CONSTABLE CROCKETT—IS INJURED BY AUTO

Miss Gladys Harrison Also Hurt by Alleged Reckless Driver at Goat Farm.

Constable Charles Crockett of Birch street, who is employed by the state highway department as a flagman on the Tauberville-Vernon road, was injured last evening at the intersection of the road and the Goat Farm, when struck by an automobile driven by Harry A. Munson, 24 of Coventry. He was treated for his injuries at the Manchester Memorial hospital and then taken to his home, where it was said this morning that he was feeling much better.

Mr. Crockett was standing beside an automobile which his daughter was driving and was talking to her when the Munson car came along and hit the car also causing injuries to Miss Gladys Harrison of Center street, who was sitting in the parked car. She was treated at the Manchester Memorial hospital before taken home. The accident was investigated by Sergeant David, of the Rockville police department, who placed Munson under arrest on the charge of reckless driving.

Mr. Crockett's injuries consist of bruise to the body, when he was thrown to the ground, and also a cut on his head. Miss Harrison suffered abrasions to the arms, hands and face.
