

PLEA OF INSANITY HAUPTMANN PLAN

This Is Hinted When Lawyer for Lindy Suspect Asks for Examination by an Alienist.

BULLETIN!
New York, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Sheriff John J. Hanley today disclosed that Bruno Richard Hauptmann had stolen a table upon in the jail, broken it into four sections, sharpened one and had hidden all four pieces in the jail.

Hanley said that the best part of the spoon had been sharpened to razor edge by rubbing it against the wheel frame of the cot in his cell in the county jail.

These pieces were found in the toilet bowl in his cell, and that the fourth piece had been hidden in the drain of the wash basin in the cell. The sheriff said the pieces appeared to be too small to be used as a key, but he was inclined to believe the sharpened piece might have been used as a weapon if it had been further sharpened into a knife.

New York, Sept. 28.—(AP)—A plan to have Bruno Richard Hauptmann, indicted as the extortioner of the \$20,000 Lindbergh kidnap ransom payment, examined by a psychiatrist as announced today by his counsel.

The lawyer, James M. Fawcett, made his announcement when he arrived at the Bronx county courthouse to confer with District Attorney Samuel J. Foley, but he declined to give his reasons for the move.

"I am going to have my own psychiatrist see Hauptmann," Fawcett said. He added that his family physician would examine the prisoner at the same time in his cell in the Bronx county jail either today or tomorrow, and that he would be guided by his own personal physician in the choice of the psychiatrist. "Does this mean that you are going to offer a defense based on insanity or a mental condition?" Fawcett was asked.

"You can draw your own conclusions," he replied as he hurried into the district attorney's office.

A visit by Assistant Attorney General Joseph Langgan, of New Jersey, to the district attorney's office gave rise to belief that might have to do with preparation of final steps in the extradition of the prisoner to New Jersey, the state in which the Lindbergh baby was kidnaped and killed.

Foley announced Langgan's presence in the Bronx, but declined to discuss the purpose of his visit. He also announced that Langgan was in the Bronx. Foley said that New Jersey had made no move seeking extradition of Hauptmann.

MANY 3RD PARTIES ARE NOW IN FIELD

At Least 25 Listed Through-out Nation for the Fall Election.

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—A record smashing array of "Third Party" attempts, a multitude of issues and a host of colorful candidates, feature the campaigns for the November elections. At least 25 parties are in the field—the largest number in the memory of old time observers.

The Farmer Laborites in Minnesota headed by Senator Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., are in the van of the party movement, with candidates listed in other states.

Communists and Socialists also have candidates in many states. Aside from the Maine "New Deal" league between Democratic and Old Guard Republican candidates numerous others ranging from "Reds" to "Blacks" are now stirring up party marriage and divorce laws have been passed.

Unusual Personalities dot the political scene. Chief among these is Lipton Sinclair with his spectacular campaign for the governorship on his "End Poverty by California" platform, young "Bob" LaFollette of Wisconsin who is seeking to return to the Senate on the Progressive ticket after dropping his GOP bid and former Governor Theodore G. NURSE IS KILLED IN AUTO ACCIDENT

Had Just Been Graduated—Fence Rail Pierces Head—Dies at Once.

New Haven, Sept. 28.—(AP)—Miss Bessie Donato, 20, who with about 40 other young women, was graduated from the nursing school at the hospital Tuesday, was dead today, the result of an automobile crash into a guard rail on the Milford turnpike in Milford near the Orange town line.

The car was driven by John Lavazza, 21, of Wallingford. He told Milford police, he attempted to pass a truck driven by Thomas R. Benoit of Springfield, Mass., miscalculated both the car's speed and the distance in which there was to make the turn out, and went off the road's shoulder and hit the fence.

Killed Instantly

Portions of the top rail of the fence went through the windshield and pierced Miss Donato's head. Medical Examiner Fletcher of Milford later said he believed Miss Donato died instantly.

Lavazza, with Miss Donato, Miss Annie Ruby, a graduate nurse, and Patrick Palmer, all of this city, were returning from a dinner at an inn where a dinner had been given by the Alumni Association of the graduating class of nurses. The others were unharmed.

Lavazza was held by Milford police on a reckless driving charge to await orders from Coroner J. J. Corrigan.

The female was graduated from the Haven high school in 1931. She leaves her parents, two sisters and a brother.

ADMINISTRATION STARTS A NEW RECOVERY DRIVE

Control of NRA Policies Placed in New Hands—Federal Reserve Board Plans New Moves.

Washington, Sept. 28.—(AP)—The Roosevelt administration is a swift quickening of tempo, has started the autumn attack on recovery problems with a series of major moves.

Paramount among them is the control of NRA policy in the hands of the more liberal leaders in the government.

With the President back in the White House after summer days, significant events crowded thick and fast. Among them were these:

—Donald R. Richberg, whose difference of opinion with Hugh S. Johnson attracted wide attention, emerged today as the top man in the industrial recovery drive. To a reorganized industrial emergency committee of six, which Richberg headed, President Roosevelt last night gave the task of laying down policies for a revamped NRA.

—One man rule of NRA, from which Administrator Johnson has resigned, passed definitely out of the picture when Mr. Roosevelt selected a board consisting of two industrialists, two labor experts, and a college professor to administer the Blue Eagle unit under direction of the President.

—President Roosevelt struck at goast-mongers who would "create fear or encourage panic." In a radio speech last night he cited a "Wall street rumor" which he branded as "wastily untrue," that Secretaries Wallace, Perkins and Morgenthau with Tugwell, undersecretary of agriculture, were to retire immediately.

—The Federal Reserve Board in setting a sliding scale of between 9.45 and 10 percent, today and departed 10 minutes later for Kansas.
