HIGHER PRICES MUST PREVAIL A BIT LONGER

President Declares That Progress Has Been Made in Last Year to Reach Correct Level.

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—President Roosevelt feels that commodity prices should go a little higher before an attempt is made to stabilize the price level.

The President was described as feeling that considerable progress had been made in the last year and a half to bring the Nation's assets and liabilities to a more even relationship, but that the asset column should still be higher.

It was emphasized however that prices would be prevented from going through the roof, so to speak, and that when a reasonable level was reached, attempts would be made to keep them there.

In this connection, it was said, the price stabilization act was a factor in determining the Administration's future monetary policy.

Not Far Enough

Officials pointed out that a year and a half ago the Nation's liabilities exceeded the assets. They now feel that the asset column has gone a little beyond the liabilities, but not far enough.

The price stabilization studies being made by the President and his advisors were described as showing that in the period from 1920 up to the present prices have fluctuated as much as 500 to 1,000 per cent. It is these wide disparities over short periods that Mr. Roosevelt was trying to avoid in steering the Nation toward a more permanent economic level.

Experts Agree

Administration financial advisors said that over a year ago the President consulted experts in every field and found general agreement that there should be a substantial rise in prices to reduce the general debt-repudiation situation.

Three Methods of Procedure

Three methods of procedure were discussed, but the first, to cut down the debt column by some arbitrary rule of thumb procedure, was discarded because it could not be done under the Constitution.

Increasing Values

The second method was to make a definite attempt to raise the asset column by increasing values. This method was accepted, along with the third proposal—a cutting down of the debt column through various legal methods such as reduction of farm interest rates, re-organizing and lending to home owners, and a new method of permitting corporation reorganizations.

It was emphasized that the President does not want run away prices or run away values and is not wedded to the theory that new price levels should be reached completely with the level of 1929.

Some 1929 values were described as goals worth striving for, but it was emphasized that the year's price level could not be taken as a complete yardstick.

HOWARD S. PALMER SUCCEEDS PELLEY

Elected Head of New Haven Road — To Take Up Duties on Nov. 1.

New York, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Howard S. Palmer was elected president of the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad company at a meeting of the directors here today, succeeding John J. Pelley as president.

Mr. Pelley will resign as president of the railroad company on Oct. 15, and Mr. Palmer will assume the duties of the office on Nov. 1.

Mr. Palmer is one of the youngest railroad chiefs in the country.

He started his career with the New Haven 27 years ago as supervisor in the office of the auditor of freight receipts. Earlier he had been with the surveying department.

His promotions in the New Haven came through the most important accounting and financial posts to controller at the end of the period of Federal control of the railroad in 1920, and to vice-president in charge of freight receipts in 1929.

He is a vice-president and director of a number of the New Haven's subsidiaries.

Palmer is a native of East Sumner, Maine. He is married and has one son. His home and headquarters will be in New Haven.

ALCORN RAPS GOVERNOR FOR STAND ON STRIKES

Asserts State Labor Troubles Could Have Been Averted by a Board of Mediation.

From opposite corners of the state echoes of a spirited oratorical exchange between Governor Wilbur L. Alcorn and State Attorney Hugh M. Alcorn reverberated today along the political trail.

A speech at Danbury last night, the Democratic chief executive, seeking re-election to the office he has held since 1931, blamed Republicans in the General Assembly for many defects in the State Labor Control Act.

Meanwhile at Stratford the Republican gubernatorial nominee attacked the governor's position on the milk and strike issues. The governor reiterated his support for state control of liquor and charged Republicans in the Legislature blocked the governor's position on the public utilities law. He listed taxation and the control of government as "questions of great importance."

On the liquor issue the governor said: "I don't believe you can have any liquor control law entirely free of politics, but state control comes nearest."

The law will have to be changed to liberalize those spots where an injustice to one group or another, and this is a problem to come before the Legislature."

Alcorn's criticism of the Governor's stand on the milk control board was directed at the Governor's reply to the questions asked him by Lieutenant Governor Wilson and the Governor's disclosure of the part he played in the use of military forces of the state in suppressing the disorders incident to the strike.

Secure Appointment
Alcorn criticized the Governor for appointing Charles C. Morley as chairman of the milk control board, charging that the latter was disqualified for the post because of his financial interest. The nominee charges Morley was a stockholder in National Dairy.

The political calendar is crowded with events. Republicans throughout the state nominate candidates for state representatives today while Democrats in the Third Congressional District will select their nominees.

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HARTFORD YOUTH KILLED IN HOLDUP

Storekeeper Shoots Him After He Leaves Store — Pretended He Had Gun.

Hartford, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Albert Koozovsky, 46, of 130 Irving street, who last night shot and killed John Litwinski, 19, a convicted robber, was arraigned in Police Court today on a technical charge of manslaughter. His case was continued for October 20, pending a formal hearing and finding by Coroner William H. Loebe.

The youth is alleged to have entered Koozovsky's store at 21 West street, about 10:30 Tuesday night, pretended that he had a pistol concealed under his coat and demanded money. The storekeeper turned over his wallet to Litwinski and a third entered through the back door, leaving the store, Koozovsky seized about ten days ago when he had charged a number of store robbers. He followed Litwinski to the street and fired three shots in the chest and one in the head, the latter side and penetrated to the heart.

