## HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES 211 THIS MORNING

### Commencement Program at State Theater Takes Form of Pageant — Last of Large Graduating Classes

Diplomas were awarded to 211 graduates of Manchester High school this morning, no doubt the last of the big graduating classes to complete four years in one body, since half year commencements will be inaugurated with the new school year. Today's exercises were held

at the State theater, the program beginning shortly after 10 o'clock. Members of the class, attired in slate grey gowns and trowsers, marched from the high school building to the theater, led by President William Gray and Vice-President Pearl Dreger.

Pageant Presented  
Following their seats in the front center rows of the theater as Fred Lavy, a member of the class, played a stirring march of his own composition, the graduates were soon ready for their last activities as high school students. The entire program was built around an original pageant, "Chimes of Service," a pageant written by members of the senior class and acted by 63 seniors followed.

Margerie Wilson and William Gray, two students who were tied for the second highest honors, were the principals in Part I, "The Graduate Views the Future." William Gray, as the graduate who has come to the end of four years of hard studying, "feels the strain of his illusions of the possibility of leading a life of service have been shattered. 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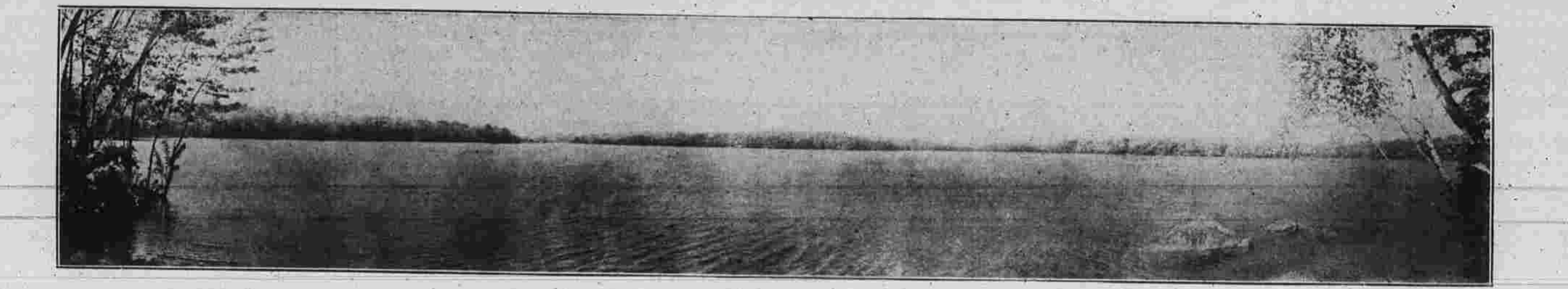

**SEE PLAN TO CUT PRICE OF LIQUOR**

**Federal Officials Decree Bottles Must Bear Geometric Identification Marks.**

Washington, June 21 (AP)—By decree that every liquor bottle must bear indestructible marks of identification Secretary Morgenthau has today ordered that the price of liquor be cut.

Mr. Morgenthau's order is a result of a resolution of the House of Representatives passed last week. The resolution provides for a 10 percent reduction in the price of liquor.

The plan is to require that every liquor bottle must bear indestructible marks of identification. These marks will be used to identify the bottles and to ensure that the price is kept down.

The marks will be in the form of a geometric shape, such as a square or a circle. They will be placed on the bottle in a way that makes them impossible to remove without destroying the bottle.
