DEMOCRATS TRY TO GET HARMONY IN LOCAL RANKS

Caucus Last Night Takes Steps to Smooth Out Differences; Dr. Dolan Not There; McHale Quits.

An attempt to iron out differences within the Democratic Party last night delayed the opening of the party's caucus in the Hollister street school assembly hall 45 minutes. What had been considered a precocious agreement on the name of Thomas J. Danaher of Bigelow street to act as chairman of the caucus was evidently scrapped by an opposing group when the name of John Wilcox, of 19 Locust street, automobile salesman, was advanced. Danaher, leader of the faction opposed to Dr. E. G. Dolan's influence in local and state politics, was supposed to have been named caucus chairman without any opposition, according to the agreement, but evidently some of the younger Democrats were not advised of the arrangement and Wilcox was named. A hurried conference followed the surprise and Wilcox quickly withdrew, allowing Danaher to win the unanimous choice.

That all was not harmony within the party last night is evident from the bad taste left by the results of the convention stated as expressed by some of the Democratic leaders today. There is no doubt in the minds of most of the former Old Guard adherents that the Dolan faction was defeated last night as evidenced by the names of delegates chosen for the various conventions. Danaher is invested with the task of bringing the younger element into line and that a move in this direction had been planned was shown by the willingness of Danaher's leaders to compromise quite generally.

Argue Over Murphy

Considerable of the trouble off the caucus floor last night centered about the naming of Edward J. Murphy as a state convention delegate and also as a member of the town committee. At first Murphy's name was omitted from both slates, but when some of his friends among the old line Democrats objected to this, Murphy's name was reinstated as a state convention delegate and also as a member of the town committee. Some of the group were bent on punishing Murphy for his leaning towards Dr. Dolan, but when it became evident that Murphy was pretty solidly lined up with the Danaher group it was thought best to allow him to stand.

Farley, A Speaker AT STATE PARLEY

LADDER SAVES GUESTS DURING FIRE IN HOTEL

Four Women Flee To Safety When Escape Down Staircase Is Cut Off; New Preston Lodge Burned.

New Preston, Conn., Aug. 17.—(AP)—Five persons fled to safety here early today, as fire of unknown origin, destroyed Chalmers Lodge at the south end of Lake Waramaug, with an estimated loss of \$20,000.

Mrs. Hattie Devine, owner of the 100 room frame structure, a friend, Mrs. McCullough, two guests, Mrs. William Carrington and her daughter, an employee, made their way from the second floor, where they had been sleeping, to the ground by means of a ladder.

SEES NO TROUBLE IN STRIKE AREAS

Southern General Visits Mills Where 2,000 Quit; Troops Are Not Needed.

Columbus, Ga., Aug. 17.—(AP)—The report that it was "all quiet" on the western front was made by Assistant General Bradley W. Camp after an investigation on the strike of approximately 2,000 workers at the Eagle and Phoenix mills here.

General Camp arrived last night, saying he was acting at the request of Governor Tammage but that his mission was entirely conciliatory. Leaders of the strike asked Governor Tammage for help in settling the difficulty after the workers walked out yesterday.

The workers' attitude toward the discharge of employees who joined the textile union here, however, Frank R. Bryant, vice-president and general manager of the mill, would not discuss the causes of the strike.

Farley To Stay Open

Bradley said the doors of the mill are open and will remain open so that any employee wishing to return to work can do so. He said yesterday there have been no attempts at negotiation and he did not know of any negotiations that could be undertaken.

The mill operated yesterday with only 200 employees reporting. City officials yesterday said they would allow anyone but officials, workers and the plant. Traffic was directed off the street in front of the plant.

LABATT IS RELEASED BUT NO RANSOM PAID

It's Up to President To Avert Big Strike

New York, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Thomas F. Labatt, re-elected vice president of the International Textile Workers of America, declared today that only President Roosevelt could avert a general strike in the cotton textile industry.

McMahon said that the cotton textile employers had never recognized the United Textile Workers as the collective bargaining representative of their employees.

McMahon's statements followed shortly the assertion by Francis J. Germain, who was unanimously re-elected first vice president of the union, that the general strike order fell on or before September 1 might force the leaders of the textile industry to sit down at the conference table with the representatives of the United Textile Workers.

He added that General Hugh Johnson, NRA administrator, was "not high enough up" to be able to "do anything about the strike."

McMahon made these statements to a news conference in Philadelphia, Pa., which was held in connection with the election of General Johnson, he continued: "In a spirit of courtesy only we would thank General Johnson for anything he could do—but the President of the United States is the only man powerful enough to force the textile industry to meet us."

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U. S. WHEAT EXPORT QUOTA ALLOCATED

Figure Is Ten Million Bushels Compared With 150,000,000 for Argentina.

London, Aug. 17.—(AP)—The United States was tentatively allocated a 1934-35 wheat export quota of 10,000,000 bushels by the International Wheat Conference today, the Associated Press was informed by an official source.

New York, Aug. 17.—(AP)—Sir Henri Detering, head of the Royal Dutch Shell Oil group, arrived from Europe today and predicted that the world's oil surpluses will be swept away by the use of oil power.

"Diesel traction is bound to come and it will sweep everything before it," said the oil man.

"Electricification of the railroads is already a thing of the past. The Diesel engine is the economic and independent unit of the future."

LABATT IS RELEASED BUT NO RANSOM PAID

Kidnapers of Rich Canadian Brewer Got "Cold Feet" After Holding Victim 65 Hours—Makes His Way to Hotel Where Brother Is Staying, Then Goes to Family—Police Start Big Man Hunt.

Toronto, Aug. 17.—(AP)—John S. Labatt, wealthy brewer, returned to his home in London, Ont., today after 65 hours in the hands of kidnapers.

The \$100,000 ransom the kidnapers demanded was not paid for the Canadian police, including the famous Royal Mounted, moved ahead with British tactics to get their men.

"Cold feet" commented an authority, who disclosed that officials were determined to make an example of these first "snatch" kidnapers in Canada's history.

Labatt was unarmed—unarmed but in a highly nervous state when he was released. Police surrounded his wife and children and visitors were not admitted, but a friend said he had not been physically injured.

Had Heart Disease

The brewer suffers from a heart ailment. His family had suffered such in his absence for they feared the strain of his experience would kill him.

His brother, Hugh, who drew \$150,000 from a bank in an effort to meet the abductors' demands had pleaded with police to be given the opportunity to pay and see his brother alive again.

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HAMBURG GREETES GERMANY'S HEAD

Monster Welcome Arranged for Hitler Who Will Make a Speech Tonight.

Hamburg, Germany, Aug. 17.—(AP)—This great seaport—Hitler's Germany's most important gateway to world trade—today devoted itself wholly to the task of providing an appropriately gorgeous speech in the campaign for next Sunday.

It will be the chancellor's first public utterance since the funeral of the late President Von Hindenburg. When "Der Fuehrer" arrived by airplane at 1:40 p. m., accompanied by Paul Joseph Goebbels, minister of propaganda, he found 100,000 uniformed storm troopers and other Nazi group members lined along a ten-mile route leading from the airport to the Hamburg city hall.

Of the countries represented only Argentina and Canada were taking part in the parade.
