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BANK CHECKS TO BE IN MAIL FRIDAY SURE

Dividend of 22 1/2 Per Cent On Original Deposits in Defunct Trust Company Being Signed by Liquidator

Assurance that checks in payment of a 22 1/2 per cent dividend to depositors in the now defunct Manchester Trust and State Deposit Company would be in the mails for distribution Friday of this week was given by John F. DiNoro, liquidator, at noon today.

Mr. DiNoro said the signature of Mr. DiNoro and \$100,000 must be made out. The total amount to be distributed will go over \$20,000 it was stated.

Mr. DiNoro has been working all day at his task of making out the checks, but he will keep at it despite many interruptions due to other tasks at hand, until he has completed the job. He is certain that each depositor will have his share of the dividend on Friday.

Mr. DiNoro, Attorney William J. Shea and Deputy Attorney Raymond A. Johnson, have striven hard to bring about the payment of this dividend as quickly as possible. It has been a difficult task because of the great amount of work being done in Washington by functions of the NRA. AMERICA TELLS EUROPE TO PAY DEBTS IN GOODS

Secretary Hull Declares Any Proposal for Payment in Goods and Services Will Be Carefully Considered.

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—A pay-in-goods tip from the United States to Europe opened new possibilities today in the \$12,000,000, 000 war debt impasse.

Confronted with almost unanimous refusal to hand over any money, the United States—in a note to Great Britain, suggested partial payments in kind might be acceptable.

Secretary of State Hull strongly disapproved with British arguments for defaulting on the debt installment and First Lord of the Treasury, Ramsay MacDonald, suggested that the United States should be allowed to pay in kind.

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MACDONALD LEADS DEFENSE PROGRAM

Faced With Stiff Opposition As He Enters Sixth Year as Premier.

London, June 13.—(AP)—Faced with some of the stiffest opposition encountered since he took office, James Ramsay MacDonald, beginning his sixth year as Prime Minister of Great Britain, is personally leading his government's defense program.

Mr. MacDonald is as sure that the present administration is the only salvation of Great Britain as he is that moves for permanent world peace will ultimately and inevitably come.

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FARM GROUPS OUT FOR AN INCOME TAX

Grange and Federation at Final Hearing, Urge Relief of Real Estate.

Hartford, June 13.—The final public hearing of the Special Commission to Study the State Tax Laws, held in the Old Senate Chamber of the Capitol yesterday afternoon, was the occasion for the presentation of views of the Tax Committee of the State Grange and of the State Farm Bureau Federation, disclosing the views of the Farm Bureau Federation and the Grange on a sweeping change in the tax structure of Connecticut.

Both groups are on record as favoring an income tax and the Grange committee urged the supplementary of such a tax, if and when necessary, by a sales tax.

The Grange program included a proposal for an advance of one cent in the gasoline tax and a corresponding reduction in the registration tax for motor vehicles. At the same time, the Grange committee urged the repeal of the tax on the sale of real estate.

CHINESE LOCATE JAPANESE ENVOY

Diplomat Missing for Five Days, Found in Nanking, Crisis Is Averted.

Shanghai, June 13.—(AP)—(AP)—Etsuro Kuramoto, Japanese vice-consul in Nanking, disappeared nearly five days ago when Japanese warships speeding to Nanking, was found alive today, wandering about an ancient temple on the edge of that city.

A statement by Japanese authorities here that the missing official had been found was affirmed by Chinese sources.

The Japanese announcement said Kuramoto was well when discovered in the grounds of the historic Ming tombs, on the outskirts of Nanking.

Drive Launched to Cut Building Prices and to Aid Home Owners.

Washington, June 13.—(AP)—A plan is in the making to cut the high cost of home, sweet home in a nationwide campaign. This drive to reduce building prices is said to have two objectives.

1.—To spur President Roosevelt's housing program, designed to increase the building of new homes and the repair of old ones, and stimulate the lagging construction industry.

2.—To carry out NRA's avowed policy of keeping prices from mounting to astronomical heights.

WIFE WHO KILLED MATE A SUICIDE

Mother of Two Children Brooded Over Murder of Her Husband.

Kansas City, June 13.—(AP)—Mrs. Dolly Elwell, Chicago, the mother of two children, registered a self-inflicted bullet wound early today after months of brooding over the murder of her husband, a deed of which she was exonerated.

An unsigned note found in the hotel room where she fired a bullet into her head late yesterday sent police on a search for the two children, James, six, and John, 19 months, over whom Chicago relatives expressed concern.

On Monday, Mrs. Elwell had taken the children with her to Kansas City two months ago. They were not with her when she registered at the hotel Monday.

Draws 3 Wills in 4 Days And Creates Legal Tangle

New Haven, June 13.—(AP)—Vincenzo Deangelis, drew three wills within four days before his death, as a result created a legal tangle for Judge John L. Gilson of the Probate Court to unravel.

Deangelis died Sunday. On June 8 he drew his first will. Two days later he made a second will, and on June 10 he drew a third will. Three different lawyers were summoned by Deangelis to assist him in drawing the three documents.

With his death, four lawyers representing three parties sought custody of the body and the case was referred to Judge Gilson.

The court ruled the body shall be turned over to Attorney Crapanzano because the latter was named executor in the most recently dated will. The court, however, deferred until a later date its decision as to which will shall be admitted to probate.

This is a decrease of 1.7 per cent over the 1933 tax levies. The tax commission's report also showed that the current grand list of the 120 towns of the state total \$2,953,122,924, and that this is a decline of \$90,419,175 from the previous year's total local assessments. This represents a drop of approximately 3 per cent.

Cleveland Doctor Pictures What Will Be Done in the Near Future.

Cleveland, June 14. (AP)—A new type of heart surgery promising an avenue of escape from the present transference of heart death to the lungs, was reported today by Claude B. Beck, Cleveland surgeon.
