FRISCO RESPONSIBILITY

Throughout the country at large the heavy responsibility for the distressing and menacing situation at San Francisco and California is being thrust upon the people of the Pacific Coast area.

It would be an extremely well informed or else a pretty reckless person who would assert with any confidence that the unions' demands that the control of these agencies be turned over to them is any more justifiable than the determination of the employees to hang on to that control.

On the face of it there would seem to be no possible justification for the maritime labor agencies being in the hands of either the shipping interests or the labor unions.

Also Dr. Charles Francis Potter, in a New York address, said: "It is bad for democracy for any one group set up a moral censorship over the world over. We give the public church, or any church, or all churches and synagogues together a right to dictate the morals of the nation."
