## A. T. & T. DECLARES REGULAR DIVIDENDS

New York, Aug. 17—(AP)—The American Telephone and Telegraph Company dividend record was kept inviolate today when directors declared the regular quarterly payment of \$2.25 a share.

The company, which ranks as America's premier public utility, is one of few of the nation's first rank corporations which have maintained their regular dividend, course against the onslaught of business adversity since 1929. Standard Oil of New Jersey, American Can, American Tobacco, R. J. Reynolds, National Biscuit and some of electric power companies are others which take rank in this group. U. S. Steel, General Motors Corp. and all but one of the big railroads, Chesapeake and Ohio, have been forced either to reduce or in many cases to omit payment of their regular common dividends.

## FULLY ORGANIZED TO GREET RUNNER

### Sub-Committees For McCluskey Reception Are Named; Date Still Uncertain.

Chairman William P. Quish, presided at a meeting of the general committee on the "welcome home" for Joseph McCluskey, Manchester's champion steeplechaser, held last night and furthered plans for a routing welcome when the pride of the Manchester High school track team and all of Manchester comes home from the Olympic games.

The executive committee last night picked the various sub-committees which will arrange for the ceremony. There was only a skeleton of the general committee in attendance last night, which aroused the outspoken ire of Police Commissioner William B. Rogers.

"I don't mind telling you gentlemen that I am disappointed in the attendance here this evening," said Mr. Rogers. "Here we have a boy who is the second best steeplechaser in the world, who is also a great sportsman, who grew up in the town and attended our schools. His display of sportsmanship when he refused to run the race over, accepting third place instead, when he should rightfully have been entitled to second place, earned him the respect of the world."

"Some time ago we entertained the Lord Mayor of Manchester, England here. We banqueted him and showed him all the honors possible. I insist that we give Joe McCluskey, the same honor we gave the Englishman."

Chairman Quish announced the formation of the four committees in charge of the welcome-home ceremony. The duties of the reception committee are to meet the Olympic runner in Hartford, drive to Depot Square, Manchester, where the parade will form. The route of the parade will be from Depot Square, south on Main street to the South Terminal, countermarching to Center Park where the ceremonies will be held.

A dinner will be given in the Masonic Temple in the evening, to which persons prominent in the athletic world will be invited. The committee decided on a dollar dinner with a view to the economic situation.

It is expected that all marching units including bands, drum corps, fraternities, National Guard units, ex-service organizations will be invited to participate in the parade. It was reported last night that McCluskey is to run in Chicago this week-end, and in letters to his parents he stated that he had intended participating in several other meets along the way before arriving home. Waterbury, Aug. 17—(AP)—Four hundred employees of the Waterbury Clock Company were called back to work this morning bringing the total number of employees up to 1,800. The management also announced a new working schedule by which all employees will work five days and a half a week instead of two or three days a week as in the past. The management also expects to add about 1,000 more to the payroll within a month.

### GERMAN SAVANTS BREAK UP ATOMS

#### Develop Million Volts — To Make Larger Machine To Continue the Experiment.

Berlin, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Sledge-hammer voltages loosed by discharging the entire capacity of electrical energy generated at the big power plant of the German General Electric Company have smashed atoms, it was disclosed today, at a rate which the usual devices no longer suffice to measure the wreckage.

This was revealed by company officials who announced the experiments of their engineers, Fritz Lange and Arno Brasch, had been crowned with success which surpasses even the efforts of the Englishmen, Walter and Cockroft.

The greatest difficulty was encountered in developing a vacuum tube capable of withstanding the terrific force. Alpha particles to one shot at the atoms were produced in a vacuum discharging tube 2.40 meters long, while the velocity of the cathode rays was increased to a range of 10 meters in an amplifying tube.

#### Pierce Lead Plate

The X-rays were so intense they easily pierced a lead plate 20 centimetres thick.

Following the suggestion of the American physicist, Coolidge, tubes were linked one behind the other, whereupon 5,000,000 volts, charging and accelerating the particles to 1,000,000 volts was released. It was said atoms of lighter elements, like lithium, were demolished by the million.

The engineers have dismantled their apparatus and are now building another capable of generating 7,000,000 volts to smash heavier elements.

### WALTOFF FOUND GUILTY ON BAD CHECK CHARGE

Hartford, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Dr. Samuel A. DeWaltoff, 53, president of Savin Rock enterprises in West Haven and New England properties which includes Capitol Park in this city, was found guilty of issuing a fraudulent check and with failure to pay the wages of seven employees at the Hartford park after a long trial before Judge Richard T. Steele in Police Court this morning. Dr. DeWaltoff was represented by Attorney Nathan A. Schatz. The court imposed a fine of \$50 and costs in connection with the issuing of a worthless check for \$75 to Paola Donigilo, leader of the Star Italian Band who claimed that about \$400 in addition remains unpaid after filling engagements at the park during the past few months.

After the court found the amusement park owner guilty of failing to pay wages to seven persons working for him, Prosecuting Attorney Daniel C. Flynn pointed out to the judge that the unpaid amounts totaled between \$1,200 and \$1,500 and asked that the maximum fine, \$50 and costs, be imposed on each count. However, Judge Steele fixed fines of \$25 in each case, the total fines on the seven counts of failure to pay wages amounted to \$175 and costs. The individual unpaid amounts range from \$90 to \$231.

Albany, N. Y., Aug. 17.—(AP)—Because most of his customers lived in the Albany area, Michael Joseph McDonald of Newark, N. J., picked Albany as the scene of his marriage today to Miss Mary Cecelia Burke of Johnson City, Tenn. The ceremony was performed at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, with Rt. Rev. Monsignor Jos. A. Delaney officiating.

For more than a week the guests had been arriving from all sections of the country, and setting up a tent city on the Albany-Schenectady road. License plates on the cars showed that they came from as far west as California and as far south as Florida, with most of the central states represented.

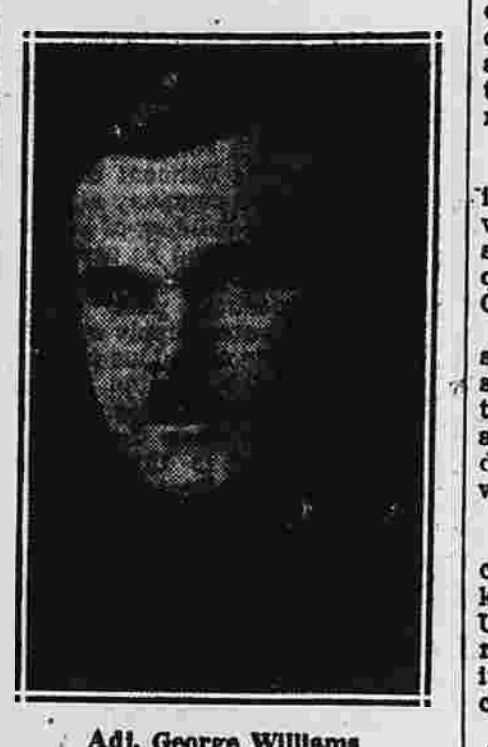
