CARDINALS LEADING 2-0 IN THE SECOND

Bridges, Bengali's Hurler, Hit Freely from the Very Start—Martin Makes a Triple.

Sportman's Park, St. Louis, Oct. 5.—Battering the offerings of Tommy Bridges, Tiger curve ball ace, from the start of the first inning the flying St. Louis Cardinals at the end of the second inning had pounded in two runs while Mickey Cochrane's charges seemed unable to do anything with Paul Dean's deliveries.

The first was featured by a triple into the upper boxes off third base by Pepper Martin who scored on a long fly by Rothrock but the inning ended when Medwick fanned. A Texas leaguer by Gehrig was the only hit the Tigers could get in the initial stanza.

In the second the Bengalis had two men on base when "Goose" Collins slashed out a single and Owens took first base after being hit by a pitched ball. This advantage came to nothing when Bridges fanned, retiring the bases right at the second lead.

The Cardinals in their half of the second led the bases right at the start with a single by Collins, a double by DeLaney and Orsatti being hit by a pitched ball. A long fly by Dean scored Collins. Martin lined out to White.

Grant and his wife, Virginia Cherrill, one time leading woman for the studio, separated last Saturday after a quarrel.

Dr. Cornell quoted the actor as saying he had taken a poison tablet while the stress of the poison in his system.

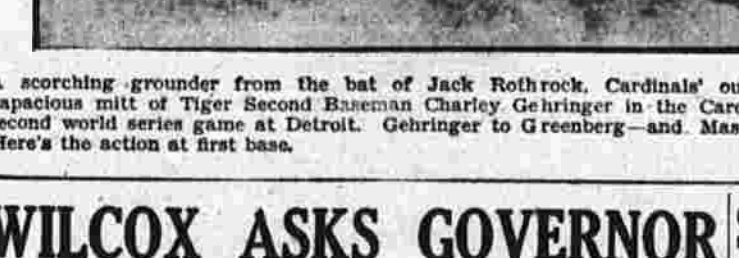

WILCOX ASKS GOVERNOR TO ANSWER QUESTIONS

Asks Cross If He Did Not Approve of the Calling Out of National Guard During Strike.

Sharp rhetorical exchanges increased the tension on all political fronts in Connecticut today as the campaign season in its final months with indications that the fight will be won or lost on such controversial issues as the textile strike, milk, liquor and the New Deal policies of President Roosevelt.

From Lieutenant Governor Roy Wilcox came another call last night asking Governor Wilbur L. Cross to answer several "pertinent questions" concerning the mobilization of National Guard troops during the recent textile strike.

The Governor himself, meanwhile, was defining his position on the milk issue in a speech at Sharon in which he asserted the "boycott question" and the tax issue should be excluded from politics.

In Bridgeport, Mayor Jasper McLevy, formally opened the campaign of the Socialist Party with an attack on the two major parties.

The Republican lieutenant governor presented a series of questions to the Democratic chief executive on the strike issue, asking that they be answered "Yes" or "No."

Among the questions were: "Did you mean to imply on Thursday night in Woodbury Hall as well as in Windsor Locks and Thompsettville last Friday night that my actions in your absence at your country home in New Hampshire, in calling out sufficient of the National Guard to protect citizens and property in the affected districts, did not meet with your approval?"

"Did you tell me Wednesday morning after your return to the state that the action in calling out sufficient National Guard to protect the citizens and property in the affected areas did meet with your approval?"

"The answer is yes or no."

Bank Robbery Blamed On Connecticut Gang

Wallington, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The five bandits who looted the Wallington Bank and Trust Company of \$24,313 had doubled back into Connecticut today, with abandonment by the police of theories concerning the Bents gang of Vermont.

It was a Connecticut gang the police were seeking today and they based their assumptions largely on the thorough manner in which the raid had been staged and the familiarity of the gunmen with Wallington and the bank premises.

Photographs of the Bents gang were shown to employees of the raised bank state police to identify them, police said, except a few more pictures of crooks.

ARBITRATE DISPUTES IS SEC. PERKINS' PLEA

Cabinet Member Tells Labor That Is the Only Way to Keep Peace in Industry in This Country.

San Francisco, Oct. 5.—(AP)—A plea for industrial peace through arbitration was voiced at the American Federation of Labor convention today by Miss Frances Perkins, secretary of labor.

