## PRESIDENT URGES INDUSTRIAL PEACE

### Asks Capital and Labor to Declare Truce; Scores His Critics; Defends New Deal Plans.

Washington, Oct. 1.—(AP)—President Roosevelt applied himself today to a new experiment—a truce in the warfare between labor and capital with the government as umpire. Acting on a plan he advocated in a stentorian voice in a radio address last night, Mr. Roosevelt is expected to summon leaders of industry and organized labor within a few days.

He will seek to have them forego strikes, lockouts or other methods of economic force for a "specific trial period of industrial peace." He will ask pledges to settle differences by mutual agreement or failing that by the elaborate mediation machinery the New Deal has established. Quick replies for the President's speech came from President William Green of the American Federation of Labor. Calling the address "timely, appropriate and impressive," he said at San Francisco that the "appeal to industry and labor to use the government for co-operative purposes is pertinent."

Without mentioning Herbert Hoover or other critics who see "regimentation" and dangers to liberty in present government trends, "I am not for a return to the definition of liberty under which for many years a free people were being gradually regimented by the actions of a privileged few."

"I prefer and I am sure you prefer that broader definition of liberty under which we are moving forward to greater freedom, to greater security for the average man than he has ever known before in the history of America."

As for the industrial truce the President he would not ask either employers or employees permanently to lay aside the weapons common to industrial war "but he will request them to give a 'truce' to peaceful methods."

Of NRA, the President declared that "substantial gains" had been made. "I am not for a return to the definition of liberty under which for many years a free people were being gradually regimented by the actions of a privileged few."

## ADJOURN TOWN MEETING UNTIL THIS SATURDAY

### Action Taken as Polls Are Opened This Morning — Gives Night Workers an Opportunity to Be Present.

The annual town meeting for action on budget appropriations and other public business scheduled for this evening was adjourned until Saturday evening at eight o'clock after the polls in the Municipal building opened this morning. This motion was made by Thomas Trotter, who said afterward that it would give those employed on a night shift in the building an opportunity to be present.

Break voting. Break voting during the early hours of the town election today indicated a total vote when the polls close of 3,000 or slightly more. The vote for the first hour was 200, the second hour 543 and at 11 o'clock the counters registered exactly 400 votes. Last year the vote at noon was 475 which shows that the vote today is about 300 ahead of last year at the same hour.

No difficulty was experienced at the polls this morning or early in the afternoon. In contrast to the primaries, no lines had formed as all those who appeared were taken care of on the spot and four old machines in regular order. The speed of the morning vote indicated that very little, if any, spill voting was in order, though the old vote issued under Republican or Democratic tickets.

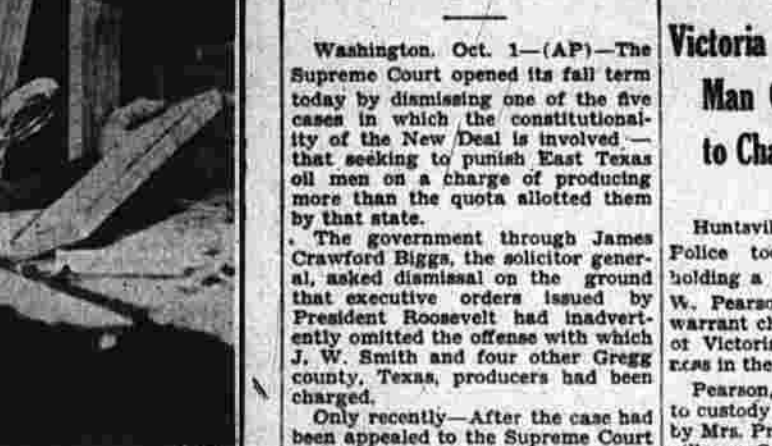
It is expected that the voting will be heavy from 8 o'clock until the polls close at 8 p. m. At the opening of the polls this morning at 8 o'clock, George H. Waddell, town treasurer, moved that the meeting be adjourned at 8 o'clock this evening to High School hall for the purpose of acting upon the 13 articles of the annual call for the town meeting and Thomas Trotter immediately amended the motion postponing the town meeting until Saturday evening, October 6, at 8 o'clock in the High School hall. The latter motion was passed as previously indicated.

Workers Busy. At the Municipal building all day this morning and early this afternoon party workers were busy in checking canvassing and transporting voters to the polls. The Republican town committee and the Democratic company office and the Dem.

## EXPERTS TO GIVE HAUPTMANN SERIES OF MENTAL TESTS

One Alienist to Represent New York, One New Jersey and Third the Defense — Examinations to Be Held Wednesday — Mysterious Woman Figures in Case.

Huntville, Ala., Oct. 1.—(AP)—Police today disclosed they were holding a man they identified as J. W. Pearson, of Birmingham, on a warrant charging attempted bribery of Victoria Price, complaining witness in the "Scottsboro attack case."

## MALONEY CHALLENGES ALCORN TO A DEBATE

### Would Discuss New Deal on Platform With Republican Nominee — Wilcox Questions Cross.

By ASSOCIATED PRESS. A challenge flung by Representative T. Maloney to debate the problem of President Roosevelt and a counter attack on the strike issue launched by Lieut.-Gov. Roy C. Wilcox against Gov. Wilbur L. Cross, served as a notice today to Connecticut voters that there will be no mulling of words during the political campaign. The Lieutenant-Governor, Republican nominee for re-election, called on Governor Cross for the facts relative to the mobilization of National Guard troops during the textile strike.

