### BERRY OFFERS SHRINK, PRICES RULE STRONG

Auction Association Has Problem as to Sharing Losses on "Sharkey Brothers" Deal.

Robert M. Reid was on the auction block yesterday, relieving his son, Raymond, who up to yesterday had conducted all the auctions of berries at the Charter Oak street market since it opened several weeks ago.

After the auction the growers went into a huddle in a shady corner of the lot and discussed the peculiar problem of the berries bid in on Monday by "Sharkey and Brother," who disappeared on the way to New York without paying for the berries—and without getting possession of them.

It was suggested that these associations ought to limp in a proportionate amount per crate each to make up for the lacking their fellow growers took through the "Sharkey" deal.

This being a pretty involved matter it was decided to leave it for decision at an association meeting to be held later.

It was said around the market yesterday that members had investigated and learned that there is a bona fide produce buyer in New York named Sharkey, but that it was not he who was in Manchester on Monday.

### MAIN TRUCK DRIVERS MUST BUY N. Y. LICENSES

Action Follows Move of Maine Officials Forcing N. Y. Drivers to Do Likewise.

Mamadoneck, N. Y., June 28.—(AP)—Two Maine truck drivers were arrested here today on charges of not having proper licenses on their trucks.

The arrests resulted from a report to police last week by Leo E. Jubb that he was arrested in Maine on a similar charge and had to buy Maine license plates for his truck before he was allowed to drive the vehicle in that state.

The men arrested today were Gerard Potvin, 20, of 146 Oxford street, Lewiston, Maine, whose truck was taken to Mamadoneck police headquarters, and George Barduc of Auburn, Maine. Barduc was permitted to continue with his truck after he had gone to White Plains and purchased New York license plates.

Meanwhile, quiet reigned in the situation created by the differences over Westchester county authorities and Connecticut officials in the matter of taxicabs from the two states carrying passengers across the state line.

### NEW RATES PROPOSED FOR AIR MAIL ROUTES

Washington, June 28—(AP)—Air mail operators were notified today that service rates would be reduced 25 per cent on July 1, pending termination of new rates and route readjustments.

To date, the Postoffice Department announced, there has been no curtailment in mileage of air mail routes.

The order was necessitated by the reduced appropriation for the service, a cut from \$10,000,000 to \$15,000,000.

Operators were requested to submit not later than July 9 their suggestions for the order of preference in which the curtailment on the routes be made.

Representatives of the carriers are expected to meet with postal officials here shortly after July 9 to discuss means of increasing utilization of the air mail.

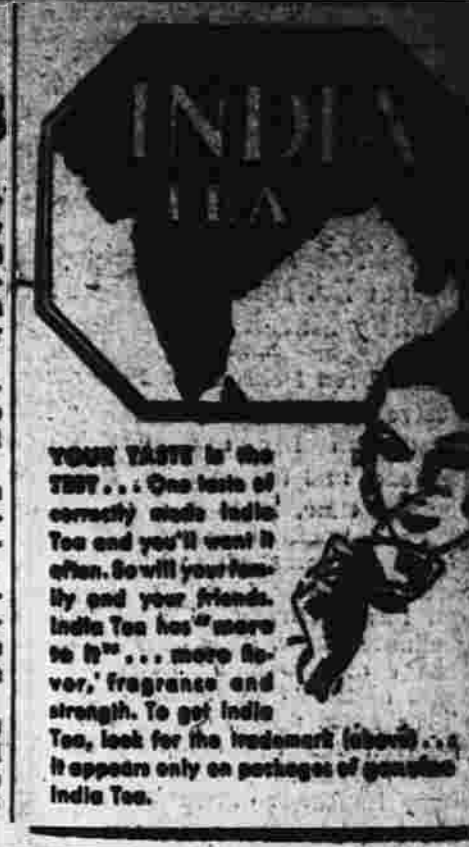
### STEVEN WOODS DIES

### MARVELOUS MANHATTAN

New York.—Wandering near Fourteenth street the other night, I dropped into the famous old Irving Place theater.

Great ghosts of Schiller and Goethe—what a change! Of course it's nothing new about burlesque having taken the house, just as it has taken some well-known temples of high falutin dramatic art uptown.

But it was startling to peep inside for the first time in some years. The foyer and much of the rest of the theater have been decorated in the grille-girle motif. And girles parade across the stage where once tragedians strutted and thundered the lines of the great German dramatists.

In case you've been wondering about the present state of burlesque in New York: all of its familiar situations appear to have survived the "reform" edicts of McKee's temporary administration.

Both there are certain qualities in which they obviously share.

Chrysler, Jr., strictly business when concerned with business, is a collector of objets d'art and the skyscraper which bears his name is one of the most artistic creations of modern architecture.

Walter, Jr., on the other hand, has a tremendous interest in organization and the dollars-and-cents business behind his estheticism.

And, though young Chrysler shies away from his father's machine-made footstep, his father's mid-town tower is headquarters for his artistic enterprises.
