

FLAMES RAZE NOME; STARVATION FACES ALASKA'S GOLD CITY

Two Dead, Two Million Property Loss — Appeal Made to States to Rush Food to Scene.

Nome, Alaska, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Alaska's famous City of Gold lay in smoking ruins today with two dead and a property loss estimated as high as \$2,000,000.

Faced by a definite food shortage all an early winter, which will look the city's residents with Nome's homeless citizens pleaded for immediate aid from the States.

Most of the city's food was contained in the city's stores, which must import all its foodstuffs. Food and material to build the city must be brought in boat over long rough water journeys from southeastern Alaska or Seattle before ice freezes out all ships six weeks hence.

Emergency relief plans for the fire swept mining center were directed by James L. Fieser, vice chairman of the Red Cross. He telephoned instructions to A. L. Schaffer, Pacific branch manager at San Francisco.

Food, clothing and medical aid will be provided to the homeless citizens of Nome, Fieser said, but for the sake of speed, supplies will be sent from other Alaskan towns instead of being shipped in from the United States.

ITALIAN MILITARY AGE TO BEGIN AT 8TH YEAR

Most Sweeping Law Ever Passed in History Is Announced in Rome — Details of Decree.

Rome, Sept. 18.—(AP)—Compulsory military service for Italians, beginning at the age of 8 and continuing to the age of 33, was decreed today by the Council of Ministers in probably the most sweeping military law ever passed in Italy.

Declaring "the functions of a citizen and of a soldier are not dividable in the Fascist state," the council created the three following categories of compulsory military training:

1. Preliminary—beginning at the age of 8 years.

NORTH HAVEN INN DESTROYED BY FIRE

Paradise Inn on Boston Post Road Razed—Damage Estimated at \$5,000.

North Haven, Sept. 18.—(AP)—The Paradise Inn on the Boston Post road here was razed early today by fire of undetermined origin.

The building was destroyed and damage has been estimated to be between \$5,000 and \$10,000.

The building was the property of George De Filippo and John De Cicco of New Haven.

Donors and most of the employees were out of the building at the time the fire occurred.

Due to the lack of water, flames concentrated on saving adjacent buildings, abandoning the inn.

GOVERNOR CROSS ORDERS GUARDS DEMOBILIZED

Tentile Workers met in closed session today to discuss the pending strike leaders—that of providing relief for the strikers.

At the same time the union leaders who came here from their respective divisions to discuss the strike front, were to act on the recommendations of the strike committee.

An order making the strike effective in every division of the industry was expected to be announced today.

The order was expected to include silk dyes, rayon and synthetic yarn, carpet, plush, pile fabric and rug materials.

Most of them are employed in plants, but a strike of silk dyers would affect the entire industry in the Paterson, N. J., area.

The strike centers reported steady increase in strike ranks and expressed indignation at tactics employed in some areas by police officers and other officials.

"Police activity in many places is reprehensible," the union leaders said in a statement.

"For example, in Greenville, S. C., police actually took possession of the cars of strikers and arrested their union membership cards when police confiscated them.

"The situation is terrible in the Metropolitan area where men serving special duties. No one has been allowed to leave the area."

The union leaders said they would be glad to discuss any matter which the sheriff's deputies have handled in a fair and equitable manner.

"It is my reasoned judgment that if we were not to go on strike, we would be forced to accept a wage scale of special duties, which would be a gross injustice."

NATIONAL SITUATION By Associated Press. More than 120,000 tentile workers were on strike today.

The strike is the largest in the history of the industry since the 1934-35 strike.

The National Guildmen stand by their right to work. Additional units are being organized in Virginia where martial law is in effect.

In Connecticut, however, quiet was the order of the day and Gov. Wilbur Cross ordered the National Guard to be on hand.

In the Carolina the number of tentile was decreased by several thousand as a result of the strike.

In Maine, the closing of the Penobscot mills at Bangor and the York mills at Bangor decreased the toll of idle to 5,000.

There was virtually no disorder but there were little lessening of tension.
