## WARBURG PICTURES DICTATORSHIP NEAR

### Prominent Banker Declares Bankruptcy and Recovery are Fighting for Lead in the National Race.

Philadelphia, Oct. 24.—(AP)—James P. Warburg, vice-chairman of the Bank of Manhattan company, today pictured American citizens as watching a three-cornered race in vying the rate of their country, with National bankruptcy, dictatorship and recovery fighting for the lead.

As the horses come thundering down the stretch," he said, "the American people, packed in the grandstands and along the rails, see their own horse, Recovery, pocketed by National Bankruptcy and Dictatorship.

Under Sam, riding Recovery, is making a valiant effort to drive his mount through Warburg's stated. Opening his talk before the Philadelphia Rotary Club with this picture, the New York banker warned that the "New Dealers, whether they mean to or not, are well on their way toward changing our whole basic order."

Getting Beyond Control  
In their efforts to create happiness for everyone, he stated, "they are setting forces in motion beyond their power to control."

"The arrogance of man playing with forces greater than themselves may well lead to the loss of all that mankind has gained throughout the centuries," he warned.

The banker said that during the last eleven months he had made speeches and written two books "to across the American people to a realization of what has been happening to them, and to awaken in them a resistance to certain tendencies implicit in the New Deal."

Wary of the  
The banker scolded his critics as a desire to "help the New Deal right itself before it becomes too late."

In his simile on the horse race, Warburg said National Bankruptcy was bred by the stallion, inflation and the mare, Reckless Expenditure. He added:

"The breeder is the well-known British economist, John Maynard Keynes."

"The trainer is Professor George F. Warren."

"We are witnessing a race between the natural forces of recovery, the forces of inflation, and the forces that move towards political and economic dictatorship," he stated.

### HITLER TO CONTINUE SUPPORT OF MUELLER

### SAYS GIRL SCOUTS CAN PREVENT WAR

#### Mrs. Roosevelt Declares Movement is Agency for Promotion of Peace.

Boston, Oct. 24.—(AP)—Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt, wife of the President and honorary president of the Girl Scouts today hailed the Girl Scout movement "as an agency for the promotion of peace."

Addressing the 50th annual meeting of that organization she said she believed a better understanding between the youth of the countries of the world would do much to avert the likelihood of war.

"I feel that the girls of the country should be leaders in the direction of peace," she said, "the more that we try to know the youth of other countries the more we will be warring off future wars. The girls, I believe must carry the banner of this crusade and the boys will have to join in."

The Girl Scout movement is a voluntary organization of girls of all ages, which has been the subject of a very great piece of work for the last few years.

Mrs. Roosevelt with Mrs. Herbert Hoover, who has been the national president for the first time since the presidential inauguration in March, 1933.

Mrs. Hoover, honorary vice president and an active member of the board of directors, arrived yesterday.

At the convention opened the wife of the President and the wife of the former President, accompanied by stage and were seated on either side of Mrs. Frederick Elfer, president of the Girl Scouts organization.

Mrs. Roosevelt referred indirectly to Mrs. Hoover in her address. "I feel," she said, "that you have been in the past few years particular fortunate in having your husband as a leader and as a world-wide traveler. He has had the honor and interest in the Girl Scout movement and has undoubtedly brought you much interest and joy."

"I have always had a particular interest in the girls growing up today," she said, "and for that reason, one must have the interest in the Girl Scout movement for that movement is exerting a constantly spreading influence throughout the world, and for a few minutes I want to tell you the things which I feel the really most important things that this movement is contributing to the girl of today."

Mrs. Roosevelt went on to point out that the movement gives girls an opportunity to meet a wide variety of people, that it refreshment, which includes every type of girl in a community and that it gives them the opportunity to note conditions and opportunities confronting the less fortunate girls.

Warburg will be taken out of the hands of the industrialists and the economic planners, for they will then no longer be contented masses to cajole with "if" nostrums.

"If" nostrums expenditure and monetary experimentation carry the day, we shall have national bankruptcy.

"And if the course of economic central and regulatory control, factors in carried to its logical conclusion, we shall abandon democracy for a dictatorship of the few over the masses of the people created by the dictators of a tyranny created by the industrialists.

Not figure of speech. This picture, the banker said, will not agree with the hysterical Wall Street imagination. He added:

"National bankruptcy and social and economic dictatorship are not as the New Dealers would have you believe—ghosts conjured up out of darkness by selfish reactionaries. They are a twin menace which constitutes the grim reality of what we have to face.

Warburg said the New Deal has been "sought to change" one of the fundamental conceptions of the American order.

"Our forefathers sought to guarantee us, life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness," he stated. "The New Deal is more ambitious, under its program we are to be guaranteed 'happiness' itself."

Impossible Guarantee.

"Such a guarantee is impossible of fulfillment, he contended, by any banker criticized the New Deal for what he described as a "clever technique of creating an atmosphere in which any criticism of their policies was automatically labeled ' Tory or Reactionary.'"

"The choice," he said, "is not between the New Deal and going back to what we had before."

The choice is between abandoning our whole political, social, and economic order in favor of some form of state capitalism which we shall follow the present tendency to their logical conclusion—and in the other hand, improving and building upon our present system without changing our fundamental order."

The banker declared that the New Dealers "either will not or do not recognize the full significance of the part of what they are doing."

He said opposition to the New Deal, Warburg stated, "is as yet feeble. I still hope that it will never be to born. For I still believe that the New Deal is a necessary if it a clear purpose to develop out of the realities of human nature and compatible with the established and compatible with the established principles of American life."