The youth died shortly after being admitted to the Mt. Sinai hospital.

Huge Migration Plan Launched by Government

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—A controlled migration that may be one of the largest movements of its kind in history, has been started by the Government, working secretly with Harry Hopkins, relief administrator.

He disclosed last night, that the Government, working secretly with "thwart" speculators, has already bought a million acres of poor farm land, from which families are being transplanted to better soil.

Three to four millions of acres will be bought here for \$25,000,000 profit. The average cost per acre will be about 35. The submarginal land will become better forests. One million acres of land, Hopkins said, is being bought or taken options in the Dakotas, Montana, the Southwest and the far west.

Fairfield Man Claims He Is King's Brother

Bridgeport, Oct. 10.—(AP)—They grade down from Katharine, George Yovanovitch, of 88 Chambers street, Fairfield, today identified himself as a brother of King Alexander of Yugoslavia who was assassinated yesterday.

Yovanovitch declared he was entitled to the throne and has pictures at his home of the late King Alexander and the royal family to prove his statements. He has been a victim of the depression and has been painting houses, as he was unable to sell his portraits and books in recent years.

Two of his brothers were killed in World War I.

Yovanovitch has nine children.

YUGOSLAVIA IS QUIET; CROATS FLEE COUNTRY

Parliament Is Called—Cabinet Proclaims Peter II New King—No Troop Mobilization.

Belgrade, Yugoslavia, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The government moved today to prevent an uprising in the Croatian district after it had formally given Yugoslavia a boy king, 11-year-old Peter II, son of the murdered King Alexander.

A cabinet proclamation notified the citizens that Peter is now King. He will rule under a regency. Hundreds of Croats fled over the Austrian border, fearing the same fate as Alexander may result in reprisals against them.

While the government denied there was any mobilization of troops, it admitted the greatest precautions were being taken in Croatia where fighting against the Government was reported.

Country Quiet
The country remained quiet today and the national frontier has not been disturbed at the opening of the new reign.

GORMAN RESENTS SPEAKER'S REMARK

Union Leader Refers to New A. F. of L. Members as "Rubbish."

San Francisco, Oct. 10.—(AP)—Bitter resentment of trade union leaders against the description of the Yugoslavian situation by Speaker Gorman, brought forth a rebuff of a temper to the floor of the American Federation of Labor convention here.

Addressing today there were thousands of spectators, but their faces were grimly set. They reiterated over what the assassination of King Alexander had meant.

France had hoped that a Croatian regency would be a long step toward a pact including Italy and sealing the peace of the Balkans for a year to come. That was the dream of Louis Barthou, foreign minister of France, but all through the day the dead Barthou had laid in state in the Yugoslavian capital.

Slain Together
They were shot down at 4:10 p. m., yesterday by Petrus Kolesen, a 35-year-old native of Zagreb, and they died only an hour apart. Kolesen, himself, was mortally injured by the police and died today.

Fourteen other persons, including Gen. Alphonse Joseph Georges of the French Superior War Council, were wounded. General Georges, despite the severity of his hurts, soldiered on at 7 p. m., yesterday, and physicians gave him an even chance for life.

SAY 30 HOUR WEEK IS NOT PRACTICAL

Some Federal Officials Declare That Industry Cannot Bear the Load.

Washington, Oct. 10.—(AP)—The American Federation of Labor's demand for a 30-hour week finds high approval among some Federal officials. Industry could bear such a load, it was declared.

Efforts are being made to reduce the work week, wherever cuts are considered feasible. A basic theory of NRA has been that industry's increased inability to turn out more goods with fewer workers creates a need for shorter hours and good wages to maintain mass purchasing power. Some officials, however, agree in a measure with the manufacturer who said at last week's meeting of the Black-County 30-hour week bill.

The point is that the present delicate condition of our health is such that we would probably be better off had had on the convention floor against an international union president.

The Other Side
On the other side of the picture, proponents of the 30-hour week are making their case. They will be a forceful drive for such legislation when Congress convenes.

Senator Hugo Black, (Dem., Ala.) co-author of the bill which failed in the last session, said the working hours of 30 a week is necessary to absorb millions still unemployed.

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EPISCOPAL CHURCH CONVENTION OPENS

Tradition May Be Shattered by Giving Women Voice in Administration.

Atlantic City, N. J., Oct. 10.—A stately procession, escorting Presiding Bishop James De Wolf Perry, of Rhode Island to the stage of the vast Atlantic City convention hall, today begins the first triennial general convention of the Protestant Episcopal church in the United States.

An estimated 30,000 clergymen, laymen, and members of the Episcopal Women's Auxiliary will look on as the procession, which is greeted by 135 bishops and a choir of 1,000 voices, enters the vast convention hall.

The National Council of the church was a deficit of over \$1,000,000 at the close of the last triennial convention in 1931. The budget for 1932 was \$2,700,000, and the budget for 1933 was \$4,200,000.

One of the chief supports of the church's mission program has been the Episcopal Women's Auxiliary, which at its last triennial convention tallied more than \$1,000,000.

The National Council also recommended that the church's mission program be expanded by the twenty domestic missionary bishops who passed a three-point resolution of the convention.

One of the church's oldest traditions will be shattered this year if the convention adopts a recommendation that the members be given a voice and a vote for the first time in the administration of the church's affairs.
