## NATION'S BUSINESS KEEPS IMPROVING

### Henry Ford Declares Industrial Picture Looks Better All the Time — The Interview.

Detroit, June 20.—(AP)—Henry Ford, in an interview today, expressed the conviction that "the industrial picture looks better all the time," and that "things are getting better in spite of everybody grabbing up all they can get."

"Things are very much on the up-grade," the automobile manufacturer said, "and have been since people made up their minds to get out and work."

Ford said that although he had not given much attention to the activities of the session of Congress just closed, he thought it "quite natural that people should breathe a sigh of relief when Congress goes home and that business should 'stretch' and start out anew."

Discussing general industrial conditions, Ford said that there is bound to be "an occasional slump—a kind of a vacation." He added, at the same time, that the country can "get along very successfully on a five day week."

Then, as an after-thought, he went on: "The six hour day and five day week would have been here by now if they had let things alone. We did not indicate whom he meant by 'they.'"

"The six hour day is coming because with improved machinery, you can do more faster and more times is needed to consume them," he continued.

Of recent price reductions in the automobile industry, Ford said the minute a price reduction is in order the manufacturer might just as well cut prices, because, "everybody is looking for it, anyway."

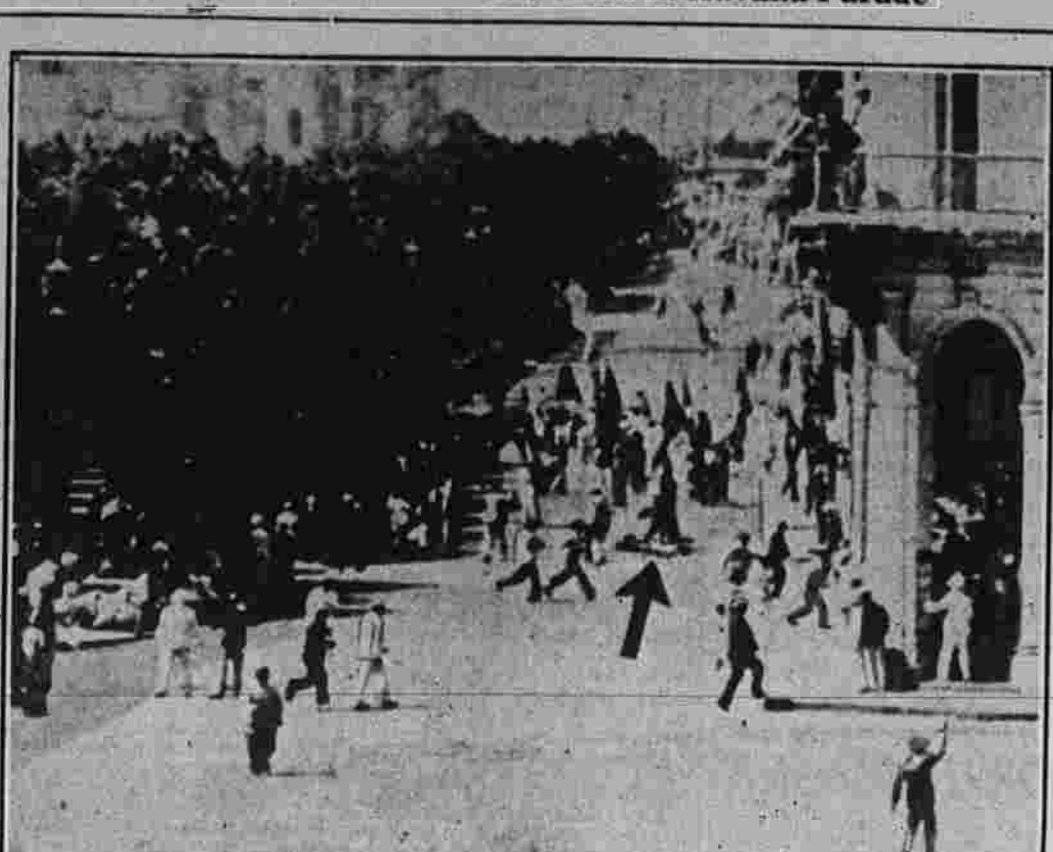

## NO BLOOD STAINS FOUND ON ADVENTURER'S TRUNK

### Vienna Chemist Positive In Report on Capt. Poderjaj, Center of an International Mystery—N. Y. Report.

Vienna, June 20.—(AP)—Those stains on the inside of a trunk in the apartment of Capt. Ivan Poderjaj, husband of the missing Miss Agnes Tufterson of New York and Detroit, were not blood.

"They are not blood, that is certain," said a police chemist today after an exhaustive scientific analysis. "Just what they are we still have not discovered, but they aren't likely to prove significant."

The investigating police stated a theory that Poderjaj, when taken last week from the arms of his present wife, Susanne Ferrand, was about ready to go to other fields of endeavor.

"So far as we are able to discover," said police officials, "Poderjaj has no more than \$25 he could buy his tickets on. Of all the money Ferrand's money of 100 schillings and about \$25—remained when she was arrested."

**In Hard Straits**

The Vienna investigators said they thought if they had not taken Poderjaj into custody, the woman would have soon sold the furnishings of his apartment to finance a few more months of idleness here, then would either have had to go to work or discover another less enviable source of supply.

"They said the former method of providing for his needs was incompatible with his record and that they believe he was already in touch with his next 'prospect.'"

"They were checking a report that Poderjaj traveled to London, last month on a forged passport and said they believed it possible that such a journey would indicate the 'prospect' lives there."

**Just Another Victim**

Miss Ferrand's attorney, Leopold Bestermann, insisted his client was "just another victim of Poderjaj" without guilty knowledge of his affairs. He declared he was convinced that she was in grave personal danger from the man she married in London and that only his sudden arrest saved her.

Bestermann pointed out that she has no relatives anywhere who would be likely to notice her disappearance. The police, however, express the view that Poderjaj was merely planning to abandon Miss Ferrand as he did a woman in Budapest, Austria who has told the Yugo-Slav police that she is Poderjaj's wife.

"They quizzed Miss Ferrand this morning and afterward said they no longer view her as a suspect in the disappearance of her husband, that they believe she still was withholding information."

The technical charge on which she is held is that of suspicion of having profited by another's crime. Previous, Poderjaj told police he and Miss Ferrand were married in London, but he reversed himself and said the wedding was not legal.

## PRESIDENT IN ELM CITY TO GET YALE DEGREE

### Prof. Phelps' Speech Presenting President

New Haven, Conn., June 20.—(AP)—President Roosevelt was to be presented at Yale University today by Prof. Phelps, who addressed the Yale alumni luncheon after the Yale had conferred on the President a honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

"Pray God our greatness may not fall through craven fears of being great."

"He is man of today and uses modern methods. He fits through the air; and his winged words are heard in millions of homes. On the radio he is a great artist; for he speaks to the whole nation as he were conversing with an individual. This is something higher than mere art; everyone who comes in contact with him feels his warm, spontaneous and sincere affection. He is well-named with the energy of Roosevelt with the calm of Franklin."

"The Yale Brotherhood appreciates the honor that Yale University receives today in the visit of the President of the United States; and we are glad to count him among our alumni not only for the dignity of his office but for himself."

In conferring the degree on Mr. Roosevelt, the Yale president said: "By the presence of your people in a place of courage and good cheer, with patience and good humor, you have brought high intelligence and complete devotion to the cause of the Presidency of the United States. You are one of the most important and one of the most influential positions that any individual in our world can hold. We have a President who is not afraid of that responsibility. He might say in the words of Emerson: 'I am not a man of words.'"
