GARNER TO APPEAL TO HOUSE TO PASS TAX BALANCE BILL

a tax bill that would accomplish this. "I advocated the sales tax because I thought it was the easiest way to balance the budget as a temporary measure," he said, "but the House did not care for that kind of tax. We will have to turn to other taxes to get the revenue to balance the budget."

Must Be Balanced "Unless the budget is balanced foreign exchange will depreciate and I don't know what would happen. You would find the dollar would be affected in foreign exchange."

Asked whether there was growing sentiment in the House to permit the Senate to draft the revenue bill, Garner said: "I hope not."

The Texan said he would make a strenuous fight in order to get enough revenue to meet the running expenses of the government. "If the exchange problem is adjusted and the American people again become interested in foreign investments, as they should be," he said, "I shall be interested in continuing to help the development of South America."

Fisher said he was "much in favor of this legislation or any legislation that will accomplish the purpose, namely: Enable people to pay their debts on the same basis on which they were contracted."

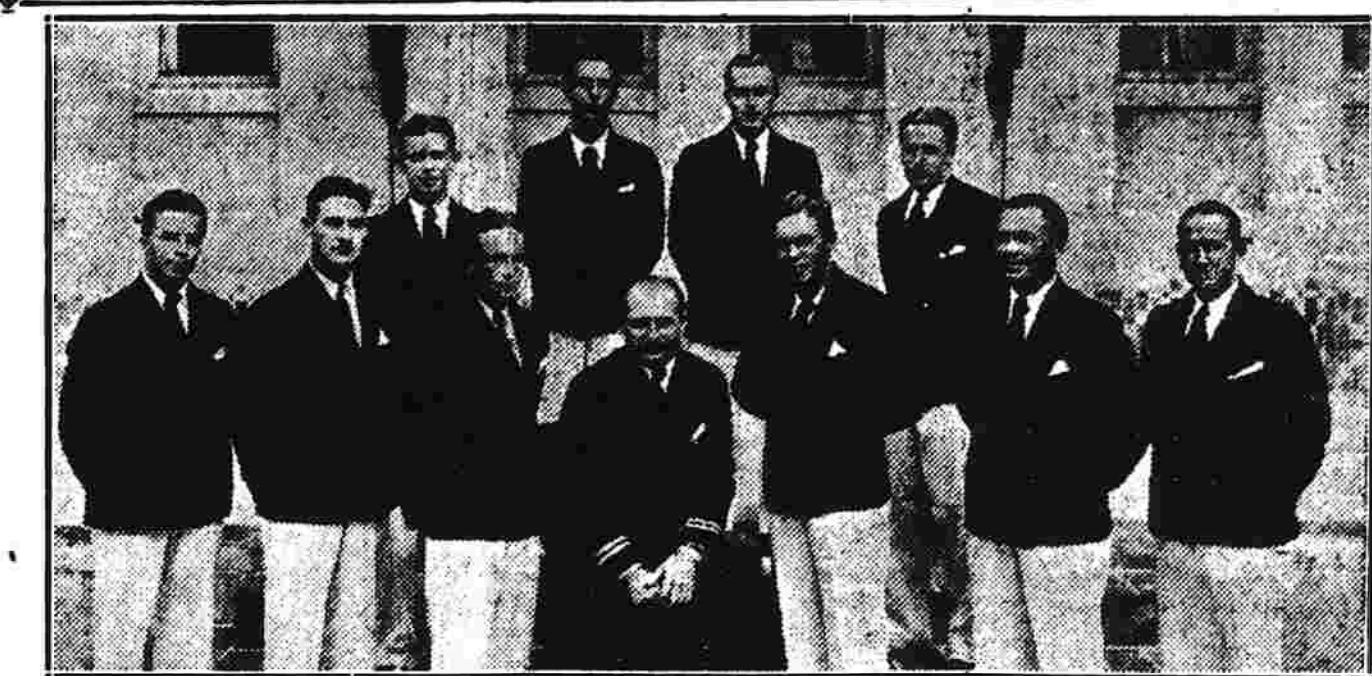

CIVIC ORGANIZATIONS OFFER HOOVER HELP

Washington, March 28.—(AP)—Executives representing 30 National and international civic organizations said today after a visit at the White House they had pledged the entire co-operation of their organizations to President Hoover in "any proper reconstruction measure."

