

### WOOLEN STRIKE SET FOR TODAY IS CALLED OFF

### Union Organizer Says Isolated Locals May Walk Out But Efforts to Be Made to Keep Them Working.

Providence, R. I., July 2.—(AP)—A threatened general strike in the woolen industry, scheduled for today, has been postponed.

Joseph A. Sylvia, organizer of the United Textile Workers of America, said isolated locals might walk out, but added the union would exert every effort to get them to return to work.

The postponement was voted yesterday at a meeting of union delegates from the six New England states and New Jersey and Pennsylvania.

Action Endorsed

The 425 delegates endorsed the action of their national leaders, who agreed at Washington conference last Thursday to "withhold" the strike. The union's executive council was instructed, however, to wire the new industrial board set up by the NRA for an "immediate" adjustment of the machine load situation in the woolen mills.

Sylvia declined to say how long the council would wait for a "timely" adjustment of the machine load proposal.

### ASSERTS NEW DEAL MUST BE A SUCCESS

### Historian Declares That Roosevelt Is Last Hope of Democracy and Capitalism

University, Va., July 2.—(AP)—Harry Elmer Barnes, historian, professor and author, called President Franklin D. Roosevelt the "last hope of Democracy and Capitalism" as he addressed a round table forum of the Institute of Public Affairs here today.

Speaking on "Dictatorship and Democracy," Mr. Barnes said "If the New Deal collapses we have the stark reality of Fascism and then Communism standing in the face."

"It is the New Deal, castor oil of the firing squad, if the New Deal fails," he continued, "there will be neither Democrats nor Republicans in 1940. The partisan controversy in this country today at least Democratic-Republican controversy, is two men angrily debating about a heavy dew in the path of the Johnson Road."

Mr. Barnes quoted from Thomas Jefferson, founder of the University of Virginia, which is sponsoring the institute, in justification of the "Brain Trust." He said that some might see grim irony in a group of American historians and publicists gathered at Jefferson's university over a Fourth of July period, in solemn deliberation about the collapse of Democracy and individualistic Capitalism.

### 6 VIOLENT DEATHS OVER THE WEEK-END

### Shooting, Two Drownings, Explosion Victim, But Only One Fatal Auto Accident.

(By Associated Press)

Violent death traveled a diversified course through Connecticut over the last week-end taking a toll of six in a shooting, two drownings, a fire, and a motorcycle crash.

Lavi Jacobs, about 40, of New Haven, shot Mrs. Elizabeth Thornton, 30, in what police said was a lover's quarrel and then killed himself with the same gun, Saturday night. Both Jacobs and Mrs. Thornton were negroes.

Earl Carpenter, 23 year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Llewellyn Carpenter of Canterbury, drowned Saturday night in the Quinipiac river at Fairfield, while swimming the river with three companions. His body was recovered two hours later by a state trooper.

Another Drowned

George Horvath, 63 years old, employee of the E. Wallace Silver Company in Wallingford, drowned in the Quinipiac river there late Sunday, presumably while swimming and according to the restraining order of police and firemen to join them.

Mrs. Theresa Cassidy, cook, and Miss Portway, governess, each of whom thought the other had returned to earth. He hit in recently by leaving from the second floor.

Trapped in a firework's boot, the contents of which had been set afire by a lighted cracker, thrown from outside, Mrs. Etta Quinto, 45, of New Haven, was burned to death Saturday night when she died Sunday morning in the New Haven hospital.

John Kelly, 36, of Fairfield, was killed almost instantly early Sunday when he was struck by an interstate bus on the Post Road in Fairfield. The driver of the bus, Lester David French, 26, of Rockville, Conn., will be arrested, police said.

Anthony Morozovitch, 23, of Hazardville, died in the Emergency Room in Thompsonville, early today, from injuries suffered when he was thrown from his motorcycle on the highway in Hazardville Sunday night. Police said the cycle struck a stone.

### BONDS FORFEITED

### PRESIDENT STARTS OFF ON HIS OCEAN CRUISE

### To Visit American Possessions in the Atlantic and Pacific—To Stop at Haiti on Thursday.

Aboard the U. S. S. Gilmer Accompanying President Roosevelt, July 2.—(AP)—President Roosevelt turned to the open sea today, striking out on his historic journey toward a round table for July 2 as the American possessions of the Atlantic and Pacific.

The cruiser Houston, carrying the President, neared Hampton Roads at dawn for a final exchange of official papers after a cheering send-off as darkness fell last night at Annapolis, Md.