She said that the government would not coerce either side in a capital-labor dispute, she asked for voluntary use of the mediation machinery the Roosevelt Administration has set up.

"More reasonable weather," asserted the summary, "is providing encouragement to distributors of merchandise, and with the broadening volume during the period immediately ahead last year's record peak of fall trade will be reached later than usual."

Retail Trade Better
"Retail trade in the large cities has shown a quickening beyond early provisions made by merchant."

"Nearly all of the industrial index turned downward this week, but the degree of the decline was so small that the lines on the charts gave the appearance of merely flattening out."

"Zinc business was recorded by wholesalers in the leading markets last week both in the form of orders and fresh commitments. Wholesalers gradually are catching up with their orders, but delivery delays have not ended as yet. REICH DESPERATE TO PRODUCE GAS

Government Issues Orders That It Should Be Made at Any Price.

Berlin, Oct. 5.—(AP)—How far Germany is prepared to go in her desperate fight for self sufficiency was disclosed today in a government order for post and coal operators to produce gasoline even though it costs four times the world price.

Mining interests were told to raise a common fund to perfect expedients now under way. One of these, it is claimed is a signal advance over previous gasoline production methods in that extensive pressure apparatus is eliminated.

"But now the government has established boards to make judicial findings of fact and to arbitrate if both parties to a dispute agree, and to maintain continuously a machinery for effective industrial relations in cases where the principal parties cannot quickly and peacefully agree."

"It seems fitting, proper and reasonable that this system should be given every trial."

"As in several recent utterances by administration spokesmen, she assured business that it has the right to a 'fair profit.' She also spoke of a need for increased wages and shorter hours as profits become better."

FEW CLUES FOUND IN PEPPION HOLDUP

Hartford Man Is Recovering From Wounds in a Hospital in Holyoke.

West Springfield, Mass., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Police of this town and Holyoke were joined by officers of East Hampton in their investigation of the holdup and shooting of Gordon Peppion of Hartford, Conn., in this town early yesterday morning, when statements made by Peppion who is recovering in a Holyoke hospital from a bullet wound inflicted by a masked bandit, led police to believe the actual shooting occurred in the latter town.

Few Clues Found
Peppion has been unable to give the authorities any satisfactory clue as to the identity of the man who held him up or his companion and nothing definite could be isolated from the confusion of finger prints on the steering wheel of Peppion's automobile which was recovered in Agwagan.

Police advised that Peppion was a friend of the late Dr. Stanislawsky, whose operations created a French mania.

An investigating committee reported bonds and huge land holdings of the Peppion estate had been sold without his knowledge and that the funds were unaccounted for.

Stratford police under the direction of Chief William E. Nichols, who were commended highly last night for their work in recovering the explosive, continued to search the area to determine a motive.

URGES U. S. TO RUN MUNITIONS PLANTS

Senator McCarran Tells War Veterans It Would Tend to Prevent War.

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 5.—(AP)—Senator Patrick E. McCarran of Nevada endorsed federalization of munitions plants in an address before the Veterans of Foreign Wars here today.

"Profit to industry," he added, "would be written out in time of war."

Senator McCarran said he felt government operation of the plants would tend to prevent war.

He also approved the 1934 uniform pension legislative standard which would establish standard rates to recipients of government funds because of war loss or services.

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Belgian Steamer Sinks; Believe Nine Men Lost

Amsterdam, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The German steamer, Wilschade reported by the Belgians today that the Belgian steamer Charles Jone, with a crew of 331, sank four miles west of Haaks Lightship at 11 o'clock last night, during a severe storm.

Considerable wreckage was located by the tugboat Rhein but it found no survivors.

Distress signals were received at the Lightship but did not identify the vessel.

The steamer, several rescue ships searched the area in vain and the Charles Jone's crew but the other nine who launched another lifeboat were believed lost.

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Extremists and Government Forces Battling in Many Villages and Cities — Airplanes Bomb Strongholds of Rebels — Lines of Communication Cut.

Madrid, Oct. 5.—At least 17 persons were killed and more than 100 wounded as rebel and government forces threw Spain into bloody turmoil today.

The National Deputy, Marcelino Oreja, was killed as was another Nationalist leader, as yet unidentified at Madrid.

