TO ASSIGN 43 TO CCC CAMPS

Next Quota Will Leave Manchester for Forest Work in July.

During the past year many Manchester young men have been called to serve in the Connecticut CCC camps. Many of those who went to camp knew but little about the forests, road building, bridge building or any of the mapping and engineering in which they are members of the camp later become proficient. In addition to the regular routine of the camps these local youths also were given an opportunity to drive trucks, official camp cars, and in the semi-military regime that formed a part of the camp routine, they became a part of the camp police force. Leaders of groups in the various operations about camp and in the woods.

Attend Danvers. Although the state CCC camps are located for the most part a considerable distance away from town and cities the boys were given an opportunity to attend social dances in town, bowling matches, baseball and basketball games and many, mutually inclined, were permitted to represent their camp and the CCC in general on several broadcasts over local stations.

Altogether the benefits gained by the 100 or more boys who served since the organization was sent into the woods, are many and varied. Many of those who were discharged by reason of having served their six months, were ready and willing to sign up again were it not for regulations which prevented men once having served, again to enter the camps.

Housed in Tents. The first detachment, boys taken from the lists of the towns and from families who were recipients of aid, assisted in the establishment of the camps. Originally, the boys were housed in army tents which were replaced with permanent barracks during last summer when it was definitely found that the CCC camps were to be continued as one channel through which the unemployed boys might be given work and taken off the highways and streets.

Large Quota. In continuation of the CCC program, Manchester will again place a large quota of men in the forests and in July. Those who have served since the first of the year will be discharged and 43 recruit members will be assigned to the various camps, in addition to a number of skilled tradesmen, such as cooks, truck drivers, engineers' assistants, dynamic men, blacksmiths, automotive mechanics and other like trades. Applicants are now being filed in the charity office under the direction of Assistant Charity Superintendent Albert Behrend and selections will be made in the order of registry.
