

SHOT IN ATTEMPT AT BURGLARY HERE

New Britain Youth Wounded As He Fails to Stop When Ordered by Patrolman Cavagnaro — Three of Gang Caught.

Andrew Norton, 18, of North street, New Britain, and Charles Kominski, 21, of 50 Union street, New Britain were given a hearing in Town court here this morning charged with theft of an automobile and with attempt at burglary.

It was a little after 10:30 last night when the officer, covering his regular beat, started to go around the back of the building on Main street between Oak street and Purcell place. He got as far as the rear of the Weldon building when he saw three men. They were back in the shadow of the building forming a circle.

The officer approached the men to see what they were doing when one of the members of the party pulled a .32 caliber revolver on him, stating that he was stopping Cavagnaro charged at the three. The owner of the revolver dropped the gun and all three ran down the alley.

The officer gave chase, drawing his revolver and shooting three times. He overtook one of the men Kominski, who gave him a battery of blows and hurled him back to the rear of the Weldon drug store.

He took the captured man in, using the telephone to call the police station. While he was doing this Michael Habern of 41 Purcell place, who had witnessed the shooting ran to the drug store and informed Officer Cavagnaro that two of the men had run north on Purcell road and another had gone south.

Leaving the handcuffed man locked in the drug store, the officer dashed out of the back door of the drug store down the alley and on Purcell place saw two men running south, towards Oak street.

WETS DEFEATED IN MISSISSIPPI BY 2 TO 1 VOTE

Incomplete Returns Show Drys Gaining in Nearly All Districts — Result Was No Surprise.

Jackson, Miss., July 11.—(AP)—Mississippi held its place among the dry states today by a vote of approximately 2 to 1.

Incomplete unofficial returns from yesterday's prohibition referendum showed defeat of the hard liquor bill by a vote of 42,720 to 21,249 in 658 of the 1,598 precincts of the state.

The vote conceded defeat. Senator W. B. Roberts of Roanoke, co-author of the Roberts-May compromise hard liquor legislation bill said the result is immediate to the governor, sheriffs and other police officers to make a determined effort to enforce the present laws and end the present unworkable conditions.

By voting dry the people rebuked their Legislature. The last Legislature authorized beer at the same time it put the liquor laws before the voters and four per cent beer was just as far as Missisippians came to in the legislation of alcoholic beverages.

The victory of the drys in retaining their 20-year-old state prohibition law barring hard liquor was hailed as a signal triumph for the prohibitionists.

CROSS SAYS ROOSEVELT WILL AID PARTY'S CAUSE

"We Have a Tremendous Assistance in Roosevelt," He Tells State Democrats at New Haven Meeting.

New Haven, July 11.—(AP)—Governor Wilbur L. Cross told Connecticut Democrats today that in President Roosevelt they have a "tremendous assistance" for the coming state election.

In a speech prepared for delivery before the State central committee in which he outlined the probable National and state issues, the governor said:

"We have a tremendous assistance in President Roosevelt. I want to meet him when he took the oath of office on the darkest day in our history since the Civil War. Our whole economic structure had been undermined in previous years and on that morning it seemed as if the structure would collapse. To prevent that collapse, quick action was necessary. President Roosevelt was ready for quick action and it was taken immediately after his inauguration."

WHEAT PRICES SOAR ON GRAIN MARKETS

Government Report Shows Lowest Production in 33 Years; Corn Goes Up Also

Chicago, July 11.—(AP)—Grain markets were electrified today as a government report, placing the Nation's 1934 production of grain at the lowest figure in 33 years.

Wheat prices soared five cents on the opening transactions, the limit permitted in a day's trading. Corn was up the allowable four cent.

Midwest reaction to the startling government report was one of amazement and skepticism at first, was mirrored in the excited grain pits. Buying orders deluged the market as speculative interests, quiet for almost a month, unleashed a demand to acquire contracts for future seasons.

Wolcott, July 11.—(AP)—John Crowe, slayer who for three weeks has been playing a deadly game of hide-and-seek with half of the entire state police force, was still at liberty today.

Shot at yesterday afternoon at a short range by a state trooper, Crowe escaped, seemingly without a scratch, and managed to shake 150 police officers and determined wild-eyes who thoroughly combed 75 acres of dense forest.
