WAGE INCREASE LEADS TO

FEDERAL EMPLOYEES TO GET WAGE CUT

Senate Committee Believes 30 Millions Can Be Saved In Addition To Other Economies.

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Economies in governmental costs of \$30,000,000 in addition to amounts saved under the existing economy law were recommended to the Senate appropriations committee today by the special committee.

"High up on the list of recommendations was a salary cut of one and two-thirds per cent for Federal employes."

The present four-per-cent reduction of \$ 1.33 per cent affecting Federal employes would be continued another year and to this would be added a flat reduction of 1.25 per cent, making a total of ten per cent.

Chairman Bingham estimated that this would result in saving about \$28,000,000. The ten per cent reduction would apply to enlisted personnel of the Army, Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard, which Bingham estimated would save an additional \$10,000,000.

He gave an explanation for the committee's failure to incorporate in its recommendations the eleven per cent salary reduction recommended by President Hoover.

No less than \$1,000 The recommendations contained a provision that no salary under \$1,000 should be reduced nor should compensation be cut to less than that figure.

A 10-per cent reduction in pensions or compensation to veterans receiving any payments was recommended, with the same \$1,000 exemption. The committee estimated that this would affect 73,629 beneficiaries and result in a saving of \$3,000,000.

Bingham said no widows' pensions would be cut as all were less than \$1,000 yearly.

A restoration of the automatic deductions under civil service law was recommended. These were suspended for one year under the existing law. The new law would increase the payroll of the government during the next fiscal year approximately \$5,000,000.

BANKERS DISCUSS INFLATION AGAIN

Wall Street Does Not Like the Word But Acknowledge It Would Help.

New York, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Inflation once more is the topic of the moment in Wall Street. In proposals in Washington legislative quarters to change the purchasing power of the dollar.

For the most part, Wall Street doesn't like the word, although most bankers readily acknowledge that a conservatively lower value of the dollar, and consequent higher prices of commodities, would be highly desirable.

Inflation is variously defined, but when it works, it is accompanied by rising prices of stocks and commodities. Technically it may be defined as an increase in the circulating medium beyond the current requirements. This means a lower value per unit of currency, and consequent higher prices for what it will buy.

But to accomplish inflation, there must be not only an increase in the medium, but it must circulate. If billions of new money are printed, and merely stored in vaults, prices would not advance, according to the quantity money theory.

FORMER PRESIDENT SHOCKED AT HOOPER; WIFE FINDS BODY

President Is Shocked As He Receives News

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—President Hoover, as said by friends today to have been "terribly shocked" by the news of the death of Calvin Coolidge was given to him at the luncheon table.

The word reached the President from one of his secretaries, who had been informed but a moment before by the Associated Press.

The shock extended immediately to both branches of Congress, as preparations were made to adjourn Senate and House without delay in respect to the late leader.

Knobs of legislators gathered on the floors of the chambers and in corridors discussing the death.

One of the first to comment was Speaker Cramer, who told newspapermen: "I was very fond of Mr. Coolidge personally and knew him very well. He had many characteristics of an outstanding American."

Vice President Curtis told reporters: "I was greatly shocked at the news of the death of former President Coolidge. His passing will be mourned by the peoples of the world. He was a strong man and had the confidence of the people."

Senator McNary of Oregon, said: "It is a tragic and national loss and the whole people will regret it." Senate adjournment came within five minutes after Senator Curtis of Arkansas, who had the floor, announced to the members that he thought the Senate should cease its labors to honor him.

High tribute was paid to Mr. Coolidge in the Senate by its Republican and Democratic leaders—Watson, Indiana, and Robinson, of Arkansas.

"It was a very great man, a very great American and a very great President," said Watson.

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NATION MUST KEEP UP ITS SCHOOLS—HOOVER

Hoover Issues Warning That Nation Must Provide a Right of Way for the American Child.

Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—A warning that the nation faces the acute responsibility of providing a right-of-way for the American child was given today by President Hoover before the opening session of the "Citizens' Conference on the Crisis in Education."