In a speech at Wallingford during the week-end, Wilcox said: "Let me ask you, Governor Cross, for what reason did you bring out in your speech on Friday night that when I was away the Lieutenant-Governor called out the National Guard? Give me due reason for this reference."

## BUSINESS BETTER IN NEW ENGLAND

### Federal Reserve Bank Reports Moderate Improvement in Several Lines.

Boston, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The Federal Reserve Bank of Boston today reported "moderate improvement" in several important industries in New England, during July and August.

"The improvement was registered," the report stated, "after allowances had been made for customary seasonal changes."

"These gains are significant," the reserve statement said, "in view of the unusual contra-seasonal peaks which occurred during the summer of 1933 the peak of production being attained in July with a moderate decline in August and that in distribution taking place in August."

## LABOR FEDERATION CONVENTION OPENS

### Executive Council to Advocate New Vision of American Living Standards.

San Francisco, Oct. 1.—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor today opened its annual convention in San Francisco. The convention was urged by the executive council to advocate a new vision of American living standards, and re-organization of the NRA as a long time reform.

"We must have a living standard which will use the capacity of our industries and the capacity of our man-power," said the executive council's report. The original purpose of the NRA was to increase wages—4.5 per cent in 1933 and 4.5 per cent in 1934.

Confronted by vital issues including an appeal from the President for the United States for industrial peace, the Federation found itself torn by discord on the opening day.

## STEAMER BEACHED; PASSENGERS SAFE

### Vessel Hits Rocky Ledge and Tears Hole in Side — All Persons Landed.

**PRESIDENT'S SPEECH**

Became a critic but extremely vocal group of enemies of the Roosevelt administration had handed him opportunity on a platter, so to speak, the President took the time on the occasion of his radio address last night, in scoring a cheap and rather impressive victory over the liberals and "Communist" agitators. And in the end kicked up by his lumping of those critics with nostalgians from the Roosevelt era, Abraham Lincoln Mr. Roosevelt was able to avoid, without attracting undue attention to his remark, any explanation of the confusion and lack of his fiscal policy in remedying the basic cause of the depression's continuation—deflation.

**TREES, GRASS**

The thousand-mile-long, hundred-mile-wide belt with which President Roosevelt planned to cover the moisture of the Midwest and put an end to the arid drought seems to have gone into the discard. Controller-General McCarl, who is the dardest specialist in Washington apportioned directly, did the President refer to that most vital of all problems—the persistent failure of property values to improve and the continuing inability of the people to figure out wherein they hold an equity in their own country. When the debts of a nation are equal to the nation's inventory of all classes of property, then that nation has reached a point where it is helpless to extend or renew its business and must continue to be so until either the debts are compromised or the inventory is revalued sufficiently to make the price level rise above the level in effect, to lift the valuation of the national inventory to that extent. 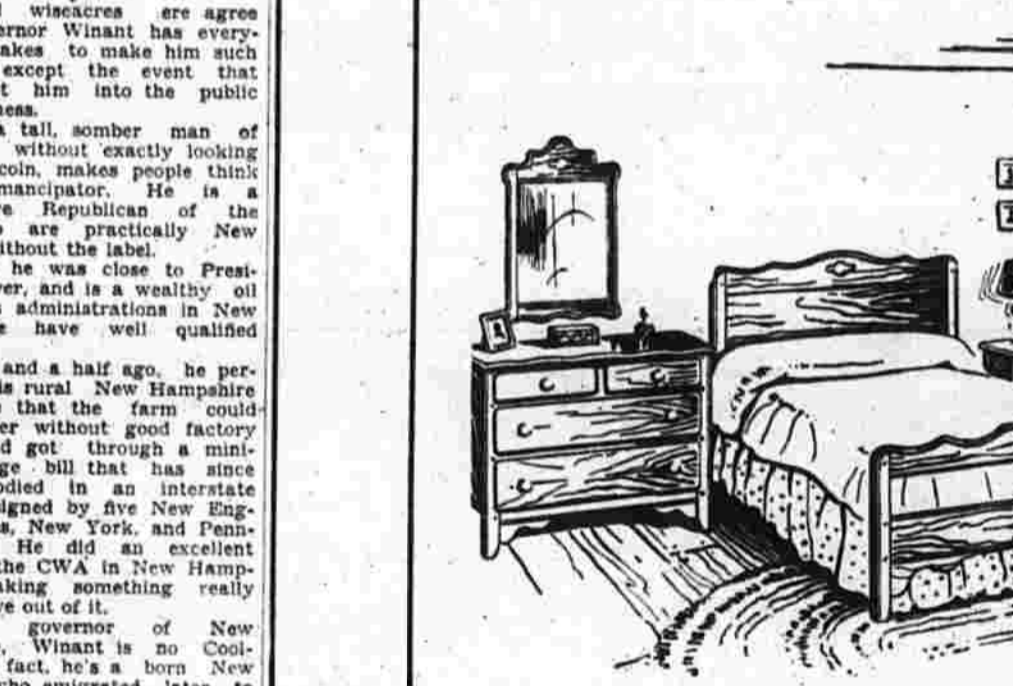

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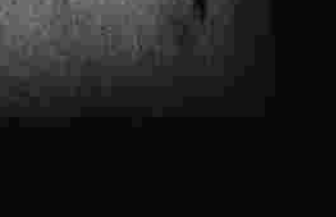
