GERMANY'S DEFAULT

Blames Reich's Financial to Raise Armies.

-Washington, June 29- (AP) -The United States protested today against Germany's moratorium on against Germany's moratorium on \$1,500,000,000 in obligations held by Americans, blanking the Reich's finnacial plight on Nazi policies.

Secretary of State Hull handed the German charge d'affaires a note last night which said:

"The German government is no doubt aware that its policies have created opposition in many parts of the world which has expressed itself in various trade conflicts and the probable reduction of Germany's

probable reduction of Germany's capacity to transfer."

It was the first American move in a diplomatic campaign to modify drastic provisions in the moratorium whereby Germany suspended interest payments on external debts. Silent on Boycotts Hull did not mention anti-Jewish

Hull did not mention anti-Jewish measures which have brought boycotts on German goods, but observers agreed his note was broad enough to include such policies.

The United States recognizes that Germany's ability to pay has been limited by a shortage of foreign exchange. Hull said, but he hinted that if certain policies were modified trade might increase, allowing Germany to pay.
