

TRADE BOARD PREPARES TO FIGHT PRICE CUTTING

Federal Commission to Make Test Case to Prove NRA's Powers; Middletown Firm Involved in Test.

Washington, June 23.—(AP)—A major engagement over the issue of price fixing is to be fought out soon before the Federal Trade Commission.

Obviously, the dispute involved only the comparatively small interests of three rubber companies, but developments seem likely to transform it into another celebrated industrial case, which would basically affect NRA's price control powers.

Several code authorities planned today to jump into the case. The rubber code authority accuses the three companies of violating the code by refusing to file a list of prices with the authority. The firms are the Phillips Baker Rubber Company of Providence, R. I.; the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company of Akron, Ohio; and the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company of Middletown, Conn.

An object of the battle is to determine industry's right to fix or refuse to fix prices.

The Complaint

The complaint charges that the three companies diverted trade to themselves, to the injury of their competitors and the public, on the basis that they sold goods at less than listed price.

The issue assumed importance last week when the code authority filed a complaint with the Federal Trade Commission, charging that the three companies, by selling their goods at less than listed price, were in violation of the code.

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Open Price Plan

Proponents of the open price plan argue that the waiting period is necessary to inform all competitors and to prevent quick changes, usually a prelude to cut-throat price competition.

Opponents argue that it simply gives dominating concerns a chance to force others into line if the latter have prices considered too low.

Failure to file prices, many contend, gives the non-filing concern an advantage because it can change prices easily without informing competitors.

Price Policy

NRA recently issued a price policy in which methods of price control were drastically restricted.

An open price plan with a waiting period was forbidden in new codes. Existing codes would be changed to require each of a series of price filings.

The trade commission's decision in the rubber case would set a legal standard and would help to clarify the stand NRA must take in the future.