### 3 DEAD, 4 DYING AS TORNADO HITS

#### Twelve Others Hurt When Storm Strikes CCC Camp, Buildings Demolished.

Maryville, Mo. Oct. 24.—(AP)—A toll of three dead, one missing, and four critically injured, and 12 others severely hurt was counted today as a tornado that tore through this city, venting its fury in a "veteran's conservation corp" camp.

Damage to buildings and other property in the city and in the vicinity was placed at about \$300,000.

Dr. D. C. Y. Moore said there was nothing wrong with the present arrangement, but when it came to the question of the amount of the fee, he said that the present arrangement was not equitable.

Dr. LeVern Holme said the purpose of the meeting was to arrange for a fair and equitable program satisfactory to both the town and the doctors.

When questioned regarding details of the meeting, Mr. Weddell took the justifiable position that it was a matter for the town meeting to decide, but that he would be glad to furnish information to the town meeting.

Another point said to have been brought out concerned objections to the meeting of charity patients under certain conditions on bills rendered by another physician's services in case of illness.

It is understood that the meeting will be held at 9 o'clock and ended just before 11 o'clock, indicating that two hours were spent discussing questions that must have brought about a serious situation.

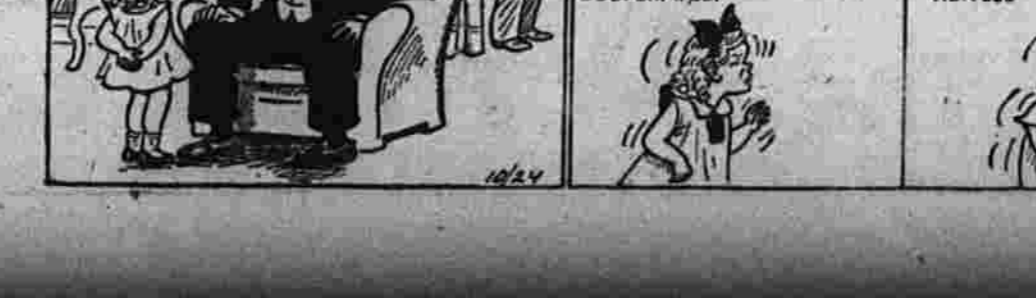
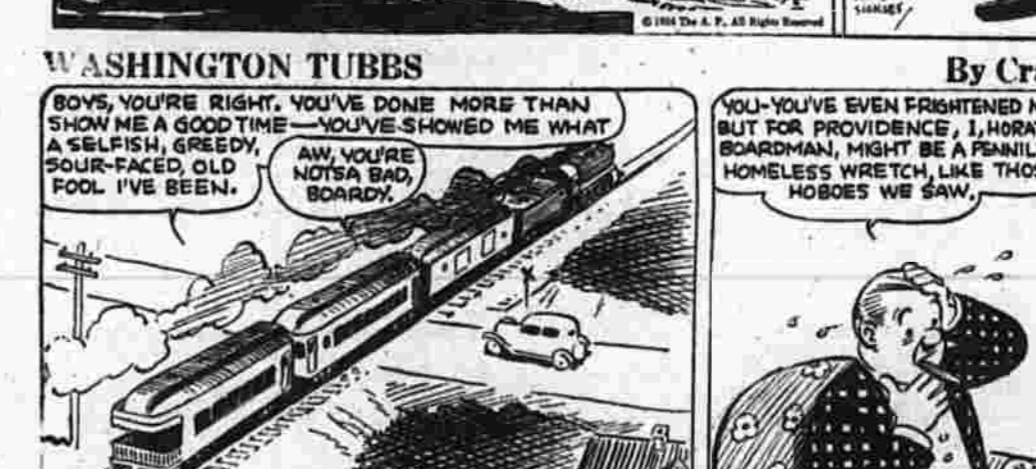
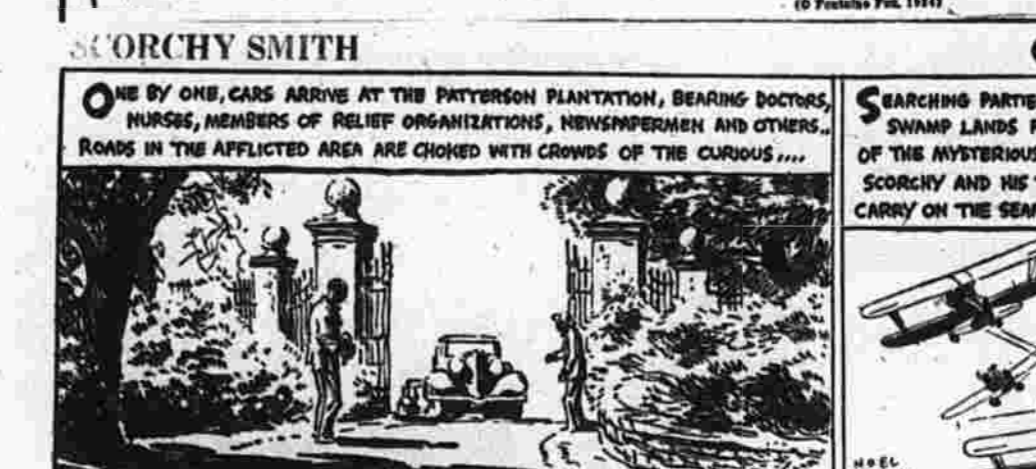
