HARRIMAN GETS FOUR AND HALF YEAR SENTENCE

Former President of New York Bank Charged With Falsifying the Entries in His Books.

New York, June 27.—(AP)—Joseph W. Harriman, former president of the Harriman National Bank and Trust Company, was sentenced today to four and one-half years in prison on a conviction of causing false entries in the books of the bank.

Federal Judge John C. Knox directed that Harriman be committed to the custody of the attorney general of the United States for confinement in the penitentiary for a period of four and one-half years on each count on which he stands convicted.

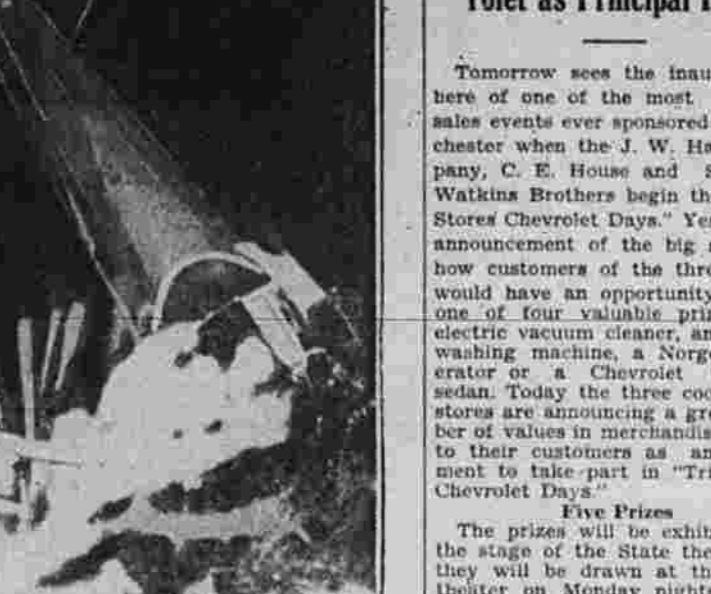

Philadelphia, June 27.—(AP)—Milton C. Work, instructor and adviser to millions in the international realm of auction and contract bridge, died early today in a Philadelphia hospital. He was 69.

MAN TELLS POLICE HE WAS FORCED TO WRITE FOUND NEAR THE BODIES.

McAlester, Okla., June 27.—(AP)—Pittsburgh county authorities, seeking to determine who killed three highway workers and puzzled Sheriff Bob Lackey and W. C. Cunniff, assistant county attorney.

Bus Riley in a sworn statement named Bill Moore and George Baker as the killers of William Gann, Homer Bondley and Honor Watkins. Baker and Moore flatly deny the story.

Riley was revealed as the author of the note found near the bodies Monday in the hills outside McAlester, where the victims lived. It read: "Jack Rackley, Bill Moore and George Baker killed Homer and Hobart and maybe so."

At first investigators assumed it was written by the third victim, Gann. Later they learned it was Gann's handwriting and expressed the belief it was written by one of the killers as a false clue.

Owners of the passenger vessels described a drinking party at Baker's home Sunday afternoon, at which Baker told him he had "met a couple of fellows away and Bill Moore told his man out of the way, too."

Riley said Baker after sobered somewhat and, drinking, he had "talked too much," marched Riley at the point of a double-barreled shotgun through the woods to the spot where the slain men were found the next day.

It was then, Riley said that he scribbled the note on a campaign card while Baker threatened to shoot him if he did not write it.