Benjamin A. Ruffin, past president of Lions International, acting as spokesman for the twelve executives present, said they told the President 200,000 jobs had been provided through the efforts of their clubs and "many millions of dollars returned from hoarding."

Ruffin said the President congratulated them upon this effort. Mr. Hoover was quoted as saying, "All problems of this (economic) nature are susceptible to ultimate solution by the people themselves— and only by the people themselves."

Ruffin said the President was informed that the call for a meeting of the executive committee of the Association of Civic Club Executives, had declined today to discuss controversial problems, specifically refusing to enter into a controversy upon the merits of the 18th Amendment, and dismissing also questions concerning bus traffic regulation.

The meeting, he said, was devoted entirely to devising means "to support the administration in any proper move for rehabilitation of the economic fabric."

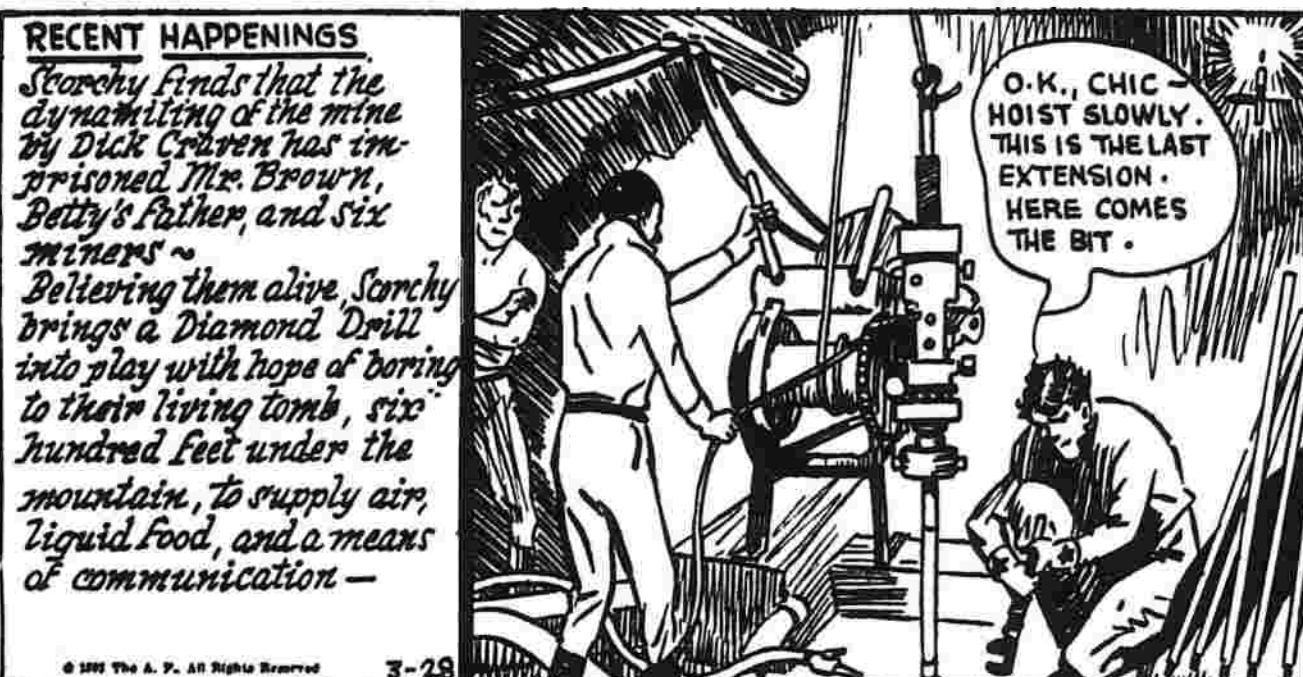
