

PACKAGE STORE LICENSES OF 300 ARE IN DANGER

Superior Court Decision Upholds State Liquor Board in Revoking the Permit of Hartford Man.

Hartford, Aug. 30.—(AP)—The State Liquor Control Act, cause of prolix litigation during its brief history, was headed once more today toward the Supreme Court of Errors as a result of a Superior Court decision, which placed in jeopardy the licenses of 300 package stores in Connecticut.

Judge Frederick M. Peasey in a decision, filed yesterday, upheld the state liquor commission in revoking the permit of Joseph D. Castonguay of Hartford. The latter was among 300 package store proprietors, who during the period of the Federal temporary injunction sold liquor during hours and in quantities prohibited by the control act.

Immediately after Judge Peasey filed his decision in the case, brought as a test, it was announced an appeal would be taken to the Supreme Court of Errors. Once before the state's highest judicial tribunal was called on to pass on a portion of the control act.

The temporary injunction was issued pending the decision of a Constitutional Court as to the validity of the liquor law. The court held the law was constitutional, but suggested there be no reprisals or prosecutions against the package store proprietors who took advantage of the restraining order.

Permit Revoked In the face of this suggestion, however, the liquor commission revoked Castonguay's permit.

In a previous decision, Judge Peasey ruled that in view of the Constitutional Court's decision, the package store proprietors, who had exceeded the privileges of the control act, would not be prosecuted. The judge held, however, in yesterday's decision that the liquor commission is vested with the function of determining whether any package store license should be revoked under the provisions of the liquor law.

"As a result," the decision said, "the decision revoking any particular license is conclusive in the absence of proof that they acted illegally or so arbitrarily or unreasonably as to be held to have abused the discretion reposed in them."

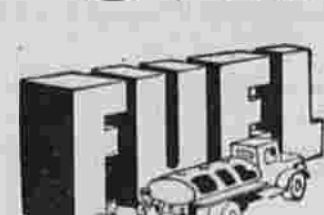

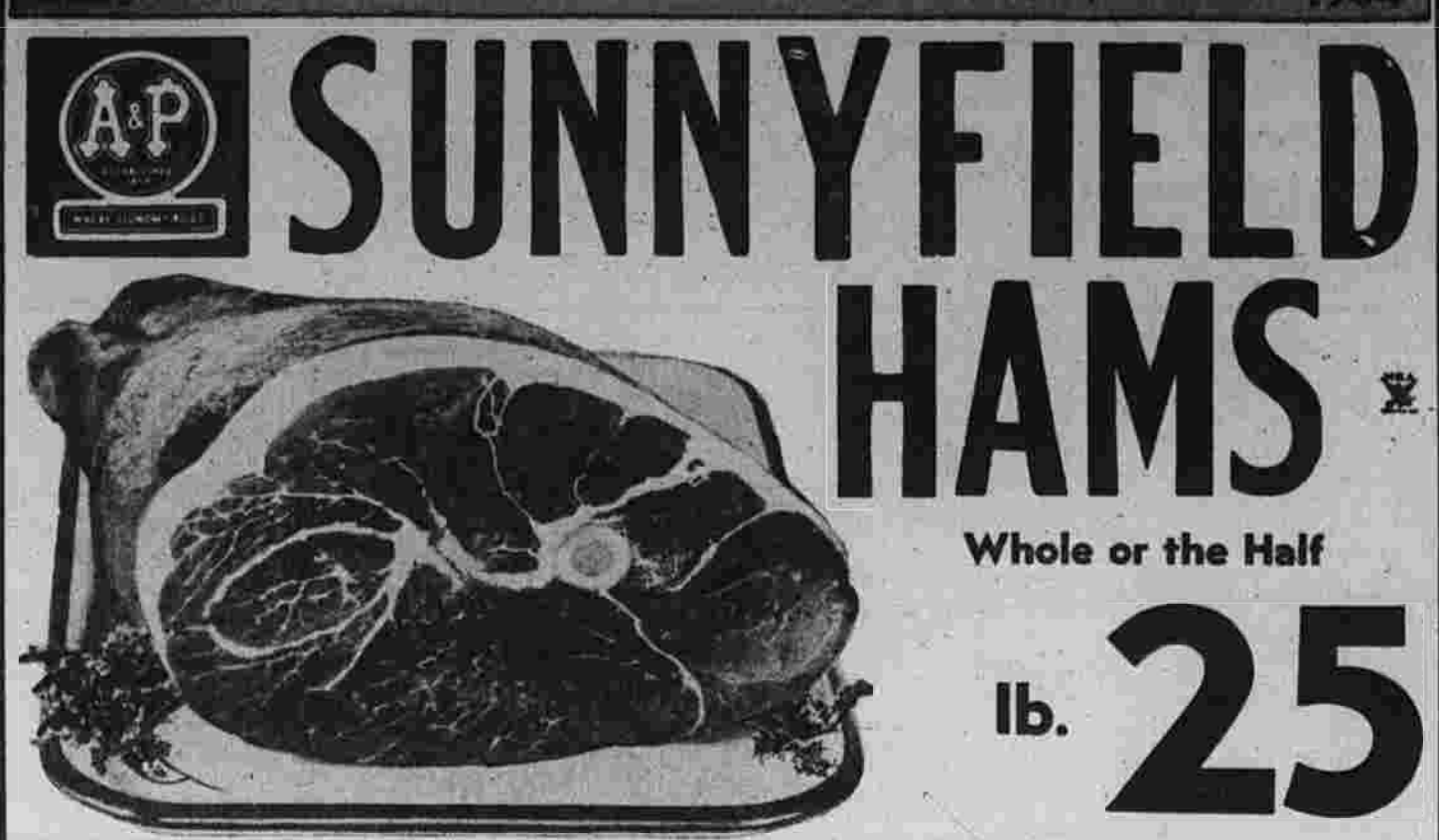

DON'T FORGET CAT GAME BOARD WARNS

Left Behind to Starve by Summer Vacationists, Tabby Becomes a Menace.

Hartford, Aug. 31.—Don't forget to take along "Tabby"—don't leave him behind to starve and become one of the worst menaces to Connecticut's smaller wild life.

A total of 1,448 homeless cats, abandoned by their owners, were picked up or taken in box traps by humane wardens throughout the state during the summer months.

"Cats must eat," the Board points out. "It is only natural that strays who have been deprived of their natural hunting instincts, here and there, will turn to man for food."

Statistics on other predatory species registered by the warden show 2,001 snapping turtles were trapped during the fiscal year just ended.

The turtles, regarded as particularly destructive to fish and game, weighed 31,352 pounds and exceeded the former record 1932 season catch by six tons.

Other species listed include: 1,180 raccoons, 485 red squirrels, 77 great horned owls and 50 grey foxes.

The greater number and size of predators were taken on state lands, particularly in the vicinity of the state game preserve where they had become over-abundant.
