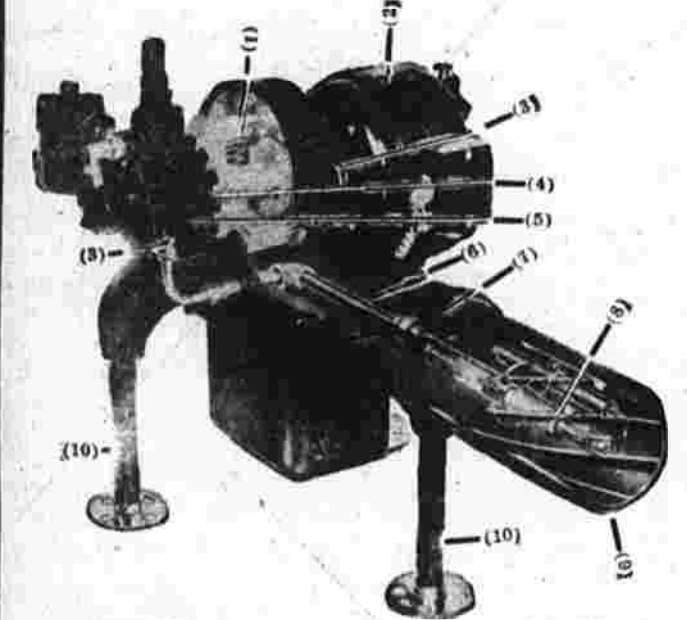

Several from Manchester attended the dance in the Hotel Bond, Hartford last night which was sponsored by the Hopkinton state central committee. Members of the Young Republican Club of this town were invited to attend the function.

Fortunately for the funmakers, the rain held off long enough to permit them to have a good time with out danger of getting drenched.

Two fires were reported last night. Neither of which did much damage. An unfortunate angle of the evening's revelry was the accidents in which a Manchester woman was killed and a Buckland man seriously injured.

Big Stick Method However, around 8 o'clock the larger boys sallied forth on errands of mischief and then the trouble started. One resident, whose newly papered living room last year was splattered by rotten eggs thrown through an open window, was guarding his property last night armed with a stout stick.

He caught three youngsters sneaking around his back yard and whacked one of them lustily across the shins. For the rest of the evening his house remained un molested.

It must have required the combined efforts of a dozen boys to swing the telephone pole into such a position that it blocked traffic on Foster street until it was moved away.

While the depositions were manifold last night, old-timers who recalled the wild celebrations of many years ago when valuable property was destroyed, and vandalism ran rampant, could not help but feel that last night the celebration was mild in comparison.

The Old Days Twenty years ago it was common to drag poddy's wagons into the middle of a street, load them with boxes, papers and leavings and set them on fire. Old privy houses were dragged from the back of residences and also sent up in smoke. Windows were smashed in houses and property generally damaged, costing the owners substantial sums to repair.

Numerous private and public parties were held. The supper and dance of Lady Roberts Lodge, Daughters of St. George, in Odd Fellows hall was regarded as one of the most successful of the season. A fine supper was served under the direction of Mrs. Harold Betcher, members of the lodge contributing food-stuffs used in preparing the meal.

After the grand march dancing was enjoyed. A Halloween touch was given to the harvest festival at the Emmanuel Lutheran church in the autumnal decorations.

Inasmuch Circle of the Junior Kings Daughters also enjoyed a Halloween party in Center church house last night. Halloween games were played and refreshment served.

Many Places Decorated Restaurants in the town itself and in the smaller surrounding communities were gallantly decorated in the traditional Halloween colors of black and gold. Many served special dinners and dancing was enjoyed, particularly in the restaurants, where masquerades in which the guests appeared in costume were featured.