The chief executive placed in a brief address before the meeting called by him to discuss the situation of educational costs to decrease, that there could be no setback in the instruction of the nation's children. "Those in charge of the schools," he added, "must be willing to face conditions as they are, to cooperate in discarding all unnecessary expense, and to carry forward on a solid basis of economy. But the schools must be carried on."

President Hoover's speech was met by applause. "Our nation faces the acute responsibility of providing a right-of-way for the American child. In spite of our economic, social and governmental difficulties, our future depends on the quality of the education which we give to our children."

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EIGHTEEN KILLED AS STEAMER BURNS

Four Large French Steamer To Burn In Four Years; Hint a Sabotage.

Cherbourg, France, Jan. 5.—(AP)—The superb 41,000-ton French passenger liner Atlantic, riddled by fire and with loss of lives at present placed at eighteen, was burning here today 70 miles off Cherbourg.

SENATE DEMOCRATS TO KEEP UP FIGHT

Want Greater Representation For Their Party On Joint Assembly Committee

Hartford, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Senate Democrats have served notice that their fight for greater representation for their party on joint committees of the General Assembly is not over.

These committees will be named next Thursday when the Legislature holds its next session. An attempt is expected to be made at that time by Democrats who control the Senate, to increase their party's Senatorial representation on the committee on the new General Assembly.

The Senate agreed yesterday to adopt the joint rules under which the committees are named, but it did so only at the request of Governor Wilbur L. Cross, who was represented as being desirous of avoiding delay in the formal organization of the new General Assembly.

Much Wrangling Adoption of the rules came just before the inaugural ceremonies were scheduled to begin and following hours of wrangling in both the House and Senate.

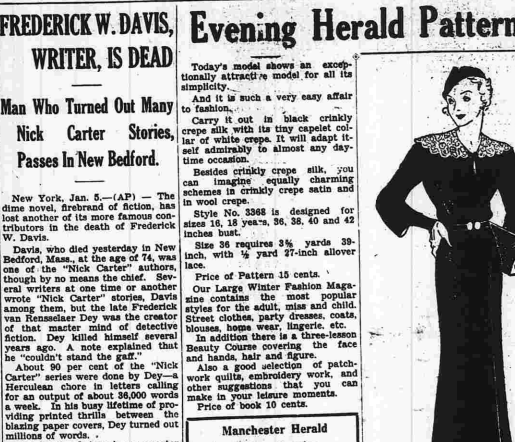

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SOUTHERN RIVERS OVERFLOW BANKS

Break in Levee Floods Thousands of Acres in Missouri; Towns Menaced. The St. Francis river, already flowing through a 150 foot break on the Arkansas side near Beatty, smashed through the main levee two miles north of here early today and sent a flood of water across the Missouri lowlands.

National Guardsmen patrolled the washed barrier last night against possible dynamiting to divert pressure from the Arkansas side west of Beatty where the breach occurred. Levee workers were unable to fill the levee breach, but they were able to build a temporary dike in the Missouri river.

Millions Looped TO PROVIDE JOBS Several Thousand Men Will Soon Be Employed On Various Projects. Washington, Jan. 5.—(AP)—Millions of dollars have been loaned by the Reconstruction Corporation in the last few days to provide jobs for thousands of men on great construction projects in various parts of the country.

The prediction of corporation officials that within six months a total of 5,000,000 men would find many large projects getting under way, appeared to be coming true. The first day of 1933, it was reported, found \$137,700,000 in bridged loans, waterworks and other projects. This brought the total of actual disbursements for self-liquidating loans to \$1,416,335,000 and more money will be going out today.

The checks that went out in the last ten days included \$15,000,000 in state debt contracts, \$4,000,000 in the New Orleans Bell Lines road, \$2,000,000 in the Chicago waterworks to the Middle Rio Grande Conservancy District, Albuquerque, N. Mex. All the loans authorized by the Reconstruction Corporation are not available to the borrower at any time they may call for them if they have to do so. Conditions as the board prescribes. Several additional projects are known to be under way, including a \$1,000,000 refracting from closing the loan to make necessary in order to save interest charges.
