At the same time the Italian Democratic club was meeting in the offices of Dr. Dolan within a stone's throw of the Old Guard meeting.

It was reported at the Old Guard meeting that the caucus has been made throughout the Fourth district and that a campaign is already in progress directed against Dr. Dolan for membership on the Democratic State Central committee.

Many grievances were noted at last night's Old Guard meeting. Dolan's actions towards his fellow Democrats in Manchester. They point out that the local New Guard leader has favored some independent voters for political purposes rather than help out the Democrats since reaching the caucus.

HOUSE REPAIR LOANS
 The Federal Housing Administration has just issued a most interesting bulletin explaining in detail the operation of this type of the National Housing Act relating to credit insurance of loans for the alteration, repair and improvement of real property. Not only does the bulletin explain in detail the details of the loan, but also the procedure of loan seekers and the procedure of the agencies but it contains a complete list of every form to be employed in the various processes. Also it includes an excellent verbal picture of the real estate situation in the country and the effect of the Federal Housing Administration on the real estate market during the years of the depression. From the bulletin it is learned that 18 million buildings in this country have reached a more or less serious state of disrepair and that three million are so bad as to be beyond rehabilitation and should be demolished. The rest, it is stated, require only minor repairs to put them in good condition.

It is the aspiration of the Housing Administration to induce the owners to borrow the money for such repairs and alterations. The government stands in the position of lender.

The FHA explains that 4,000,000 of these houses were formerly occupied by the middle class. They are now either vacant or contributing idleness are out of work, that a large proportion of these would be re-employed if they were made and reconstructed. It begins, that manufacturers of building material and other durable goods would in turn employ more workers.

TOOTH AND CLAW
 Mr. Roosevelt is the best phrase maker, in appeal to the mass mind, who ever occupied the Presidential chair. He has made his name by the greatest charm of voice and manner. MODEST LITTLE FLOWER
 Mayor LaGuardia of New York is over modest. When he was visiting newspaper men about his new relief projects and finding that every man on both was not only so busy working but working hard, he said: "I had no sign on my car and I had no sign on the feet of British soldiers before I spoke to the British men. No one recognized me."

No one will recognize the mayor's modesty in the matter of the work he is doing any more. He has shown a burden of interest and amortization that is being piled up in the carrying out of his New Deal.

We do not in the least stand with those who point to the terrifying increase in the public debt and demand that it be brought to an end, without explaining how the people are to be employed and how the unemployed are to be fed without tremendous public expenditures. Our critics are not of the things Mr. Roosevelt's recovery plans have done but what they have so completely failed to do.

They have failed to restore to the American people their equity in the work of the nation. They have failed to take from the shoulders of the nation any part of the crushing burden of interest and taxation. They have added and constantly are adding to that burden by government borrowing and the promotion of individual borrowings at interest, instead of employing the honest, economically sound method of expansion.

Mr. Roosevelt labors under very little necessity of defending those really brought the federal government to the rescue of the jobless, the threatened industries and business, or an impoverished agriculture. The assistants of his party are too true to their nature to oblige for them to be of political importance. What he needs to defend, and what he has never even attempted to defend, is the policy of binding and fastening artificial "bank" money, which is resulting in constant deflation—halted only momentarily by the silver seizure and the deeper and deeper impoverishment of a nation whose equities are exhausted.

CRACKERS AND BISCUITS
 The two best methods of using whole wheat flour are in the form of thoroughly leavened or unleavened bread, and the second is in the form of baking powder biscuits. The best method of making these baking powder biscuits is to combine the whole wheat flour with the baking powder and salt, and mix with the addition of baking powder. The biscuits should be made very thin so that they can be thoroughly cooked. They should not be made thicker than ordinary crackers.
