

### HOLD HARTFORD MEN ON SWINDLE CHARGE

#### Two Arrested and Man and Woman Sought in Case Involving Quarter Million Dollars.

Hartford, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Bench warrants for the arrest of Frank A. Tillman, president of the Underwriters Finance Company; Miss Beatrice Kaufman, formerly his executive secretary; Thomas J. Loveday, treasurer, and assistant secretary of the company and Louis Gerard, a director of the company, were issued this morning by Superior Court Judge R. O. O'Brien, charging conspiracy to defraud the company and its stockholders.

The warrants return that there is no doubt that defalcations totaling approximately \$250,000 had occurred, that Tillman and Miss Kaufman had fled the country but that Loveday and Gerard were here.

Two arrested.

Following the issuance of the warrants Loveday and Gerard were arrested in the hall of the county building. Bail was set at \$25,000 for each of the four persons who are alleged to have misused the automobile financing company of a quarter of a million dollars.

Loveday and Gerard were held at the county building while they made efforts to raise the bail.

They had not yet made arrangements for counsel. Neither was presented in court. When arrested they were at the county building for the purpose of listening to the report of Temporary Receiver Henry H. Hunt who appeared before Judge Arthur F. Ellis in Superior Court concerning the affairs of the Underwriters Finance Company.

Long Probe.

The issuance of the warrants today culminated an investigation into the affairs of the company by County Detective Edward J. Hickey who probe initiated by the company being petitioned into receivership last week and the revelations which followed when Judge Hunt took over the organizations.

It was learned today that the story back of the missing president and former executive secretary is one of a man who was building up a huge personal fortune through the diversion of funds from the Underwriters Finance Company into about ten other finance companies in which he was personally interested, or which he established with money belonging to Underwriters.

In Cash Position.

Judge Hunt's report today showed the cash position of the Underwriters Finance Company to be about \$75,000. He stated that Tillman had diverted about \$300,000 into personal channels during the past two years. Of this amount it appears that \$100,000 is definitely recovered and there is a possibility that there may be additional recoveries.

While it is difficult to ascertain the exact amount of cash which Tillman took with him in flight Judge Hunt estimated it at about \$250,000.

### SAYS 'HOME WORK' IN STATE GROWS

#### Miss Wood, State Official, Declares There Are No Laws to Protect Workers.

Waterbury, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Miss Helen Wood, assistant state labor commissioner addressing delegates to the 67th annual meeting of the state conference of Congregational and Christian Churches in this city today, asserted that the so-called "home work" distributed from factories to the workers in the increase in this state, that there is no protection for the withholding of state or Federal law protecting the domestic worker in regard to both the length of the day's work and standard wages; that there is no protection for the withholding of wages by the employer; and there is still in existence the 15-hour week for women and the 28-hour week for children.

She suggested that the state Legislature rather than waiting for Federal laws, should exact such laws as would help in improving the situation, and she called upon the delegates as citizens to help by the election of the proper state and Federal officers, in remodeling these conditions. Rev. ### BANKS OF NATION BACK U. S. CREDIT

#### More Than Half of Increase in Debt Has Been Absorbed by Banks.

Washington, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Federal Reserve board figures showed today that the Nation's banks are supporting the government credit to an extent unparalleled even during the period of World War heroics.

More than half of the four billion increase in government debt during the 12 months absorbed by the banking structure, the compilation disclosed in the preceding year the picture was different. In that 12 months period, \$2,000,000,000 of these securities only one-third went to the banks.

Statistics of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation indicated that bank holdings of government securities—including those of the reserve banks—amount to one-half the debt of approximately \$7,000,000,000.

The figure is accurate for 90 percent of the commercial banks, and 72 percent of mutual savings institutions, but represents private estimates for the remainder. The reserve banks hold approximately \$4,230,000,000.

Comparison Made.

A comparison of the present situation with that existing in 1919 shows that holdings of government securities by reserve member banks today amount to more than 90 percent of deposits, whereas in 1919, they were less than 15 per cent.