From Hampton Roads, the President goes to the high seas, stopping briefly at Haiti, Thursday before landing at Puerto Rico Friday to travel across the island.

A gay flotilla of small craft surrounded the Houston in midstream at Annapolis and shrieked farewell to the happy President, bent eagerly on his sea vacation.

### HINDENBURG MOVES TO SAVE VON PAPAN FROM HITLER'S RE CONSPIRATORS ARE TOLD THEIR HEADS WILL ROLL

### VICE CHANCELLOR TO BE DISMISSED

Berlin Reports Say That Goering Will Succeed Him—Special Police Still Patrol Capitol Streets—18 Nazi Leaders Were Executed in Saturday's "House Cleaning"—Situation in Germany Remains Tense.

Vienna, July 2.—(AP)—The newspaper "Telegraf" in a dispatch from Linz said that Goering had arrived there from the Austrian border this morning. He had heard cannon fire in the direction of Munich.

There was no confirmation as yet of the reports.

The travelers insisted they clearly heard uninterrupted artillery fire.

It was recalled that the February artillery bombardment in Vienna, Austria, had been heard for some distance. Those reporting today's firing seemed clear as to its location except that it was somewhere between Passau, Germany, and Munich.

Berlin, July 2.—(AP)—A bold stroke from President Paul von Hindenburg today, calling the Reichstag to the defense of Vice Chancellor Franz von Papen's safety, was quickly followed by advice from usually well informed quarters that the vice chancellor would resign, or would be ousted at the instigation of Chancellor Hitler, probably tomorrow.

Advisors said that President Hindenburg would succeed von Papen in the vice chancellery.

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### Executed As Rebel In Reich Mutiny

Leader of the storm troopers in Berlin, Karl Ernst (above), was among the conspirators who died in the short-lived revolt. He was seized in Bremen and it is reported, was brought by plane to Berlin, where he was executed.

The number of deaths in the week-end upheaval was fixed unofficially today at 18.

HUNDREDS ARRESTED

Berlin, July 2.—Scores of Nazi storm troop sub-leaders, possibly hundreds, have been arrested throughout Germany in Chancellor Hitler's ruthless "house cleaning." It was learned today.

The sub-leaders were arrested in wholesale fashion, after a week-end of violence which saw a number of their superiors summarily executed. Estimates of arrests ranged from 200 to several hundred, with official figures withheld. Men accused of plotting against Hitler were arrested in Storm Troop groups in Berlin, Brandenburg, Bavaria, Silesia and Pomerania.

A statement issued last night said the "cleaning has finished" but at the same time Hermann Wilhelm Goering, minister without portfolio and premier of Prussia, said those "found to be traitors against the leader" must be called to account.

A special storm troop unit punished treason with the death penalty and Goering plainly indicated he intended to proceed mercilessly against mutineers and reactionaries.

No Death List

No death list has been issued but it was expected the number would far exceed the known 18.

Remorse that former Crown Prince Friedrich Wilhelm had been arrested were proved groundless.

The Associated Press called Friedrich's house and was assured by the major-domo of the household that "all those rumors are nonsense. His Royal Highness is not under arrest but is sound asleep here."

Hitler had a strong hold on a bewildered Germany, as he drove on with his relentless oppression of the "Second Revolution."

The propaganda ministry announced that the full list of all executions of the abortive revolt will be published during the day.

### LONERGAN TO MAKE KEYNOTE ADDRESS

### State Democratic Chairman Wilson Also Trying to Get Professor Tutweller.

Hartford, July 2.—(AP)—Senator Augustine Lonergan may be the keynote speaker at the Democratic State convention in September, it became known today.

State Chairman David A. Wilson said that "several people" have approached him with the suggestion that the Senator be asked to make the keynote address and the suggestion has his approval. However, the selection of a keynote speaker will be in the hands of a committee, which according to customary procedure, is appointed by the state central committee for this purpose.

Entitled To Honor

Groups urging Mr. Lonergan's selection assert that it would be fitting for the state's first Democratic Senator to be elected directly by the people, to give this honor.

The movement is expected to grow stronger when the state committee meets in New Haven, July 11, to arrange for caucuses and the fall campaign bringing the National issue to the fore and to this end, President von Hindenburg, gave his blessings to Chancellor Hitler today.

The vice chancellor, assistant, Friedrich von Tschirsky, von Papen's secretary, Friedrich von Bock, was said to have been saved by the alternative of doing away with themselves or facing the firing squad.

