"Every man of the convention who wants to talk on the bonus will get the opportunity to do so."

Washington, Oct. 15.—(AP)—The United States, considering the silver tax and protest of the Chinese government, is to continue to purchase silver.

Secretary of State Hull in a note to the Chinese government said that the policy under which the United States is buying silver in world markets was laid down in the broad objective by the executive branch of the government.

Although he said that "so far as possible" the United States will avoid disturbances to the economy and public markets of China, that nation put into effect a 10 per cent silver export tax.

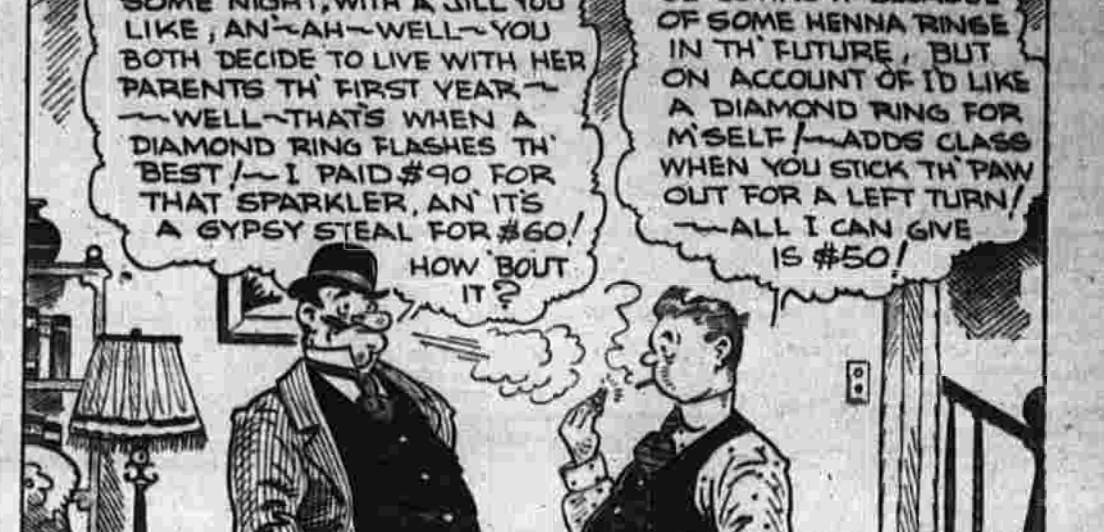
