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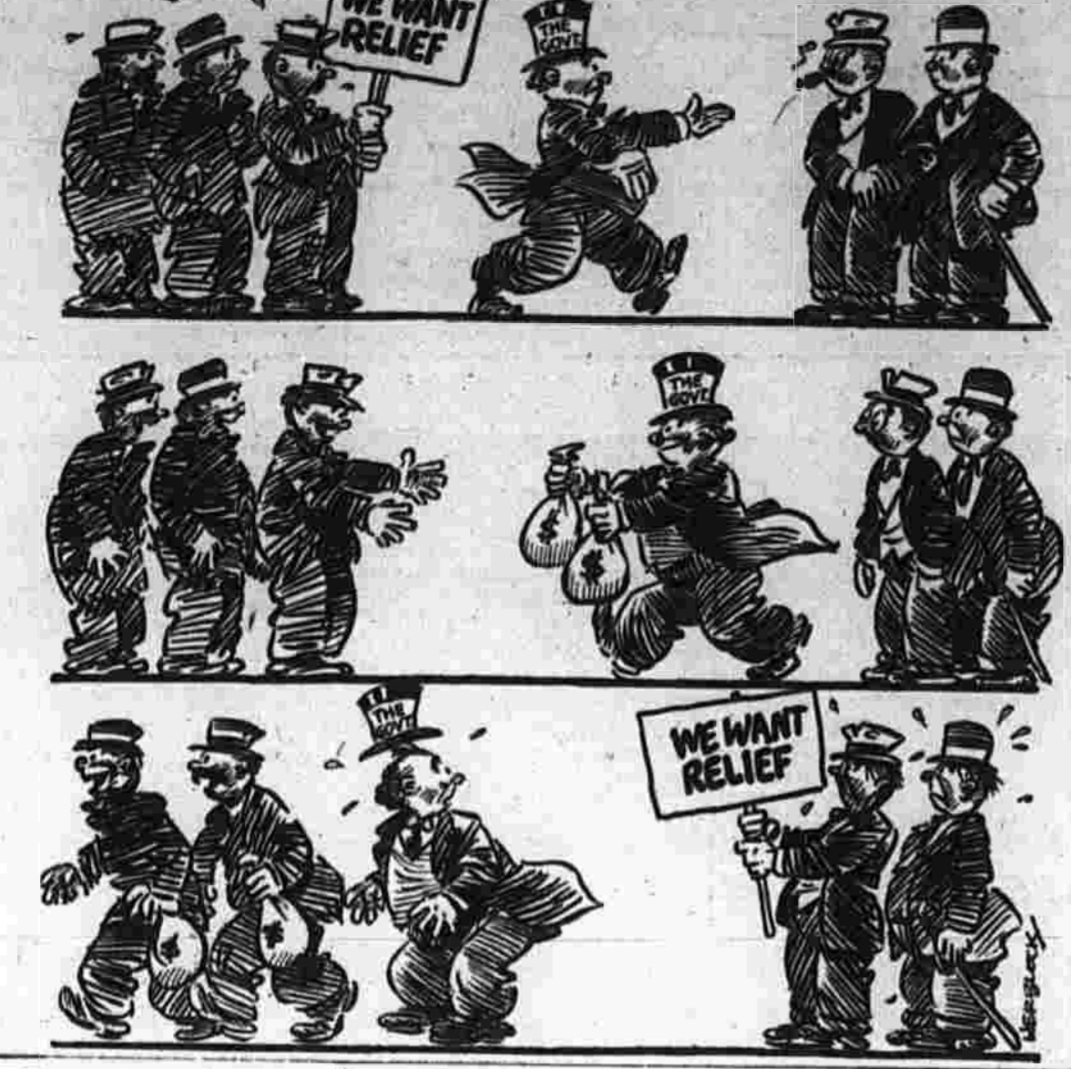

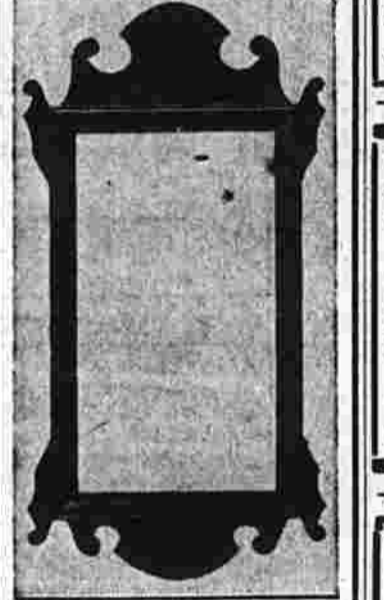

Materials amounting to \$3,800.30 and labor costing \$2,424.70 are included in the estimate. The plans call for excavation of 420 cubic yards of soil, construction of 3,000 square feet of forms pouring of 100 cubic yards of concrete, laying of 740 feet of tile, trucking of 312 tons of filter stone and 250 tons of filter sand and construction of a reinforced steel track system and re-grading of the entire plot.