IT IS IN SADDLE

It was apparent to all that Hitler and his chief adjutant, Hermann Wilhelm Goering, were in the present situation at least, firmly in the saddle.

With principal leaders of the opposition already dead and other shootings rumored hourly, opposing forces had no directing heads to lead them into action.

Government buildings were still heavily guarded by police today and practice with rifles walked the streets by troops. The black-shirted Sturm Staff, Goering's special guardmen, were held in readiness for an emergency.

Berlin was going about its business as usual, but the atmosphere was still tensely charged as rumors floated about.

In these rumors France emerged as the "mysterious foreign power" which Hitler charged Saturday with having been in communication with the conspirators against him.

The French embassy denied fully that the French government had any connection with the conspiracy, but the rumors continued in circulation.

Among the kaleidoscopic developments of the day was his arrest of Major Mueseler, von Muelheim, former Crown Prince Friedrich Wilhelm who was taken into custody and Goering plainly indicated he intended to proceed mercilessly against mutineers and reactionaries.

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### JOHNSON WRITING REPLY FOR DARROW

### NRA Head Prepares Parting Shot in His Fend With the Famous Lawyer.

Washington, July 2.—(AP)—Hugh H. Johnson intends to fire the parting shot in his feud with Clarence Darrow.

He put his NRA aides at work today drafting an answer for the final report of the Recovery Report Board Darrow.

Like the previous two, the third report maintained NRA fostered monopoly. In so doing, it said last night, the recovery unit became "not the foe but the adjunct of depression."

Despite its recommendations, the board said, "there seems a slender hope to entrench" monopolistic practices "still more securely in the processes of the act."

Abundant price-fixing was recommended.

Darrow Is Out

Since completion of the report Darrow has resigned. Other members said they received further directions from President Roosevelt.

In chapter entitled "The Government Boycott," the board said Mr. Roosevelt's order, requiring certificates of compliance for bidding on the "rapidly of social change, and the consequent social tensions and developments in America, and throughout the world demand emphasis on social action in the schools and a more realistic approach to the study of society."

He gave as sample phrase: "Energizing, integrating economy."

**NEW TO HISTORY**

One may search the pages of history without finding a parallel for Germany's black Saturday. It is not there. Not in the records of civilized people. Not in the traditions of the most bloodthirsty savage tribes may be discovered a counterpart of the inhuman cruelty of the wholesale assassination of his own subjects by Hitler—or its equal for immeasurable cowardice. No human being, sane or insane, with the faintest smattering grasp of normal human courage would entertain for a second the possibility of having recourse to such means as those resorted to by Hitler to escape the need-to-fury demand of the position of power that he had attained by resorting to the vilest series of murders since man emerged from the caves and the trees. It would be unfair to the animal to compare the blind and inhuman frenzy of fear of this German despot to that of a cornered rat; the world and the language lack any adequate comparison.

Nero, held up to the execration of a world for nineteen hundred years, had at least the grace to be ashamed of his political crimes. He did not out of the slaughter of men with his kind of ferocity still warm upon his brow. It is wholly inconceivable that Hitler, Goering and Goebbels, the bloodiest and most bloodthirsty unscrivains in history, can survive many days, let alone retain their evil power over sixty millions of men and women most of whom are as brave as these fanatic despots does not fear-bloodshed.

Meanwhile it is well for the rest of the world to re-examine the merits of the French people's sense of insecurity and their refusal to reduce their protective armament in the face of the monstrous might of Germany. It is only needful to imagine the kind of war that such a creature would wage against an enemy, when he has surrounded the world by his frightful atrocities against his own friends, to fully understand and sympathize with the French attitude.

**UNFIT SPOKESMEN**

What the Republican party most urgently needs, as it faces the coming Congressional elections, is more property those politicians who, successfully posing as Republicans for many years, have been permitted to twist and warp the historic policies of the party into apparent support of special privileges and an infinitely small minority in the party, such people have been allowed to exert an influence upon its counsels enormously out of proportion to their value. Is either the country or the G. O. P. And now that it is as plain as daylight that the rule of special privileges is over and forever, and a day, and when the manifest duty and only possible strategic course for the Republican party is to bring its great experience and intelligence to bear on the development of an enlightened liberalism, it is little less suicidal to give even tacit endorsement to the weird shrieks of reactionaries who see their power slipping through their fingers.

**GOOD SIGN**

For a reason having nothing whatever to do with the merits of the various labor controversies or with this one in particular, it would seem to be an especially encouraging sign that the threatened general strike in the woollen industry has been postponed after a meeting of union delegates at Providence yesterday.