All communications between Madrid and Santander were cut, but before the wires went out the city reported it was paralyzed by a succession of casualties had been suffered in the street battles.

Airplanes rained a heavy bombardment into Asturias. One wounded man died near Valladolid. One Civil Guard was killed and several wounded in battles at the village of Medina on the Rio Seco.

Immediate attempts to obtain a complete estimate of the casualties were pure guesswork, because of the breakdown of communications and the quantity of unverified rumors.

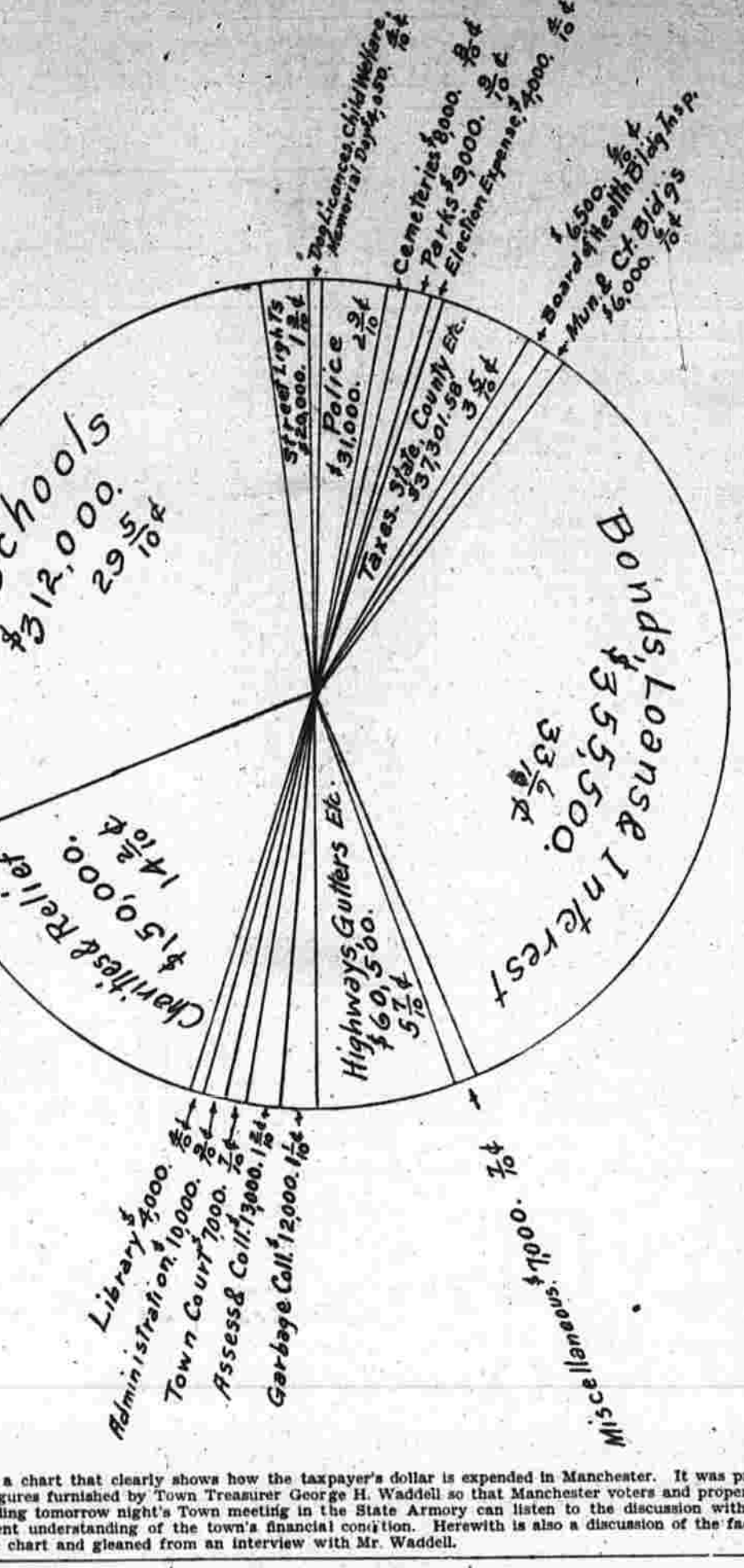
