## RANSOM OF \$50,000 IS PAID BY STOLL

### Family Lawyer Makes Announcement While Husband Starts On a Mysterious Trip.

Louisville, Ky., Oct. 12.—(AP)—The ransom for Mrs. Alice Speed Stoll has been paid and the family is awaiting instructions, was the announcement today from Harry V. Stoll, husband of the young society matron who was snatched from their fashionable country home near here late Wednesday.

The statement given by an attorney representing the Stoll family at a conference with newspapermen said: "We have carefully followed instructions, met all ransom requirements, and are awaiting fulfillment of promises."

"BERRY V. STOLL, who has spent most of his time since his arrest sitting in jail and starting into space, obtained from the prison a copy of the 'History of France,' and has been reading it. He has not had much to eat, but he has had breakfast and lunch, and he has had some news papers."

"The Stoll family obtained complete isolation of Berry Stoll's acre estate yesterday after a day of futile waiting for a contact with the kidnaper. Through last night the waiting for word, the place standing almost deserted, with extra telephone lines installed."

"ON STRANGE QUEST. Louisville, Ky., Oct. 12.—(AP)—In a furby chase after an automobile reported to have contained a woman with a bandaged head, Berry V. Stoll, whose wife was kidnapped Wednesday afternoon, dashed southward through Kentucky today. Highwaymen throughout central and southern Kentucky were blocked by sheriffs and other officers on a request made at Hodgenville by the detective who accompanied Stoll. The pair who had left the Stoll home in Louisville drove through Hodgenville about 11:15 a. m., heading toward Elizabethtown, after the detective had requested the sheriff in nearby counties to watch for the kidnaper. The man and a woman were reported to have been driven by a man and to have had a woman passenger. The description of her head being bandaged apparently made her woman's silhouette company executive almost certain it was his wife, since her maid, Ann Wood, had declared that the unidentified woman was Berry Stoll's wife."

"ARCHBISHOP SLAIN; BODY IS BURNED. Russian Prelate Was Bitter Foe of Bolshevism; Police Seek Motive. Riga, Latvia, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Dr. Johann Pomeroy, archbishop of the Russian Orthodox church, was found slain in his villa early today. The villa was after when a fire brigade found his body covered with straw. Dr. Pomeroy was a strong opponent of Bolshevism. Police made no announcement in the crime. The archbishop's body was badly burned, but a wound in his chest was visible in the forehead. Police opened an inquiry to determine whether he had been killed for political reasons or personal vengeance. It was considered possible also he had been slain by a burglar who might have been surprised in the act of robbing the villa after the archbishop was to have appeared today as chief witness in a suit against several persons accused of embezzling church funds. Several articles of value were reported missing from the villa after the crime. Furniture remained. Riga suburb, had been smashed before the house was set afire. Developments are leading authorities to suspect they said, that the archbishop was murdered as an act of vengeance in connection with a dispute between him and a number of bishops and the latter's followers. "LORD CUSHENDUN, OF ULSTER, DIES. Once Hurled Book at Winston Churchill During the Heat of Debate. London, Oct. 12.—(AP)—Lord Cushendun, former British delegate to the League of Nations who was called 'Ulster's Giant' by Winston Churchill today at his home in County Antrim, Ireland. He was 78 years old. The Irish lord had been ill for a fortnight and unconscious since Sunday. Despite his high rank, he was still known familiarly to all Ulster as Ronald McNeill. Lord Cushendun came from a family of large men, hailing from the section near Northern Ireland's famous Giant Causeway. He was more than six feet six inches tall and his father was six inches and a half taller. Incident recalled. 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## COMPANIONS OF MAN WHO KILLED KING ALEXANDER SAY THEY WERE AWAITING ORDERS.

Paris, Oct. 12.—(AP)—The Surete Nationale announced today that two terrorist suspects, Yaroslav Novak and Ivan Ruzhica, alias Waldimir Benes, had confessed that they had been sent to France on a secret mission by the Yugoslav organization known as "The League of Assassins" but that they did not know what their mission was. Benes was said by the police to be the man who talked. He is alleged to have told them that he and his friend came to Paris on "black" orders and were told that they would be met here by others who would give them instructions as to what to do. The Surete officials said Novak and Ruzhica admitted they had shared a hotel room in Paris with Petrus Kalenich, the assassin of King Alexander and Louis Barthou. They said they met Kalenich in Paris. Ruzhica said his false Czechoslovakian passport, which named him "Benec" was delivered to him in Paris by a man he knew only as Sarbol, who spoke Serbian and Croatian. Novak said his passport also was false and confessed that he got it in Zurich Sept. 28 on the day he crossed the border. It was given him, he said by a stranger called "Little Hans."
