

WILL NOT OPEN ANY MILL HERE SAY CHENEYS
Strikers Hear Plans Had Been Made to Re-Open Monday; Not So, Says Firm; Big Session Today.

Despite reports emanating from local union headquarters that Cheney Brothers intended reopening the velvet, cravat and dyeing departments Monday morning, these departments will not open but will remain closed indefinitely as was indicated in an official Cheney statement made public last Monday.

The velvet, cravat and dyeing departments will not reopen Monday morning, Howel Cheney stated today.

Decision of Cheney Brothers to keep the mills closed clearly reveals that members of the firm do not want a competition in Manchester of the riots and bloodshed that occurred in this week in Woonsocket and Rayville, R. I.

It was considered certain that if the mills were to reopen, "hitting squads" from other strike centers would invade Manchester and trouble likely would break out.

Pickets again were assigned to duty at the mills during the noon hour yesterday when strike leaders received rumors that some of the departments were operating. It was learned that only a few foremen were on duty. There was no general mobilization of pickets, however, and now that Cheney Brothers have announced that the velvet, cravat and dyeing departments will not reopen Monday there is reason to believe the pickets again will be withdrawn.

Reference was made by President Arthur Short of Local 2123, at the mass meeting held this morning in the State Theater instead of at Center Park on account of the rain, to a contract which he indicated Cheney Brothers must sign before the strikers will return to work.

While no official statement regarding the various clauses were given out, it was learned that the contract is known as a "closed shop" contract and includes union demands that Cheney Brothers, among other things, hire only men recommended by the union, refuse to employ men or women not endorsed by the union, agree to foremen being enrolled as members of the union and to consent to a thirty-hour week with pay for forty hours.

Every seat in the main auditorium of the State theater was taken by strikers this morning. Perhaps a larger crowd never has turned out to a union meeting in this town. Three speakers from Hartford addressed the gathering.

President Short made it known that union leaders had conferred yesterday with Rev. Leonard Harris of the South Methodist church and Rev. Walton Woodruff of the Center Congregational church regarding the local strike situation. ITALY SEEMS TO FAVOR MONARCHY IN AUSTRIA
Sentiment Has Increased Since Visit of Former Empress Zita — Vienna Alarmed Over Idea.

Rome, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Sentiment favoring the restoration of the Hapsburg Monarchy in Austria appeared to be growing in Italy today.

The visit of former Empress Zita to Italy this summer did much to win Italian favor for her aspiration to restore the Hapsburg regime, it was said.

Before returning to Belgium two days ago Zita had a long and cordial talk with King Victor Emmanuel and Queen Elena, Princess Maria, unofficially reported to be engaged to the former Empress' son, Archduke Otto, participated in the conversation.

HOLDUP VICTIMS JETTISON \$6,000
Toss Big Roll from Car, Give Robbers \$3,600, Then Can't Find Larger Sum.

New York, Sept. 15.—Two chain store executives who were returning from the Belmont Park races with \$12,000 in their pockets, including \$6,000 in winnings, were held up and robbed \$3,600 while driving home through an isolated section, Queens yesterday.

Ten Companies of National Guard Mobilized But All Is Quiet on Strike Front — Manufacturers Discuss Situation.

New Haven, Sept. 15.—(AP)—Ten companies of the Connecticut National Guard, about 500 men, were awaiting further orders and ready for any emergency today as the textile strike in this state entered its second week-end.

Some of the tensions, prevalent during the past several days when farmers in Danbury and Putnam forced the mobilization of state troops, had eased today with the complete shutdown of all of the state's mills due to the five-day week.

The letdown is believed to be only temporary, however, for with the reopening of some of the mills Monday the pickets may renew their activities.

The entire state focused its attention on Putnam yesterday where serious trouble was averted despite the lawlessness in the air. The only semblance of disorder was the arrest of Ann Gerardi, a picket, who was charged with assault and battery.