Even in 1919, when banks were forced to absorb large amounts of securities bought for the partial payment of government bonds, they were not so heavily laden as they are today.

Part played by banks in government financing has been illustrated further in the current operation of the 4th Liberty bond issue. Nearly \$600,000,000 had been subscribed for the issue of four year 2 1/2 per cent notes, now closed, and Treasury officials said this represented largely bank holdings.

### FIVE MEET DEATH IN HALIFAX BLAST

#### Woman and Four Children Killed; Believe Two More Bodies Are in Ruins.

Halifax, N. S., Oct. 11.—(AP)—The bodies of one woman and four children were recovered today in the smoldering ruins of a three-story building, wrecked by a mysterious explosion.

The victims were Mrs. Robert Crouse, her two children, Kathleen and Joseph, and Tommy, 6, and Peter, 1, children of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Dudas.

It was confirmed for Mrs. Dudas and an unidentified man believed trapped when the wooden structure collapsed this morning and burst into flames.

Down Across Street.

Two other occupants escaped. Robert Crouse, who was asleep in a room on the second floor, said the blast went in from the street. He offered to explain to the blast when taken to a hospital.

Edna Dudas, 7, stated that the victims, apparently climbed from the debris before the flames spread. She was only slightly injured.

The explosion rocked the north end of the city, awakening residents, who were reminded of the great Halifax explosion of 1917 which claimed 1,963 lives. The blast stored in the cellar was believed to have caused the blast.

Flames shot 100 feet into the air and then the building collapsed. Firemen battled flames for three hours before rescue operations could be undertaken.



### RICH SOCIETY WOMAN KIDNAPED IN KENTUCKY

#### Wife of Louisville Oil Man Brutally Beaten and Then Abducted — Held for \$50,000 Ransom.

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 11.—(AP)—The law's every agency today hunted for the lone kidnaper who snatched a slender society beauty and dragged her off in a night, demanding a \$50,000 ransom. The ransom awaited him if he succeeded in making contact. Federal officials all night studied the little evidence they had of the kidnaping of Mrs. Alice Stoll, 26-year-old Bryn Mawr graduate, Junior League member and wife of Berry V. Stoll, a leading Louisville oil man.

#### Reporter Describes What He Saw on the Various Battlefields; Hundreds Killed.

Madrid, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Scenes of horror in the isolated province of Asturias, now the center of a red revolt which has raged for a week, were described today in a message from a Spanish correspondent accompanying government troops.

The army encountered instances where Civil Guards had been slain by overpowering forces, the correspondent reported.

More than 1,000 armed rebels attacked the Civil Guard at Campomorie and 15 guards from Leon who attempted to relieve the post were literally torn to pieces by bullets.

### PRICES OF FISH DUE FOR UPTURN

#### Ranks of Striking Sailors Increased as Vessels Reach Port in Boston.

Boston, Oct. 11.—(AP)—Fish prices were on the upturn today and a shortage appeared possible as the ranks of the fishermen were increased as vessels reached port in Boston.

Union officials claimed well over 3,000 men on strike, while the employers set the number at not more than 2,000. The strike was called Monday but many vessels were out on the water and the fishermen were not to go to work until the first day or two of the movement failed to produce any great number of strikers.

Presented by the Rev. Elmore D. Moore of Buffalo, the resolution, one which was adopted by diocesan conventions in 1914, was read by the Rev. Dr. Howard Chandler Robinson of New York, who gave a stirring address in support of the resolution.

Cross in New London.

The Democrats concentrated their big political guns in New London where Governor Wilbur L. Cross, Chairman, had escaped from police hands at Puntaniveau. Shanley was identified by a passport, which he dropped, a passport which, like that of Kalemien, was purported to have been issued by the Czechoslovakian Consulate at Zagreb. From Chalmers, before he escaped, in a fusillade of police bullets, was taken an automatic pistol clip of the same type as Kalemien used in his sub-machine gun.

They said the two men they held were in New Haven in Paris to make the second attempt at the King's life if Kalemien failed at Marseilles.
