of 57 Jay street today failed in his second attempt to fly like a bird and received a ducking.

Strapped to his ornithopter, a motorless device with bat-like wings and a tail, the local inventor attempted flight off the rail of the State highway bridge, 35 feet above the Thames river at 6:10 o'clock this morning. In his first attempt, last October, Blain crashed while trying to take-off with a truck pulling him.

EVEN THE BUDGET, PRESIDENT'S PLEA; MUST RAISE TAX

WOMAN GAVE TIP TO COPS FOR RAID

Offered 'Plenty of Money' If She Would Keep Quiet About Smugglers.

Stamford, Conn., March 26.—(AP)—Fifty men were under arrest and a steam lighter, a \$250,000 liquor cargo, six trucks and five pleasure cars were in the hands of officers today because a woman refused an offer of "plenty" of money.

The lighter, the William H. Moody of Rockport, Maine, the men and automobiles were seized early yesterday after Mrs. Anna Hill, dweller in a house on the property of a mason's supply company where the vessel was docked, notified police of unusual activity on the wharf.

Louis Pope, 46, of White Plains, N. Y., whom police described as a Westchester county liquor dealer, was arrested in Greenwich shortly after the seizure with Isadore Skulsky, 42, of Fort Chester, N. Y., in an automobile which police said had been seen near the wharf. Their presence in the vicinity led police to believe the cargo was consigned to associates of O'wney Madden, New York underworld character, she called.

Mrs. Hill told police she noticed the arrival of three trucks at the company gate early yesterday, and went to her window. There she called to a man she saw standing at the gate. "Is that you Mrs. Hill?" he asked.

HOOVER APPROVES CHAMBER CAMPAIGN

Chief Executive Endorses Move To Bring Out Record Vote In Fall.

Washington, March 26.—(AP)—President Hoover today formally endorsed a movement to bring out a record vote at the polls in the coming presidential election.

The Chief Executive issued a statement this morning expressing approval of a campaign by the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce to increase by 14,000,000 the number of voters as compared with those in the 1928 election.

ROME CELEBRATES EASTER'S APPROACH

Church Bells and Organs Peal Forth As the End of Lent Is Reached.

Rome, Italy, March 26.—(AP)—Lent was over officially at noon today and church bells and organs, silent since Holy Thursday morning, pealed forth to the capital city of the Roman Catholic world the knowledge that the time had come to rejoice over Christ's resurrection.

Special rituals commemorated the day. In St. Peter's the Pope's Paschal candle, eight feet high and three inches in diameter, was blessed by Cardinal Pacelli. The cardinal lighted the Easter fire by striking a spark from a flint. The "new fire" as it is called, was suggestive of Christ's resurrection.

Describes It As "Keystone of Recovery" in Statement; Confident That Both Parties Are Working For Balancing of Receipts and Expenditures.

Washington, March 26.—(AP)—Describing balancing the budget as the "keystone of recovery," President Hoover said in a statement published today that this "must in the main be accomplished by an increase in taxation."

He added that a further reduction of government expenditures is expected but that the potential savings by this means is not sufficient to avoid heavier taxes.

Voicing confidence that both parties intend to see that the budget is balanced, Mr. Hoover said that unless this is done "the several measures for restoration of public confidence and reconstruction which we have already undertaken will be incomplete and the depression prolonged indefinitely."

In a strong appeal to the people to support and not obstruct Congress in its efforts to bring receipts and expenditures to a level, the President late yesterday asserted that of the \$4,100,000,000 budget, a total of \$2,100,000,000 cannot be reduced and the \$700,000,000 for Army and Navy should not be touched in any manner to impair the strength of the Nation's defense. This leaves but \$1,300,000,000 plus post office expenditures, out of which savings can be made, and then the same cuts in government vital services of the government.

Much saving is possible, the President maintained, through postponement of the least essential activities, elimination of unnecessary functions and "businesslike reorganization" of government activities.

"But when all this is done," he went on, "the balancing of the budget must in the main be accomplished by an increase in taxation which will restore government revenues. Economies in expenditure or increase in taxes alike call for sacrifices—sacrifices which are a part of the country's war on depression.

Even as he was speaking Senator Borah (R) Idaho, was congratulating the House for rejecting the sales tax and asserting the budget could be balanced by cutting expenses.

From the Chamber of Commerce of the United States also came a resolution asking Congress for drastic cuts in government expenditures.

Maryland state police, however, said they placed no credence in the report and were not watching the Washington-to-Baltimore highways.

Speculation was rife as to the Lindbergh statement of yesterday that the information furnished by the Rev. H. Dobson-Peacock and two other Norfolk men was considered to have "no significance."

