**BOARD SEEKS
VOTERS' HELP
IN TAX STUDY**

Face Blind Alley in Fixing
Satisfactory Rate—Call
Meeting for Discussion
Tomorrow Night.

A 25-mill rate for the coming year was forecast last night at the second meeting of the Selectmen, met to discuss possible reductions in the budget after the board members met only blank walls at every turn in their efforts to find a possible way out of the tax dilemma.

Expected reductions in the 1934-35 budget list, amounting to between \$3,000,000 and \$4,000,000, the inability to collect more than two-thirds of the present tax and the difficulty in further reducing items in the budget already passed to the bone through two years of depression, caused the Selectmen to invite citizens and taxpayers to attend a special meeting tomorrow evening in the Municipal building at which time the Selectmen will present the situation and discuss any possible action.

**MANY TEXTILE
MILLS CLOSED
DESPITE PEACE**

In the Carolinas Alone
68,000 Workers Still Idle;
Union Leaders Make
Charges of Discrimination.

Textile mill machinery remained quiet in many centers today, the second active day of the strike peace, but hummed in others with full forces on duty.

In the Carolinas alone, 182 mills were closed, and 68,000 workers were idle. The strike lingered on at Rockville, Conn., and at East Hampton, Mass., where trouble threatened. The United Textile Workers mapped a fight on what they called "discrimination against strikers" in reopening mills.

Textile labor leaders in Washington said every charge of discrimination would be proved if the Federal strike commission should recommend to Roosevelt on the Winstan mediation board's recommendation.

The American defender Rainbow today overcame a one minute second advantage the British challenger Endeavour had built up on the first 10 mile leg of the 30 mile triangular course and led the way at 20 miles in the sixth race of the America's Cup series.

The white-hulled defender, footing along at a great rate in a 14 knot breeze, swung around the mark at 11:27 and made the lead in the first two races.

**WATCHMAN SAYS BOMBS
STARTED THE FIRE ON SHIP**

Also Saw Mysterious Stranger on Morro Castle Just Before He Saw Smoke and Flames.

New York, Sept. 25.—(AP)—Arthur J. Pender, night watchman on duty aboard the liner Morro Castle at the time it burned at sea with a loss of 132 lives, told the Federal board investigating the disaster today that he thought the ship was bombed.

He held an explosion "loud and intense" that came either from the writing room or the passageway forward of the lobby and declared that "in the light of everything that happened, I think the ship was bombed."