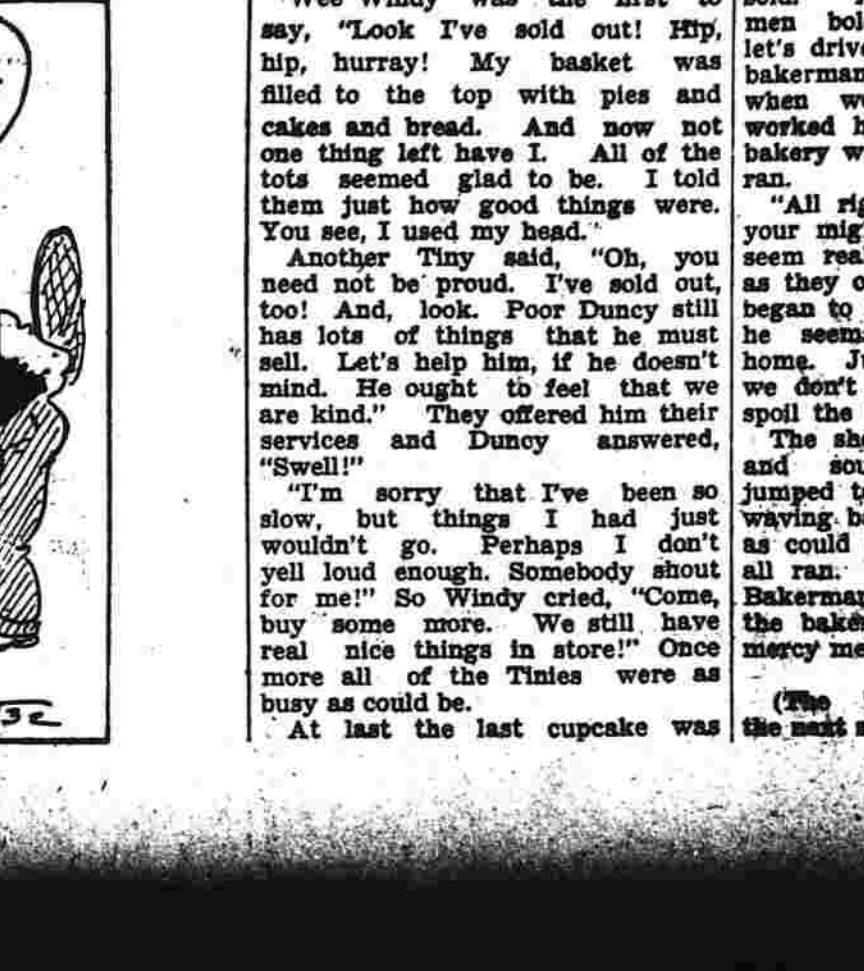

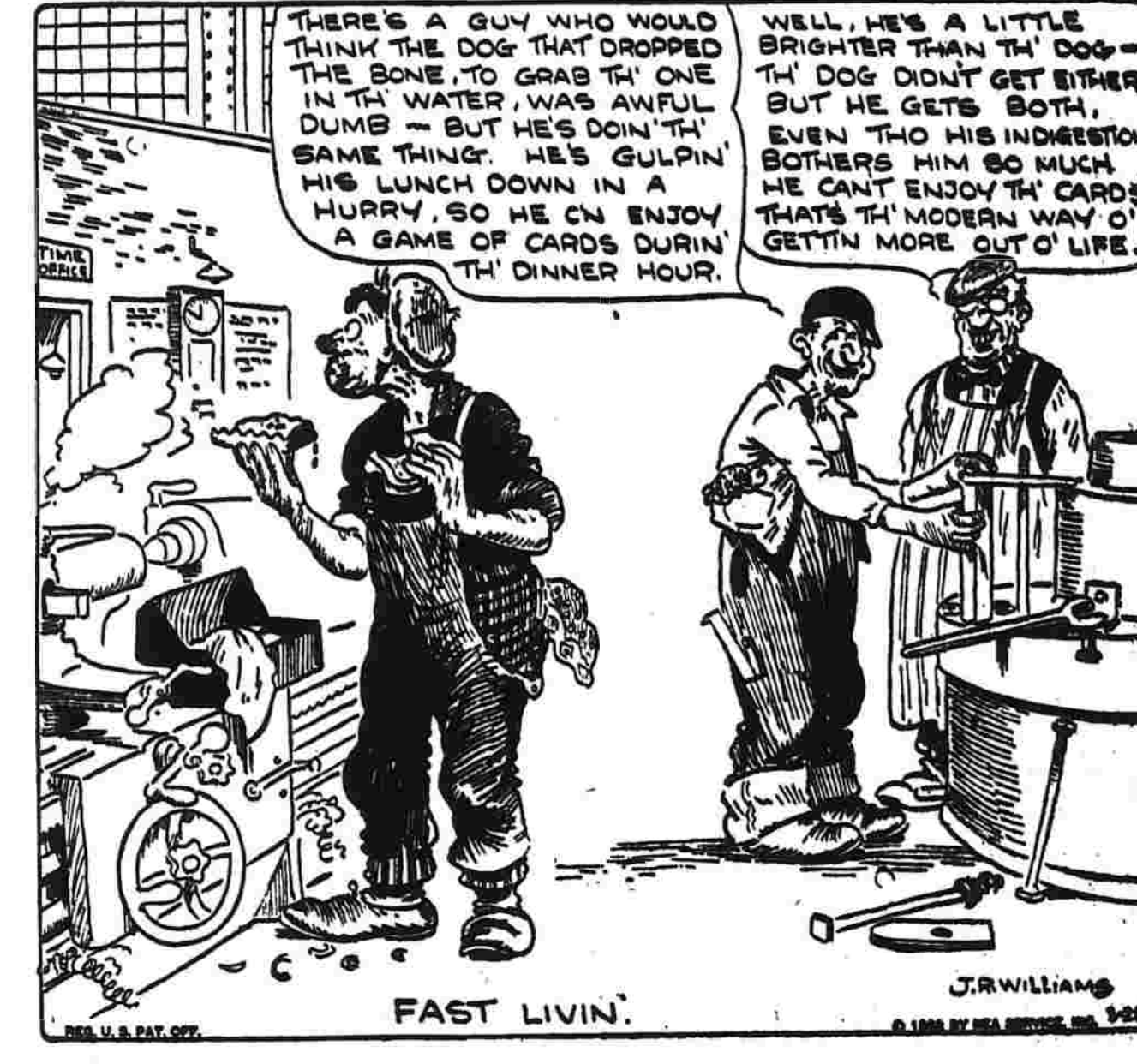
